

Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

We spend much of our day talking, and it is incredibly easy to take this gift for granted until one loses their voice due to a cold or virus. Talking occurs at home, school, the church foyer, the parking lot, sporting events, and work, to name just a few places. Speech is

important, and listening may be even more critical. Beyond words, our actions "speak" volumes with their language.

I share with you a powerful story. Enjoy and pass it on.

Some years ago, a group of salesmen went to a regional sales convention in Chicago. They assured their wives they would be home in plenty of time for Friday night's dinner. In their rush, with tickets and briefcases, one of these salesmen inadvertently kicked over a table holding a display of apples. Apples flew everywhere. They all managed to reach the plane in time for their nearly missed boarding but never stopped or looked back at the mess they made.

All but one man who paused and took a deep breath. He got in touch with his feelings and felt a twinge of compassion for the girl whose apple stand they overturned. He told his buddies to go on without him, waved goodbye, and told one of them to call his wife when they arrived at their home destination and explain his taking a later flight. Then he returned to the terminal, where the apples were all over the terminal floor.

He was glad he did. The 16-year-old girl was blind! She was softly crying, tears running down her cheeks in frustration, and at the same time, helplessly groping for her spilled produce as the crowd swirled about her, no one stopping and no one to care for her plight.

The salesman knelt on the floor with her, gathered the apples and put them in the baskets to set up the display again. As he did this, he noticed many of them had become battered and bruised; he set these aside in another basket.

When he had finished, he pulled out his wallet and said to the girl, "Here, please take this \$50 for the damage we did. Are you okay?" She nodded through her tears. He continued, "I hope we didn't spoil your day too badly."

As the salesman started to walk away, the bewildered blind girl called out to him, "Mister..." He paused and turned to look back into those blind eyes. She continued, "Are you Jesus?"

He stopped in mid-stride and wondered. Then, slowly, he made his way to catch the later flight with that question burning and bouncing about in his soul: "Are you Jesus?"

Do people mistake you for Jesus? This is our destiny, is it not? To be so much like Jesus, people cannot tell the difference as we live and interact with a world that is blind to His love, life, and grace. If we claim to know Him, we should live, walk, and act as He would. Knowing Him is more than simply quoting Scripture and going to church. It's living the Word as life unfolds day to day.

This is truly a wonderful story with a challenging message for all of us. Walking like Jesus in word and deed can never be achieved without a life rooted in prayer. Take one day at a time, and may we see each day as a special gift from God – always giving thanks! And remember the beautiful words attributed to St. Francis of Assisi: "Preach the Gospel at all times – if necessary, use words."

Mosaic of St. Mark by Mario Zappettini, in Church of the Four Evangelists, Milan, Italy

They say, "you can't go home again." That seems to be the dynamic playing out in today's gospel (Mark 3:20-35). Jesus, having launched out on his public



mission, "came home" with his disciples. It is not to his hometown of Nazareth (6:1) that he returns, but to Capernaum, where he has made a new home (2:1) and a new family. His relatives, who think he has lost his mind, first try to force him to come home to his family of origin. When that fails, his mother and siblings try to persuade him, but he has cast his lot with a newly formed family of disciples and there is no going back.

Sometimes hearing this reading can make us feel pity for Mary. Jesus's response to her presence seems a bit callous, almost as if he is rejecting her in favor of his faithful listeners. But Jesus's message is one of radical inclusion. He does not just offer us citizenship in heaven; he offers us places in God's very family. When we are adopted as children of God in baptism, we become co-heirs with Christ.

A Simple Sign of Reverence, Respect, Veneration and Love

s we move into this extended period of Ordinary Time, which will be unbroken from now until the First Sunday of Advent, which falls on Dec. 1 this year, we are invited to see God in the ordinariness of life. Our liturgy is full of ordinary moments of encountering God's love, drawing us deeper into the mysteries we



celebrate. One of the more subtle actions is done at the beginning and end of Mass when the priest and deacon kiss the altar.

The altar is a central element of any Catholic church worldwide. Throughout the Old Testament, churches built their altars to be a table of sacrifice to God. In these sacrifices, they offered animals to God as sin offerings and in praise and thanksgiving. For Catholics, the altar has twofold meanings: the table of sacrifice and the table of the paschal meal.

The altar should be "fixed," in the sense that it cannot be moved, and be freestanding so the priest can easily move around it, allow the priest to face the people while celebrating Mass, and should be built of stone or another suitable solid material (Rite of Dedication of an Altar). Following the liturgical reforms of Vatican II, the altar was moved away from the wall, which allowed the priest to face the people during Mass. With this change, the altar continues to be seen as the table of sacrifice where the re-enactment of Calvary takes place, but also as the table of the paschal meal.

Understanding the altar as the table of the paschal meal, the Church's children gather weekly to give praise and thanks to God, to offer prayers and supplications, and to feed on the bread of eternal life which is made present on the altar. The altar is the center point of any church because it is on the altar that we offer Christ back to the Father for the salvation of the world and participate in his dying and rising through the reception of the Eucharist.

