Dear Sisters and Brothers,

For nearly 100 years, construction has continued on the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. This "hymn in stone" has served as a beacon of our faith to the nearly 1 million who visit it each year and to the millions more who visit and work in our nation's capital. Perhaps you have visited the Shrine yourself. Mary's Shrine, as it is often called, is the largest Roman Catholic Church in North America and is one of the ten largest churches in the world. Yet, 97 years after the laying of its foundation stone in 1920, it remains unfinished.

This year, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has asked our help funding the completion of the Trinity Dome, the last remaining Shrine construction project. This "Crowning Jewel" will be adorned in mosaic and will depict the Most Holy Trinity, the Blessed Virgin Mary as the Immaculate Conception, and a procession of saints who have an association with America and the Basilica. More information on this project can be found at trinitydome.org and/or nationalshrine.org.

We have agreed to do our part in making this project a success by taking up a second collection next weekend. Our goal is to raise \$600,000 to honor the Blessed Mother by completing her Shrine and signifying to all who see it that our country and its people are grateful for her many graces. Thank you in advance for your active support of this initiative.

Stewardship

“We are called as Disciples of Christ to put our total faith in the Lord.”

Today’s Gospel from the Book of Matthew describes what occurred in Tyre and Sidon when Jesus cured the daughter of a Gentile woman. Tyre and Sidon were Gentile cities. The Apostles faithfully followed the Lord wherever He went, just as we are called to do.

There was only one reason that the Lord made this trip (on foot, of course, as that was the only alternative at that time), and that was to cure the daughter of the Gentile woman. Making an effort like that is a sign of Christ’s love, and His understanding of a need. He was also trying to teach His followers, which includes us, how important each individual and her or his faith is.

Jesus’ Apostles found this situation, and perhaps even this entire trip, to be a fruitless and empty gesture, more of a bother than it was worth. They even plead with Jesus to ignore the woman and send her away. They said, “Send her away, for she keeps calling out after us.” However, Jesus is teaching a lesson to each of us, actually two lessons. He does not “send her away” but finally responds, saying “O woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish.”

The two lessons (messages) Jesus provides to us are easily summarized. First, we need to know and understand that Jesus loves us and He is aware of our needs. The second is that when we pray and appeal for help (all the woman finally said was “Lord, help me!”) a key to answered prayers is persistence. She had it, and we need to have it.

We continue with the third of four weeks inviting you to reflect on the liturgy, specifically God's presence in our celebration of Mass.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist

Preparation is something we are familiar with in our daily lives. It is also an essential part of the Mass. The first part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist is spent preparing the altar, the gifts of bread and wine, and the community. The gifts of the community are collected and brought forth—the collection of funds that is the crucial way the parish continues its ministry and the gifts of bread and wine that will become the Body and Blood. This prepares us to receive the source and the summit of our faith. It is from the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist that we find the source and sustenance of our faith. It is in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist that we find the holiness, grace, and love that we aspire to through faith.

The Prayer We Pray

The Eucharistic prayer is when the priest's role as *in Persona Christi* (remember the first article?), comes to the fore. The words the priest prays are offered to God the Father. Notice though, that the priest uses the words, "we humbly implore you." While the priest speaks the words, this is a prayer of the community. The gifts we bring to the table, the altar, are offered for us. We must bring the best we have to offer to the table of the Lord. Our gifts, our time, our treasures are to be put at the service of the Lord, in the Eucharist and in life.

Growing in Faith

The day's readings from the Lectionary offer the priest the foundation from which to preach a homily that pulls from the larger deposit of Scripture and Church teaching. The homily is a way for the priest to share guidance on how to understand salvation and the teaching of Christ. Through the homily we have the opportunity to hear and respond to the call to grow in holiness, to draw nearer to God, to be more faithful as His disciples.

Belief

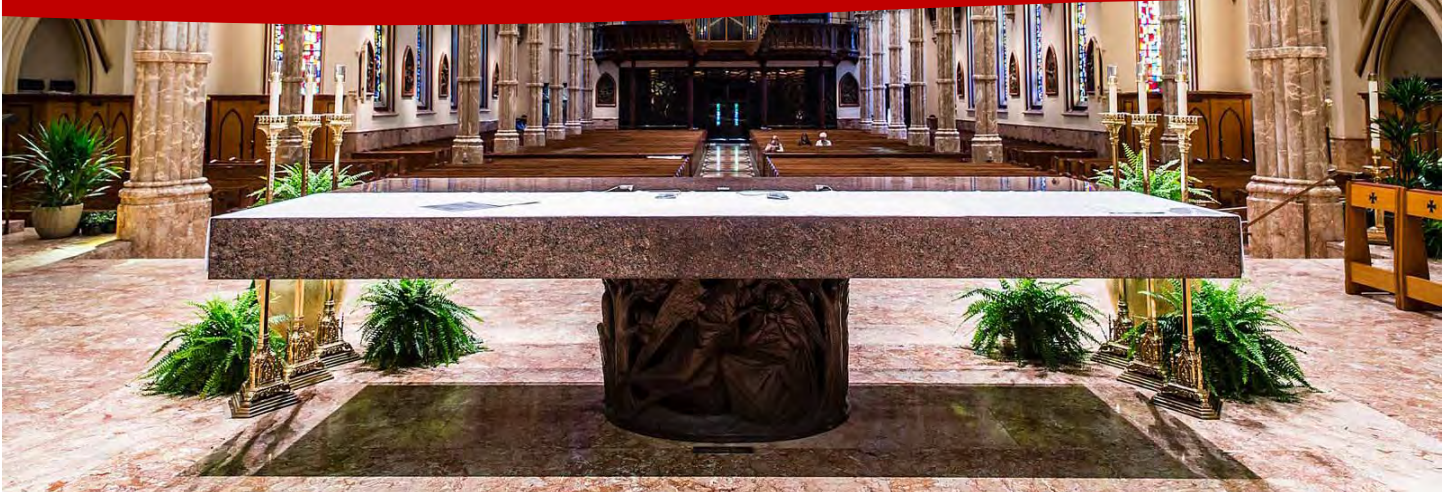
We respond to the Word of God, this time of teaching, with our own words of proclamation. When we speak the Creed, "I believe," we respond with a synopsis of the very essence of our Catholic faith. The Creed is a way to respond to others when they ask what Catholics believe, what we are about. Within this statement of faith is a way to identify God, ourselves, and our hopes for eternity. We find the words of salvation that offer us joyful expectations of the world to come.

The intercessions that follow, the Universal Prayer, conclude the Liturgy of the Word and are a way that we manifest that faith in our God who hears us. We pray for the world, our community, our Church, and ourselves. This progression models how we can approach our own daily prayers.

The Liturgy of the Word models what our daily prayer can be. Take time each day this week, to enter the silence, reflecting on God's Word, and listening to Him speak to you.
