TEN SECRETS TO HAPPINESS

In an interview (July 29, 2014) for the Argentine weekly, *Viva*, Pope Francis weighs in on this topic, submitting his own “Top 10 Tips” for happiness. What are Pope Francis’ tips for happiness, or, as he puts it, “for bringing greater joy to one’s life”?

In presenting these, I will be faithful to his captions, but because his commentary on each one was rather lengthy, I will risk synthesizing his central point in my own words:

1. **Live and let live.**

All of us will live longer and more happily if we stop trying to arrange other peoples’ lives. Jesus challenged us not to judge but to live with the tension and let God and history make the judgments. So live we need to live by own convictions and let others do the same.

2. **Be giving of yourself to others.**

Happiness lies in giving ourselves away. We need to be open and generous because if we withdraw into ourselves we run the risk of becoming self-centered and no happiness will be found there since “stagnant water becomes putrid.”

3. **Proceed calmly.**

Move with kindness, humility, and calm. These are the antithesis of anxiety and distress. Calm never causes high blood pressure. We need to make conscious efforts to never let the moment cause panic and excessive hurry. Rather be late than stressed.

4. **A healthy sense of leisure.**

Never lose the pleasures of art, literature, and playing with children. Remember that Jesus scandalized others with his capacity to enjoy life in all its sensuousness. We don’t live by work alone, no matter how important and meaningful it might be. In heaven there will be no work, only leisure, we need to learn the art and joy of leisure not just to prepare for heaven but to enjoy some of heaven already now.

5. **Sundays should be holidays.**

Workers should have Sundays off because Sunday is for family. Accomplishment, productivity, and speed may not become our most valued commodities or we will begin to take everything for granted, our lives, our health, our families, our friends, those around us, and all the good things in life. That is why God gave us a commandment to keep the Sabbath holy. This is not a lifestyle suggestion, but a commandment as binding as not killing. Moreover, if we are employers, the commandment demands too that we give our employees proper Sabbath-time.

6. **Find innovative ways to create dignified jobs for young people.**

If you want to bless a young person, don’t just tell that person that he or she is wonderful. Don’t just admire youthful beauty and energy. Give a young person your job! Or, at least, work actively to help him or her find meaningful work. This will both bless that young person and bring a special happiness to your own life.

7. **Respect and take care of nature.**

The air we breathe out is the air we will re-inhale. This is true spiritually, psychologically, and ecologically. We can’t be whole and happy when Mother Earth is being stripped of her wholeness. Christ came to save the world, not just the people in the world. Our salvation, like our happiness, is tied to the way we treat the earth. It is immoral to slap another person in the face and so it is immoral too to throw our garbage into the face of Mother Earth.

8. **Stop being negative.**

Needing to talk badly about others indicates low self-esteem. Negative thoughts feed unhappiness and a bad self-image. Positive thoughts feed happiness and healthy self-esteem.

9. **Don’t proselyte, respect other’s beliefs.**

What we cherish and put our faith into grows “by attraction, not by proselytizing.” Beauty is the one thing that no one can argue with. Cherish your values, but always act towards others with graciousness, charity and respect.

10. **Work for peace.**

Peace is more than the absence of war and working for peace means more than not causing disharmony. Peace, like war, must be waged actively by working for justice, equality, and an ever-wider inclusivity in terms of what makes up our family. Waging peace is the perennial struggle to stretch hearts, our own and others, to accept that in God’s house there are many rooms and that all faiths, not least our own, are meant to be a house of prayer for all peoples.

Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord

The Book of Daniel, from which our First Reading is drawn, was written some two centuries before the birth of Christ. This is only significant in that many of the prophets (Daniel is considered one of the major prophets) lived as many as six centuries before Christ. However, regardless the timeline, we need to be moved by and appreciative of the prophecies we find in the Old Testament. In the particular passage in today's reading it states, "The one like a Son of Man received dominion, glory, and kingship."

Today, of course, is the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord, and this reading very much parallels what is portrayed in the Transfiguration. The interesting point within this reading from Daniel, however, is that it refers to the "Son of Man," which is the term Jesus Himself used most often to describe Himself.

We have referenced this fact previously. In fact, the term "Son of Man" occurs 85 times in the Gospels, and in 83 of them it is Jesus who uses the term. (It appears 32 times in Matthew; 15 times in Mark; 26 times in Luke; and 12 times in John, and it is in John where it is used twice by someone other than Jesus.)

The important point for us is that Jesus calling Himself the Son of Man explains that He was born of a woman, and He shares in our earthly conditions and sufferings. That fact should make us want to embrace Him as our Savior, our Friend, and our Shepherd even more.



For the next four weeks, we invite you to reflect on the liturgy and specifically God's presence in our celebration of Mass. Each week we will take one section of the Mass and look at it more closely. Let's begin at the beginning..

The Introductory Rites

Often this part of the Mass is overlooked, yet, this time of the Mass is full of meaning and significance..

St. Augustine wrote, "He who sings prays twice." We gather first together to join in song. The words of the opening hymn will often give us a hint at the day's readings. By entering into song with the choir or cantor, we lift these words as a prayer and take our first actions as a community. Whether God gifted you with a great voice or not, God wishes to hear your song!

Community

Community, now that is a crucial part of our liturgy. When we gather together to worship, we are the body of Christ. "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them." These words from Matthew's Gospel (18:20) speak to the fact that one of the places God is present in the Holy Mass is within the community that joins together in prayer, worship, and celebration of the Eucharist. The Church teaches the priest is "in persona Christi" as he acts in the person of Christ in the celebration of the Eucharist. Throughout the community, within and surrounding you, is God's presence.

Mercy and Glory

After gathering in our opening song, we next join our voices in asking for mercy and forgiveness. The penitential act does not replace the Sacrament of Reconciliation; it is a time to reflect on when we fall short of the call to holiness, the call to be Christ for the world. "Lord, have mercy. Christ, have mercy. Lord, have mercy." These words remind us of the need each of us have for God's mercy, the call to be merciful to others, and to recognize where God's mercy has manifested in the world.

In a beautiful testimony to the power of God's mercy, we follow it with the Gloria. This song of praise and worship is when we turn our voices to join with the heavenly voices. In our daily prayers we are taught to offer prayers of praise, worship, thanksgiving, and intentions. The Gloria brings all these together, lifting them as a communal moment of joy and grace.


Collect

The Introductory Rites conclude with the Collect. This prayer is a moment when we pause, first with silence, then with the priest's words offering a prayer to help to dispose us to hear the Word of God in the Liturgy of the Word that follows.

These first few minutes of the Mass are a beautiful time to raise our voices in song, join in prayer, and manifest God's presence with one another. When you enter the sanctuary for Mass, take a few moments of prayer to prepare for Mass so that when that first hymn echoes from the organ you are ready to fully, actively, and with great joy enter into the celebration of the Mass
