Reflections from the Rector



Our Christmas Season is completed and we are back in Ordinary Time in the liturgical calendar. The January winds howl and we wonder will spring ever arrive.

COVID-19 continues to spike and we pray for an end to the pandemic. I share the following wonderful story

by Elizabeth Gilbert which may change our attitude and perspective. Keep reading and please know God is with us and God will see us through.....

"Some years ago, I was stuck on a crosstown bus in New York City during rush hour. Traffic was barely moving. The bus was filled with cold, tired people who were deeply irritated with one another, with the world itself. Two men barked at each other about a shove that might or might not have been intentional. A pregnant woman got on, and nobody offered her a seat. Rage was in the air; no mercy would be found here.

But as the bus approached Seventh Avenue, the driver got on the intercom. "Folks," he said, "I know you have had a rough day and you are frustrated. I can't do anything about the weather or traffic, but here is what I can do. As each one of you get off the bus, I will reach out my hand to you. As you walk by, drop your troubles into the palm of my hand, okay? Don't take your problems home to your families tonight, just leave them with me. My route goes right by the Hudson River, and when I drive by there later, I will open the window and throw your troubles in the water."

It was as if a spell had lifted. Everyone burst out laughing. Faces gleamed with surprised delight. People who had been pretending for the past hour not to notice each other's existence were suddenly grinning at each other thinking, is this guy serious?

Oh, he was serious.

At the next stop, just as promised, the driver reached out his hand, palm up, and waited. One by one, all the exiting commuters placed their hand just above his and mimed the gesture of dropping something into his palm. Some people laughed as they did this, some teared up but everyone did it. The driver repeated the

same lovely ritual at the next stop, too. And the next. All the way to the river.

We live in a hard world, my friends. Sometimes it is extra difficult to be a human being. Sometimes you have a bad day. Sometimes you have a bad day that lasts for several years. You struggle and fail. You lose jobs, money, friends, faith, and love. You witness horrible events unfolding in the news, and you become fearful and withdrawn. There are times when everything seems cloaked in darkness. You long for the light but don't know where to find it.



What if you are the light?



But what if you are the light? What if you are the very agent of illumination that a dark situation begs for? That's what this bus driver taught me, that anyone can be the light, at any moment. This guy wasn't some big power player. He wasn't a spiritual leader. He wasn't some media-savvy influencer. He was a bus driver, one of society's most invisible workers. But he possessed real power, and he used it beautifully for our benefit.

When life feels especially grim, or when I feel particularly powerless in the face of the world's troubles, I think of this man and ask myself, What can I do, right now, to be the light? Of course, I can't personally end all wars, or solve global warming, or transform vexing people into entirely different creatures. I definitely can't control traffic. But I do have some influence on everyone I brush up against, even if we never speak or learn each other's name.

No matter who you are, or where you are, or how mundane or tough your situation may seem, I believe you can illuminate your world. In fact, I believe this is the only way the world will ever be illuminated, one bright act of grace at a time, all the way to the river."

On Our Cover

Fr. Greg's Chalice

In today's Gospel, we hear about Jesus' first miracle. The servants are instructed by Mary, his mother, to "Do whatever he tells you." (John 2:3-5). Jesus told the servants to fill the jars with water. He ordered them to draw some out and take it to the master of the banquet, who was in charge of food and drink. The master was unaware of Jesus' turning the water in the jars into wine.

The chalice is a sacred vessel that holds the wine to be used in the Eucharistic celebration, wine that will be consecrated and become the Blood of Christ. The chalice recalls the cup that Jesus used during the Last Supper.

Many priests have a chalice given to them on a special occasion. Fr. Greg received his chalice as a gift from his mother on May 5, 1979, at his ordination as a priest. This picture was taken during the 40th anniversary of his ordination in 2019 where Dee Sakowicz proudly celebrated with her son, family and many, many parishioners and friends. Just eight short months later, Fr. Greg lost his mother, and to this day, misses her so very much.



Catholic Illuminations

Anything but Ordinary

Last Monday, following the Baptism of the Lord, we began a new liturgical season. Our liturgical year, a “Year of Grace,” begins each year on the first Sunday of Advent. Following Advent, is the Christmas season, which extends from the Vigil of the Nativity of the Lord (Christmas Eve) to the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. After the Christmas season, we enter Ordinary Time.



There are 34 weeks of Ordinary Time that are broken into two seasons. The first one follows the Christmas season and concludes with the beginning of Lent. The second one follows Easter and concludes with the beginning of Advent.

The second cycle of Ordinary Time after Easter is the longest liturgical season each year. The first cycle of Ordinary Time lasts only about five to eight weeks because Easter and Ash Wednesday are movable feasts, so the length of this cycle changes each year.

Each of our liturgical seasons have a unique focus to our salvation: Advent: preparing for the coming of the Messiah; Christmas: the Incarnation of God in the flesh; Lent: reflecting on our sinfulness and need of a savior; Easter: Christ’s victory over sin and death that he shares with us through baptism, and Ordinary Time: the fullness of the salvific plan of God. Ordinary Time is meant to allow us to focus more intently on the mysteries of our Faith, and continue on the journey of becoming Christ for others.

