

Message from the Rector

Dear People of God,

In the summer of 1983, I was working on my Master's Degree in Liturgy at the University of Notre Dame. One of my fellow graduate students asked the professor: "Why is it sometimes difficult to love others, or believe God is present in our lives?" The professor paused and asked us: "Did anyone of you ever have a toothache?" While pondering the relevance of our professor's question, one of my classmates replied that he had, about six months prior. The professor continued: "Whom were you thinking about when you had your toothache?" Without a moment's hesitation, the student answered, "Me!"



The professor sat back and said, "That's your answer. That is why people sometimes find it hard to trust, love and believe in God—not because they don't want to reach out in love, or don't believe in God's love and presence—but because they are hurting too much." When you're hurting inside, due to loneliness, failure, confusion, discouragement or rejection, all you can think about is the pain.

How beautifully this story connects with The Emmaus story found in Luke's Gospel (chapter 24). St. Luke has given us a story, but it is not only a story about two disciples long ago. It's a story about each one of us and our journey with the Lord—your journey and my journey. Yet, so often, we are like those two disciples in our relationship with the Lord. At times, we too may feel defeated—without hope, dreams or direction in life. We may feel like packing it up or throwing in the towel. Sometimes we search for happiness in the all the wrong places.

The very moments of failure, doubt, rejection, anger and sadness can be a doorway for God to work in our lives. I think I have discovered the Secret of Life. The Secret of Life is this— "To hunger is good."

We all carry a cross. In life, there is always a storm before the rainbow—there is always the cross before new life. It was true for Jesus and it is true for us. The two disciples recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread and returned to the community. They stayed faithful. They found strength in the gathering of the community of believers. We too find strength in community if we strive to be faithful—around the Table of the Lord. By relying on the unconditional love of God and reaching out to each other we will surely experience the presence of God. And remember—never give up!

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

No Stunt Man for Jesus

Today's first and second readings seem to contradict each other. In the Acts of the Apostles, Paul and Barnabas remind the other disciples that they would "undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God" (Acts 14:22). But in the second reading from Revelation, John says there will be "no more . . . mourning, wailing or pain" (Revelation 21:4). These two sides of the Kingdom show how real our faith is. Life is frequently contradictory. A woman in labor moves from pain to joy in seconds after her child is born. She doesn't forget the pain, but knows it is necessary for the joy of new birth. Only the artist knows how much effort and pain went into the creation of a painting, sculpture, or symphony. Married couples know that their love is measured as much by the sacrifices they make as by the joy they receive. This also explains how difficult it is for the wealthy to get into the kingdom of God. If everything comes easily to you, if you never have to work for anything, you may not be capable of the sacrifices that true love entails. Some may have had life so easy, they don't know how to make the effort it takes to love God or people. And some who worked hard to acquire wealth don't understand the deeper joy that comes from sharing with others.

That's why Jesus in the Gospel talks of his coming death on the cross as the way that God will glorify him. Even God does not do things the easy way. Jesus didn't send a stunt man to take his place on the cross. The cushy jobs went to the angels who announced the birth of the Savior (Luke 1:26-32), or told the women at the tomb that he was risen (Luke 24:4-7). It was God who was born in poverty, in a time of high infant mortality (even higher when Herod tried to kill the Child). It was God who suffered, from the Agony in the Garden through the Crucifixion.

So when Jesus tells us to love one another as he has loved us, he knows what it cost. And he also knew that his death on the cross would be the beginning of a way of love that will eventually lead to "no more death or mourning, wailing or pain." We're not there yet, but we know we are not alone in our suffering for "God himself will always be with them" (Revelation 21:3).

Mac, was recognized both locally and internationally for ground-breaking programs and solutions in the prevention and treatment of issues concerning alcohol and substance abuse. In 1975 he co-founded Chicago's Haymarket Center whose mission is to help those affected by addiction issues in their recovery. Haymarket continues to grow and develop, following the principles of this humble man.

Fr. Mac began the Memorial Day Mass to recognize, with gratitude, our brave military who valiantly served their country and also to offer prayers for those past and present who struggle with alcohol and substance abuse. Fr. Mac died December 31, 2004 after 68 years of service. His Mass continues.

This is Your Church - You Are the Church 101

“You are the Church. You are the Body of Christ” ~ Fr. Greg Sakowicz

We are blessed that Holy Name Cathedral is such a vibrant and active parish in the heart of downtown Chicago. The extent of our engagement as a parish community can be seen in the rich programs and activities conducted throughout the year at the Cathedral.

These programs and activities are largely developed by laity and hosted through the parish’s spiritual, service and social organizations.

In the latter part of 2018, Holy Name Cathedral conducted a survey of parishioners to measure their level of awareness and interest in our current programs, and to gather ideas for new programs or changes to existing programs. Over 350 parishioners completed the survey and we are thankful for the time they devoted to this task.

Holy Name Cathedral staff and the lay leadership of our parish organizations have dedicated time to reviewing the survey results, organizing the ideas offered and prioritizing how best to act upon the survey findings.

Here are a few of the observations that surfaced when reviewing the Parish Survey findings:

Parishioners are highly satisfied with how well the Cathedral:

- makes parishioners feel welcome in the parish,
- communicates with parishioners,
- invites parishioners to participate in programs and activities,
- fosters spiritual growth, and
- provides opportunities for parishioners to gather socially.

Parishioners expressed an interest in expanding existing spiritual, social and service programs and activities to make them attractive to families and single professionals. A specific interest was expressed in having more activities that would be attractive to parish members between the ages of 35 – 55.

We will be sharing results and insights from the parish survey here in the bulletin and on our website, including reflections on what it means for us together to be Christ’s church in the world.

We are excited to share the survey findings and how they are being addressed in serving the interests of the parishioners of Holy Name Cathedral.
