First Wednesday of Advent Is 25: 6-10a, Mt 15: 29-37

As we start the Advent season, the reading and gospel are reminders of how generous, loving and forgiving God is as we prepare for his greatest gift, his only son Jesus.

In the first reading, Isaiah provides an image of a mountain top as a representation of God's kingdom, appearing as a kingdom of riches and plenty. The reading takes steps to show us that all are welcome in God's kingdom indicating that the barriers (or veils as indicated in the reading) that may exist on earth are stripped away. Any pain or suffering experienced will be stripped away as a kind, merciful God also provides comfort and healing. It is a place intended for everyone. We also see Jesus' generosity in Matthew's gospel where we follow Jesus to the mountain top with crowds of

ople following him there. The crowd consists of a variety of people with physical ailments including ndness, deafness, mute or other physical limitations. He has compassion for the people as they concurd Jesus seeking relief while He tends to their ailments. I think about how his anticipated coming d nourish us (through the multiplication of fish and loaves for the people).