The liturgical color of Ordinary Time is green, a symbol of hope. We enter this season with hearts full of hope as we begin to understand more deeply why Jesus came among us as man and learn about the promise of salvation through Him. We begin to understand more deeply the love that God has for us as we hear in the Scripture readings of miracles, healings and teachings

that draw us more closely to the heart of our Lord. As we enter this cycle of Ordinary Time, this year concluding March 1, since Ash Wednesday is March 2, let us enter this season with hope, knowing God is with us and always revealing His love for us in his Son, Jesus Christ.

Join Us To Celebrate the Feast of Santo Niño

Sunday, January 16 at 3:30pm

The Cathedral Filipino Network (CFN) will celebrate the annual **Feast of Santo Niño** with the venerated statues of the Child Jesus of Prague and the Santo Niño de Cebu on Sunday, January 16. The devotion to the Child Jesus is ubiquitous and observed with reverence around the world. Santo Niño de Cebu was a gift from Ferdinand Magellan on April 14, 1521 to Queen Humamay, wife of Rajah (king) Humabon. This event was the beginning of 500 years of Christianity in the Philippines. It is the oldest surviving relic in the Philippines, along with the Magellan cross.

In Cebu City, the Santo Niño Festival routinely attracted up to 15 million people from all over the world in pre-COVID times. This is preceded the night before by a celebratory street dancing called Sinulog, a ritual prayer-dance that honors the Señor Santo Niño, which is housed at the Basilica Minore del Santo Niño in Cebu City.

At Holy Name, the Feast of Santo Niño includes Illinois and Indiana devotees, who bring their Santo Niño statues for blessings during the Mass. Rev. Louis Cameli will be the main presider at the Santo Niño Mass per tradition. This year’s celebration is subdued due to the surge in COVID-19 Omicron variant infections and precludes children’s participation.

Do you know who is the first canonized Saint of the Philippines?



Lorenzo Ruiz (1594-1637) was known by many titles. Husband, father, calligrapher, sacristan, catechist, missionary, martyr, and now Saint. Traveling with others to a neighboring country where it was illegal to preach, they were arrested, imprisoned, tortured, and martyred by hanging upside down. His last words were, "I am Catholic and wholeheartedly accept death for God. Had I a thousand lives, all these to Him shall I offer. Do with me as you please." His feast day is Sept. 28.



Please Consider Making a QCD Gift to Holy Name Cathedral

Jesus told us "whatever you do for the least of my brothers, you do for me." Every day we have the opportunity to see the face of Jesus in others and be the face of Jesus to others.

Making a gift from your IRA can benefit you and our Cathedral. An IRA charitable rollover, also known as a qualified charitable distribution (QCD), allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free.

There are three main benefits of giving with a QCD:

- If you are 72 years old or older, the amount you transfer can satisfy all or part of your required minimum distribution.
- The amount transferred directly to charity does not generate taxable income, which may reduce your annual income level. This may help lower your Medicare premiums and decrease the amount of Social Security that is subject to tax.
- Your gift will be immediately used, allowing you to see the impact of your gift now.



Our New Parking Garage is Open!


Free parking with validation

We are blessed to have a brand-new parking garage right across the street with free parking for Cathedral Masses and other Cathedral events. The entrance and exit are located at 14 W. Superior Street, between Dearborn and State Street. You may park on either Lower Level One or Lower Level Two.

Validation is only available on Cathedral campus

Validation machines for Cathedral Masses are in the Vestibule. We will provide two (2) hours free parking for Cathedral Masses with a validated ticket. You can validate your ticket before or after Mass. For Cathedral meetings/programs, validation machines will be available onsite at your event.

This is a self-park garage. There are no security guards nor is valet parking available.



How long can I park

We offer two hours of free parking for any of our masses (exceptions may be made for holiday masses like Christmas and Easter). If you are attending an event or meeting in our Parish Center or Rectory, arrangements will be made by a staff member to provide the appropriate validation time in line with the length of your event/meeting.

IMPORTANT! Please be sure your vehicle exits the parking lot within the validated time on your ticket (e.g. two hours for Masses). This is important for people who are arriving for the next Mass. **If you do remain beyond the validation period, there is a \$100 fee (payable in the garage) in order to exit the parking garage.** There is no overnight parking. Cars remaining overnight will be subject to towing.

What happens if I lose my parking ticket?

If you lose your parking ticket, you will be responsible to pay the \$100 fee to exit the parking garage. When you approach the exit gate on LL1, you will press the button to issue a Lost Ticket. Then re-insert the ticket and use a credit card to pay the fee. Holy Name Cathedral is not able to provide tickets or waive the fee.

Only insert your parking ticket into the validation machine one time.
If you insert the ticket twice or more, it will cancel your validation and you will not be able to use it to exit the garage.

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention. First, it may be helpful to understand what happens when you ask that your intention join to a Mass. Requesting a Mass intention means that you are asking that the grace of Christ's sacrifice in his death and resurrection be applied for a particular purpose, for example, for a deceased person or a living person who is ill or in thanksgiving for a favor received. An intention can also be directed to a cause, such as an increase of vocations or respect for life.

Usually, a single intention is attached to a given Mass. But it is also possible to gather several intentions in one Mass with exactly the same effect. At Holy Name Cathedral, we celebrate single-intention Masses as well as gathered-intention Masses. You may find it more convenient to request one of the two weekly gathered-intention Masses (Wednesdays at 8:00 a.m. and Fridays at 12 p.m.). If you do, we can accommodate your request sooner, and it is the same as a single-intention Mass.