The priest's and deacon's act of kissing the altar is a sign of reverence, respect, veneration, and love because the altar is Christ himself. It is the place where Christ makes himself present to us. But also, because in every altar, there is at least one relic of a saint within or underneath the altar. This custom goes back to the early Christian communities who built altars on top of the graves of the martyrs as a connection to the witness of the faith that the martyrs shed their blood for. After the Roman empire legalized Christianity, relics of any saint, not only martyrs, were placed within the altar as a connection between this sacrifice and this meal to assist us on our journey of holiness today.

The altar is more than a piece of liturgical furniture. The altar is a reference point to the mysteries we participate in every time we gather for the Eucharist. It is holy and symbolic, pointing to Jesus of Nazareth and witnessing to the saints who have died, professing the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead. When the priest and deacon kiss the altar at the start and end of Mass, it is an action of reverence, a sign of respect, and a physical expression of love for the mysteries we are blessed to celebrate as a community of faith.

The National Eucharistic Revival is a three-year, grassroots initiative of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to assist Catholics in coming to a fuller



understanding and appreciation of the meaning of the Eucharist in the life of the Church. The aim is to proclaim that the celebration of the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life, to assist Catholics to encounter the Risen Lord in the Eucharist, and to deepen their discipleship in sharing His work of redeeming the world, won on the cross.

The Revival will culminate in a pilgrimage across the country to Indianapolis for the Eucharistic Congress in July 2024. The Archdiocese of Chicago, on the Marian Route of the pilgrimage, will host pilgrims and has organized special events and Eucharistic celebrations in archdiocesan parishes and locations from June 26 to 30, 2024.

The local pilgrimage will culminate on June 30, with the Mass and procession at Holy Name Cathedral. Parishes are being asked to invite one first Communion and one confirmation family to represent them at the Mass.

Bishop Bob Lombardo came to Chicago in 2005 at Cardinal George's request to establish a mission outreach to the poor on the west side. He has since overseen the creation of the Mission of Our Lady of the Angels and over \$15 million in renovations. He also serves as the Vicar for Vicariate III in the Archdiocese of Chicago.

In Chicago, he founded and directs the Mission of Our Lady of the Angels and the Franciscans of the Eucharist of Chicago. He was appointed bishop by Pope Francis in September 2020 and ordained on November 13, 2020. He continues to lead the Mission and the Franciscans of the Eucharist.

New Faith & Fitness Video Series Now Available

Session No. 2: Stewardship of the Body

Holy Name Cathedral debuted the inaugural "Faith & Fitness" series in December 2023 – May 2024. Led by Father Louis Cameli and Michele Sotak, this program offers education on the convergence between our Catholic faith and physical fitness. The in-person classes consisted of praying, cross referencing scripture passage that support taking care of the physical body as well as reflections, practical education on exercise and movement, exercise demonstrations and participant discussion. The range of topics include stewardship of the body and becoming a better version of self for a more vibrant vocation and mission.

Due to popular demand, we've recorded an overview of the series for those who couldn't attend the sessions and offering a summary overview to those who did attend. This week, we uncover the second episode in which Father Lou and Michele explore the importance of stewardship of the body. We learn to be grateful for the gift and take responsibility for the physical health of our bodies through movement and exercise. In Session No. 2, Fr. Cameli reflects upon the scripture passages

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

Next weekend, as we celebrate Fathers' Day, we pause to reflect on the gift fathers are to our families. We thank God for how they enrich our lives by their example, their support, their love and their wisdom.

It is also an occasion to honor those who father our parish communities, our priests who minister to us and tend to our needs as pastors. They come to mind as we recall the priest who performed our family marriages, who was at the bedside of a parent, spouse or child close to death, who baptized our children, who heard our confession and whose homilies gave us hope to carry on.

Today, we are given an opportunity to stand by them, as they have stood by us, by giving generously to this weekend's second collection in support of their health and retirement needs. The Priests' Health and Retirement collection is for the benefit of our 411 active and 253 retired priests. We all know how health care costs continue to rise. This year the expenses for health care, nursing and priests' retirement will total \$13 million. This is the only collection for our archdiocesan priests' health and retirement, those ordained to serve in our archdiocesan parishes. It is distinct from the annual collection for religious order priests, sisters and brothers, which was taken up earlier this year.

While our priests begin retirement only at age 70, many choose to stay active. And, many of those who do retire at seventy continue to let us know we can count on them by helping out on weekends in our parishes. Please join me in letting the sons of this archdiocese, who have stepped forward to give their lives in service to us, know that they can count on us. Join me in making a generous contribution to this weekend's second collection. Also, I ask you to consider naming the Priests' Health and Retirement as one of the beneficiaries in your will, something I personally have done.

Each day they stand by us, so let's stand by them now. We can do a lot if we all do our part. As we give thanks to God for our fathers on Fathers' Day, let's say a prayer for our priests, those who father our parishes.

Follow In the Footsteps of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini

Pilgrimage to Italy; Nov. 6-16, 2024

The first United States citizen canonized was St. Frances Xavier Cabrini. Mother Cabrini served Chicago so well, where she lived, worked, and died. A statue of St. Frances, identical to the one in our Cathedral Courtyard, will be dedicated and placed in the courtyard at the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls in Rome on her feast day of Nov. 13.

We'll begin in Milan with visits to her birthplace in Sant'Angelo Lodigiano and other inspiring sites like Codogno, Assisi, the tomb of St. Dominic in Bologna, and, of course, ending in the eternal city of Rome. 
