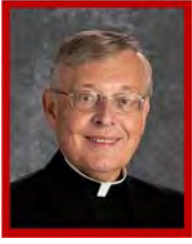
Mission Statement

Message from the Rector



Dear People of God,

The January 2014 *Columbia* magazine had a marvelous article entitled, “The Gospel of Life According to Pope Francis.” This article traces Pope Francis’ key pro-life statements beginning as Cardinal Bergoglio and including comments since his Papacy started in March 2013.

During his 15 years as Archbishop of Buenos Aires to the present time, Pope Francis has always defended the dignity of human life from the moment of conception to natural death. Pope Francis has consistently had primary concern for the most vulnerable and defenseless human beings including children (born and unborn), the disabled and the elderly. We have seen this lived out on live television—inviting children into the sanctuary and kissing the elderly and sick.

On Abortion

The moral problem with abortion is of a pre-religious nature because the generic code of the person is present at the moment of conception. This means that a human being already exists. I separate the issue of abortion from any religious concept. It is a scientific problem. To not allow further progress in the development of a being that already has the entire genetic code of a human being is not ethical. The right to life is the first human right. Abortion means killing someone who cannot defend himself.

Be witness and diffusers of the “culture of life.” Your being Catholic entails a greater responsibility: first of all to yourselves, through a commitment consistent with your Christian vocation; and then to contemporary culture, by contributing to recognizing the transcendent dimensions of human life, the imprint of God’s creative work, from the moment of its conception. This is a task of the new evangelization that often requires going against the tide and paying for it personally. The Lord is also counting on you to spread the “Gospel of Life.”

In a *Peanuts* cartoon, Linus is watching television. Into the family room storms Lucy. Putting her fist right into his face, Lucy demands that Linus change the channel to what she wants to watch.

“What makes you think you can just walk right in here and take over?” Linus wants to know.

As Lucy takes her place in front of the television, Linus turns away and looks at his own fingers, and says, “Why can’t you guys get organized like that?”

All of us together must take our fingers and not make a fist, but rather hold hands and reach out with open hands to a world in need of love and forgiveness.

And, together, we must work and pray to bring an end to abortion.

I have dealt with women considering an abortion and shown compassion to women who have had an abortion.

The word “compassion” comes from the root meaning “to suffer with.” We must show compassion—and do not judge! We certainly pray for an end to abortion, but we must show compassion and not judge. God always forgives!

We are challenged to see the world differently through the eyes of Christ.

At the same time, the Church does offer forgiveness and healing for women who have had an abortion. Project Rachel is a sensitive, private, free and confidential experience with a network of specially trained priests and caring people who understand the painful road back from abortion. Tomorrow marks the 45th anniversary of *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*. All life is sacred and a gift from God. May we pray for an end to abortion and love this world back into life.

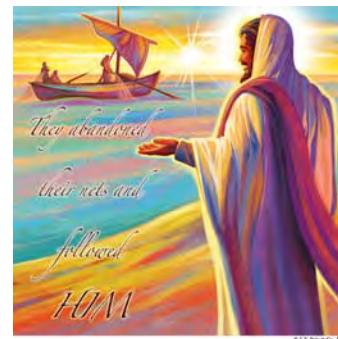

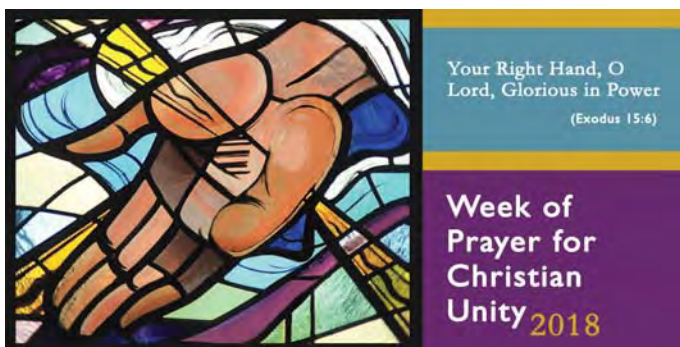
Liturgy



“Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord” (James 5:14).

Many of us, perhaps, remember a time when this sacrament was celebrated only for those who were dying. However any illness of serious nature can be a legitimate reason to celebrate the sacrament. What’s more, the sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after the anointing but becomes ill once again, or if, during the same illness, the person’s condition becomes more serious. Any person over the age of reason (age seven) preparing for surgery is encouraged to contact one of the priests to receive the sacrament.

This sacrament will be celebrated with a special Liturgy for the Sick on Saturday, February 10th, at 5:15 p.m. Mass.

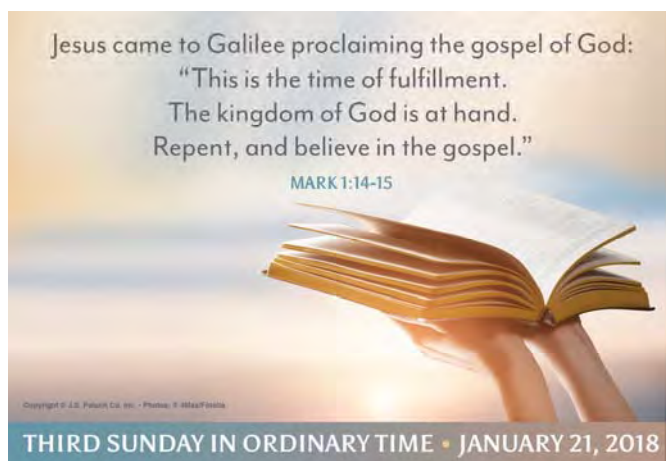
Proclaimers of the Word of God

New Catholic School Scholarship Opportunity 2018/19 School Year



Through the "Invest in Kids Act," the state of Illinois has created a new way to fund scholarships for children from low-income households who want to

attend private schools. This program provides an opportunity for more students to receive a quality Catholic education. The tax credit scholarships offered through this program could cover **up to 100 percent of tuition and fees** for eligible, low-income students. Not all families will be eligible for the new scholarships, but we want to make sure all families are aware of the program.

Resurrection Cross

Perhaps the most striking feature of the Cathedral, the Resurrection Cross, created by artist Ivo Demetz, in 1969, is a powerful interpretation of this universal sign of Christianity. The wooden Cross depicts Christ as he is today and always - not a figure in agony, but the risen and triumphant Lord who died for our salvation.
