

Christmas: More than a day

Our secular world tells us that once Dec. 25 passes, we look forward to the next holiday: New Year's Day, or



in some stores you walk into, Valentine's Day. But in our Catholic tradition, we don't only celebrate 'days,' such as feast days and solemnities, we also celebrate seasons.

As the Gloria rang from the heavens to announce to the shepherds in the field the birth of the Christ child, we continue to join in the angelic hymn since Christmas is more than a day.

We begin our Christmas season with the Christmas Octave. An "octave" is an eight-day celebration where the solemnness and joy of the first day is prolonged. The Octave of Christmas stems from Dec. 25 to Jan 1. By celebrating eight days of the same reality, the Incarnation of God in the flesh, we are reminded for eight days of the joy, mystery and reality of what has occurred. God has visited his people and walks with us.

However, we don't just celebrate the same day over and over again. Each passing day during the octave builds to the eighth day, when it reaches its climax. During the Christmas Octave, the eighth day is the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God.

By recognizing the role of Mary in our history of salvation, we celebrate a simple woman from Nazareth who said yes despite the fears and the unknown. We build up each day from Christmas to Jan. 1, aware that without Mary, salvation would not have come, our Savior would not have been born of flesh and he would not have been able to redeem what he has assumed (St. Athanasius).

In this Octave of Christmas, let us truly immerse ourselves in the reality of what we celebrate, that God has become man and walks the journey of life with us and He is Emmanuel - God with us. As we move throughout this week, let us pause and rejoice, for each day this week has the same solemnness as Christmas morning. Keep the Christmas music playing, keep the decorations up, keep the cookies on the table, because the season of Christmas has only just begun.

Takes up the regular Sunday collection, the occasional special second collection, and hands out the weekly bulletin. But most importantly, the Ushers make our visitors and parishioners feel welcome and at home at Holy Name Cathedral for every liturgy we celebrate.

Docent Committee

Made up of parishioners who are passionate about the history of the Cathedral and our parish. Each member is trained to give tours to parishioners and guests that strengthen their spirituality and connection to our Faith Community.

Altar Server

- The amount transferred directly to charity does not generate taxable income, which may reduce your annual income level. This may help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax.



Our New Parking Garage is Open!

Free parking with validation

We are blessed to have a brand-new parking garage right across the street with free parking for Cathedral Masses and other Cathedral events. This new parking garage has 225 parking spaces, a nearly 20% increase over our old lot. The entrance and exit are located at 14 W. Superior Street, between Dearborn and State Street. You may park on either Lower Level One or Lower Level Two.

For the rest of December, we will have both parking areas

- · Our new parking garage at One Chicago Square enter and exit on Superior Street.
- The Loyola University parking lot (20 W. Chicago) on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, Saturdays, and after Sundays, (through 12/31/21)





Validation is only available on Cathedral campus

Validation machines for Cathedral Masses are in the Vestibule. We will provide two (2) hours free parking for Cathedral Masses with a validated ticket. You can validate your ticket before or after Mass. For Cathedral meetings/programs, validation machines will be available onsite at your event.

This is a self-park garage. There are no security guards nor is valet parking available.

Please use safety first:

- 1. Drive slowly
- 2. Watch for two-way traffic
- 3. Be alert for pedestrians

IMPORTANT! Please be sure your vehicle exits the parking lot within the validated time on your ticket. This is important for people who are arriving for the next Mass. If you do remain beyond the validation period, there is a \$100 fee (payable in the garage) in order to exit the parking garage. There is no overnight parking. Cars remaining overnight will be subject to towing.

Prayers

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. First, it may be helpful to understand what happens when you ask that your intention join to a Mass. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received. An intention can also be directed to a cause, such as an increase of vocations or respect for life.

Usually, a single intention is attached to a given Mass. But it is also possible to gather several intentions in one Mass with exactly the same effect. At Holy Name Cathedral, we celebrate single-intention Masses as well as gathered-intention Masses. You may find it more convenient to request one of the two weekly gathered-intention Masses (Wednesdays at 8:00 a.m. and Fridays at 12 p.m.). If you do, we can accommodate your request sooner, and it is the same as a singleintention Mass.

Due to the sacramental nature of the Mass Intentions, we cannot accept requests for famous people like actors, musicians, politicians, and other celebrities. Also, we are not able to include pets. Thank you for your cooperation.


