we have been through this Gospel passage. More importantly, how many times has this marvelous Gospel story of Jesus' Baptism been through us?

The Baptism of Our Lord must also make all of us reflect upon our Baptism. What does it mean to be a baptized disciple of the Lord? What difference should it make as I live my life at home, school or in the workplace? How does my Baptism shape my attitudes regarding relationships in terms of loving, giving and forgiving?

I share with you this marvelous story which connects Jesus' Baptism by John and our Baptism. We need to continually love this world back into life! Read...and pass it on.....

Two friends were walking through the desert. During some point of the journey, they had an argument; and one friend slapped the other one in the face. The one who got slapped was hurt, but without saying anything, wrote in the sand:

"Today my best friend slapped me in the face."

# **Our New Baptismal Font**

#### On the cover

Every Catholic Church, along with an altar and crucifix, has a baptismal font. Each baptismal font is unique. Baptism is the gateway Sacrament into the life of the Church and makes those who are immersed in their waters sons and daughters of God, and co-heirs to eternal life. Our baptismal font, which was installed during the Spring of 2020 in the Sanctuary, is in the shape of an octagon, with the 8 sides symbolizing the 8 days of creation. We began using this new font the weekend of August 15, 2021, delayed by COVIDrestrictions on use of the same water for baptism. Now every child, and adult who will be baptized will enter into God's divine life in this sacred font. There is no beginning or end to the love of God when one enters the waters of rebirth. Our new font was donated in the memory and honor of long-time parishioner, Dr. Mario V. Santangelo, through his estate gift to the Cathedral.

All are welcome to attend a special Cathedral concert in honor of our newly renovated Flentrop organ. David Jonies, our Holy Name Cathedral Director of Music, will play along with The Chicago Brass Quintet, led by Ross Beacraft.

The free concert begins at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 11. No advance registration is required. All attendees must wear a face mask.

Located high above the Cathedral in the gallery, the Flentrop organ, with its 5,558 pipes, is the largest mechanical action organ in Chicago (and thirdlargest organ overall).

The organ recently underwent an extensive renovation that was funded by our generous donors to the To Teach Who Christ Is appeal. Come to a beautiful night of music and enjoy the fruits of their generosity.

# Why We Baptize

As we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord this weekend, it is an opportunity for us to renew our awareness of baptism in our life of



faith, but also personally, what does it mean that I am baptized, and have been baptized?

Baptism is the gateway Sacrament and the first step in one's life in Christ. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, infant baptism has been a practice of the Church since the 2nd century (CCC, 1252). As Christianity began spreading and more and more people were converting from pagan practices, entire households would be baptized, as recorded in Philip's interaction with the Eunuch in Acts 8. As our Christian theology began to be formulated, there was another reason for infant baptism, and that is the removal of original sin.

Original sin is the first sin of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden when they ate the fruit of the tree of Good and Evil. Since then, our wounded human nature to disobey God has been passed down from generation to generation. Through Baptism, original sin is removed, and all our sins are forgiven, and we are restored to the original grace that God had intended for Adam and Eve. Though we still sin after we are baptized due to human weakness, we have been redeemed in Christ's death and resurrection, which Baptism is an initiation into new life.

In baptism we become a new creation (cf. 2 Corinthians 5:17). Baptism removes the stain of original sin from our souls, restores us to right relationship with God and makes us a child of God, opens the path to the other Sacraments of the Faith, and joins us to the mystical body of Christ, the Church. Baptism also allows us to share in Christ's priesthood, kingship, and prophetic power.

Baptism is to be understood as the removal of the stain

of original sin, and also making us a new creation in Christ, allowing the gift of God's grace to flood our lives and help us grow strong in the faith. Baptism is a gift, and it is arguably, next to giving birth to the child, the next greatest gift parents can give to their children because they bring them to the font of eternal life, the font of grace, the font from which a friendship with Jesus Christ is found and nourished.

# Join Us To Celebrate the Feast of Santo Niño

### Sunday, January 16 at 3:30pm

The Cathedral Filipino Network (CFN) will celebrate the annual **Feast of Santo Niño** with the venerated statues of the Child Jesus of Prague and the Santo Niño de Cebu on Sunday, January 16. The devotion to the Child Jesus is ubiquitous and observed with reverence around the world. Santo Niño de Cebu was a gift from Ferdinand Magellan on April 14, 1521 to Queen Humamay, wife of Rajah (king) Humabon. This event was the beginning of 500 years of Christianity in the Philippines. The image of the Santo Niño is the oldest surviving Catholic relic in the Philippines, along with the Magellan cross.

In Cebu City, the Santo Niño Festival routinely attracted up to 15 million people from all over the world in pre-COVID times. This is preceded the night before by a celebratory street dancing called Sinulog, a ritual prayer-dance that honors the Señor Santo Niño, which is housed at the Basilica Minore del Santo Niño in Cebu City. CFN observed a modified Sinulog after Mass at the HNC Parish Center during the pre-COVID 2019 celebration.



