Blessing of the Oils

In today's Gospel reading, we hear Jesus read from the scroll, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me." Anointing is an important part of our Catholic faith as we are anointed at a variety of stages of our lives - Baptism, Confirmation, possibly as Catechumens, and when we are sick. The three oils are blessed, traditionally during Holy Week by the Bishop.

Our Archbishop, Cardinal Cupich, consecrates the sacred Chrism and blesses the other oils. It is among the principal manifestations of the fullness of the Bishop's Priesthood and is considered to be a sign of the close bond of the Priests with him. For it is with the sacred Chrism that the newly baptized are anointed and those to be confirmed are signed. It is with the Oil of Catechumens that catechumens are prepared and disposed for Baptism. Finally, it is with the Oil of the Sick that those who are ill are comforted in their infirmity.

Change the World through the Word

On Sept. 30, 2019, the Feast of St. Jerome, Pope Francis issued a Motu Proprio entitled "Aperuit Illis." The



title comes from Luke 24:45 where Jesus opened the disciples' minds to understand the Scripture in the post-resurrection story of the Road to Emmaus.

In his Motu proprio, Pope Francis declared the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, "Word of God Sunday." He shared his desire that the Word of God be celebrated, studied and shared throughout the world. The Bible is a collection of books of various genres meant to be read in their own unique way. The Psalms are different than the Letters of Saint Paul. By bringing to attention the importance of the Word of God in the life of the Church, Pope Francis is inviting each of us to renew our awareness of the Word of God in our life and to share its message: that all people are encountered, loved and saved in Christ Jesus, with the world around us.

This celebration is important to us as Catholics and as individual Christians. One way to honor the Word of God in your personal life is to place your Bible in a prominent place in your home. For some, that may require you to buy a Bible, or for others, to dust it off from your bookshelf or nightstand drawer. But each person who wants to have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ needs to talk to Him, and that is done through personal prayer and reading about Jesus of Nazareth. The Bible is our way to begin our journey with the Lord on the road to Emmaus, where Jesus will open our hearts and our ears, to learn and feel his love for every one of us.

Pope Francis discusses the inseparable link between the Scriptures and the Sacraments. Each Sunday we are fed by the Word of God in the Liturgy of the Word. Then we are fed on the Word made Flesh, Jesus Christ, in the Eucharistic Meal in the climax of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Let us use this Word of God Sunday as a wakeup call to reflect on how we are allowing the Word of God, both in Scripture and in Jesus Christ who is the Word made Flesh, to change our hearts and impel us to go out and change the world by sharing the Word with those we meet.




Join Our Young Adults at Catholic Charities

n June 26, 2020, Fr. Ricardo Antonio Cortez Martínez, rector of the St. Óscar Arnulfo Romero seminary in Usulutan, El Salvador, sent a request to the Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America for financial aid for 42 seminarians in the philosophy stage of their formation. Less than two months later, on August 7, Fr. Ricardo was found assassinated. Despite a falling homicide rate in El Salvador, three priests were slain from 2019 through August 2020.

To answer the call to priestly or consecrated life is a courageous act of faith, especially in a time and place where priests face violence, as Fr. Ricardo did. The Subcommittee on the Church in Latin America recognizes the courage and openness of seminarians, such as those at the St. Óscar Arnulfo Romero seminary, by supporting their formation as they prepare for lives of dedicated service. Your support for the Collection for the Church in Latin America makes it possible for young men in El Salvador and throughout Latin America and the Caribbean to answer that call. Our New Parking Garage is Open!

IMPORTANT! Please be sure your vehicle exits the parking lot within the validated time on your ticket (e.g. two hours for Masses). This is important for people who are arriving for the next Mass. If you do remain beyond the validation period, there is a \$100 fee (payable in the garage) in order to exit the parking garage. There is no overnight parking. Cars remaining overnight will be subject to towing.

What happens if I lose my parking ticket?

If you lose your parking ticket, you will be responsible to pay the \$100 fee to exit the parking garage. When you approach the exit gate on LL1, you will press the

button to issue a Lost Ticket. Then re-insert the ticket and use a credit card to pay the fee. Holy Name Cathedral is not able to provide tickets or waive the fee.

Important Validation Tips

Only insert your parking ticket into the validation machine one time. If you insert the ticket twice or more, it will cancel your validation and you will not be able to use it to exit the garage.

When you approach the exit gate, **insert your** validated ticket into the machine. Do not attempt to scan it as this will not open the gate.






















Prayers