At Holy Name, the Feast of Santo Niño includes Illinois and Indiana devotees, who bring their Santo Niño statues for

blessings during the Mass. Rev. Louis Cameli will be the main presider at the Santo Niño Mass per tradition. This year's celebration is subdued due to the surge in COVID-19 Omicron variant infections and precludes children's participation.

# Four Common Estate-**Planning Myths Debunked**



Did you know that nearly 70 percent of Americans will spend a lifetime working to care for themselves and their loved ones — only to allow their

state law to decide how their assets and property should be distributed because they didn't execute a will?

Make your estate plan a priority. Here are a few common myths about the estate planning process.

#### Myth 1: I don't own a lot, so I don't need a will.

Wills and estate planning aren't just for the wealthy — they are for everyone. If you want your assets to go to the loved ones or causes you cherish most, then drafting a will is an effective first step.

### Myth 2: My family will 'Do the right thing' and I've already told my pastor.

Even if your family and pastor know what you want, they don't get to make decisions for you if you pass away without a will. You must have a valid will document that complies with your state's requirements. If you pass away without a valid will, the court will divide your estate according to your state's intestacy laws. Not only can court proceedings be long and costly, you might want your assets distributed differently than the court would distribute them.

You also need to take into consideration possible scenarios. For example, what if the person you hoped to receive your assets passes first, or what if that person is no longer capable of making his or her own decisions? Be sure to have alternative plans for your assets in case circumstances change. An estate planning attorney will be able to help you consider these potential issues.

### Myth 3: My assets are owned jointly, so I don't need a will.

While being married does make dividing your assets seem a bit easier, there are a lot of things that can change that. What if you and your spouse pass away together? What if there are certain things that you'd prefer to go to your children? These situations come up frequently, and without an estate plan, they could leave vour finances in disarray.

#### Myth 4: I made a will 20 years ago, so I'm done.

A will should not be made and forgotten; it should be reviewed periodically and revised as circumstances change. An excellent will written years ago may no longer be appropriate or contain potentially problematic language due to changes in legislation.

Also, a will isn't the only tool you need. A will only takes effect after you pass away. There are other situations to consider during your lifetime. For example, if you get sick and need someone to manage your financial affairs, or you need someone to talk to your doctors about your health care options, your will won't help you. In other words, executing a will is a great first step, but you will need additional estate planning documents in place if you want to give yourself and your family as many protections and benefits as possible.

# **Our New Parking Garage is Open!**

### Free parking with validation

We are blessed to have a brand-new parking garage right across the street with free parking for Cathedral Masses and other Cathedral events. This new parking garage has 225 parking spaces, a nearly 20% increase over our old lot. The entrance and exit are located at 14 W. Superior Street, between Dearborn and State Street. You may park on either Lower Level One or Lower Level Two.

### As of January 1, 2022

The Loyola University parking lot located on Chicago Avenue is no longer available. We are deeply grateful for the generosity of Loyola University for sharing this space with us for nearly three years. They are genuinely great neighbors, extending support to us as we went through this interim period without a parking lot!





#### Validation is only available on Cathedral campus

Validation machines for Cathedral Masses are in the Vestibule. We will provide two (2) hours free parking for Cathedral Masses with a validated ticket. You can validate your ticket before or after Mass. For Cathedral meetings/programs, validation machines will be available onsite at your event.

This is a self-park garage. There are no security guards nor is valet parking available.

### Please use safety first:

- 1. Drive slowly
- 2. Watch for two-way traffic
- 3. Be alert for pedestrians

Only insert your parking ticket into the machine one time. If you insert the ticket twice, it will cancel your validation and you will not be able to use it to exit the garage.

IMPORTANT! Please be sure your vehicle exits the parking lot within the validated time on your ticket (e.g. two hours for Masses). This is important for people who are arriving for the next Mass. If you do remain beyond the validation period, there is a \$100 fee (payable in the garage) in order to exit the parking garage. There is no overnight parking. Cars remaining overnight will be subject to towing.

### What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. First, it may be helpful to understand what happens when you ask that your intention join to a Mass. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received. An intention can also be directed to a cause, such as an increase of vocations or respect for life.

Usually, a single intention is attached to a given Mass. But it is also possible to gather several intentions in one Mass with exactly the same effect. At Holy Name Cathedral, we celebrate single-intention Masses as well as gathered-intention Masses. You may find it more convenient to request one of the two weekly gathered-intention Masses (Wednesdays at 8:00 a.m. and Fridays at 12 p.m.). If you do, we can accommodate your request sooner, and it is the same as a singleintention Mass.

Due to the sacramental nature of the Mass Intentions. we cannot accept requests for famous people like actors, musicians, politicians, and other celebrities. Also, we are not able to include pets. Thank you for your cooperation.


