I share a wonderful story with you that was recently given to me. Read......and please pass it on......


"A pastor of a small church would occasionally call on one gentleman to pray, and every time this one particular guy would pray, he would pray, "Oh God, thank you for this world today, and bless these people today." Then he would end with the strangest statement, "And, oh God, oh Lord, prop us up on our leaning side."

Finally, the pastor pulled him aside, and he said, "I love the way you pray, but I don't understand your little closing phrase. What are you talking about - prop us up on our leaning side?" He responded, "Well, Pastor, I'm a farmer. I live out on the farm and, you know, I live in the country. I've got an old barn, and it's been there a long time. It's been through a lot of weather, and a lot of storms, and a lot of bugs have eaten at it."

He said, "I got to looking at it one day when I was riding on my tractor, and I noticed that it was leaning to one side. So, I thought to myself, oh my goodness! The barn is leaning, and it's only a matter of time before the whole thing falls."

He continued. "So you know what I did? I went and got some pine beams, and I propped it up on its leaning side." He said, "It still leans, and probably always will. But I propped it up on its leaning side. And it's not going to fall down because I propped it up on its leaning side. And I got to thinking about it.

When I was on the tractor, Pastor, and I was riding in the field, I thought about the kind of year I've had, and some of the storms I've been through, and some of the people that are bugging me, and eating away at my joy and eating away at my spirit. And I just got to thinking, you know, I'm still here! I'm still standing after all that stuff I've been through. The storms, and the howling winds - they couldn't topple me. I'm still standing by the grace of God."



He concluded, "From time to time, I find myself leaning. Leaning toward my old desires, leaning toward anger, leaning toward becoming bitter or hateful at the people who are bugging me, or leaning toward going back to the old habits and the old life I used to have. And when I feel myself start leaning toward that tendency, I just remember that old barn, and I pray out loud on my tractor – "Lord, I thank you that you're going to prop me up on my leaning side."

The Role of Candles

Candles play an important role in the Catholic Church and their origins go back centuries. The symbolism of light has long been used in religious practice, as well as the general usage of candles. In Judaism, a perpetual light was kept burning in the Temple and synagogues to show the presence of God.

Christians adapted the use of lit candles for Mass, liturgical processions, evening prayer ceremonies, funeral processions, and to show reverence to the Blessed Sacrament. It is also likely that candles or oil lamps were burned at the tombs of the saints, particularly martyrs.

In the Catholic Church, light has always had a special significance because it represents Christ. We know that Jesus called himself the Light of the World. Additionally, St. John's Gospel connects Christ with the imagery of light in John 1:4: "In him was life; and the life was the light of men."



Never see your shadow with Christ's light

Feb. 2 is the Feast of the



The Feast of the Presentation occurs 40 days after Christmas, keeping in line with the Jewish law of ritual purification of the mother after the birth of a son. Because blood was seen as impure, every time a child was born, the mother was ritually impure until her purification in the Temple. In Leviticus, chapter 12, the law states a mother is ritually impure for 40 days after the birth of a son, and 80 days after the birth of a daughter. In the same chapter, Leviticus states the purification ritual: offering a lamb or a pair of turtledoves to be sacrificed and making her clean (Leviticus 12:6-8).

The Gospel for the Feast of the Presentation (Luke 2:22-40) reminds us of the ritual purification and sacrificial offering. Though the Christmas season ends liturgically on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, with Mary's purification, it ritually restores her to her Jewish community.

This day is also known as Candlemas because in the Gospel, again, there is reference to Jesus as the Light of the World through the words of the prophet Simeon. A common practice on this day is for churches to bless candles that will be used throughout the year for liturgical celebrations. Some communities also have candlelight processions into the church, to show that Christ truly is the light that guides us on the journey of

In a nod to Fr. Marek, our Director of Liturgy, in Poland this day is called Święto Matki Bożej Gromnicznej (Feast of Our Lady of Thunder) because candles are blessed for the faithful to take home and place in their windows to ward off storms, as well as to protect their

homes when there is a rainstorm.

In 1997, Pope St. John Paul II declared Feb. 2 as World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Life for a few reasons. He said this day is to praise the Lord and thank him for the great gift of consecrated life in the Church, to promote knowledge of consecrated life among the People of God and to allow those who are consecrated to celebrate how God is at work in their lives and their ministry.

The Holy Father chose the Presentation of the Lord to celebrate Consecrated Life because it "is an eloquent icon of the total offering of one's life for all those who are called to show forth in the Church and in the world. by means of the evangelical counsels." Let us pray on Wednesday for Consecrated Religious, and for the Church that all of us may be lights of the world and never stray from the Light that guides us to fullness of life. Jesus of Nazareth.

"A soul to whom prayer is a familiar thing profits more from the sacraments and the other means of salvation than does another in whom prayer, intermittent prayer, is disconnected and without vigor. A soul that is not faithfully devoted to praying can recite the Divine

Office, assist at Holy Mass, receive the sacraments, hear the word of God, but its progress will often be mediocre. Why is that? Because the principal author of our perfection and of our holiness is God himself, and prayer keeps the soul in frequent contact with God; it establishes, and keeps going a fire-hearth in the soul. As soon as that soul is put in direct communication with the Divine life (for instance in the sacraments) this is

like a strong breath of air that sets the soul ablaze. A soul's supernatural life is measured by its union with God through Christ in faith and love. This love has to produce acts; but those acts, if they are produced in a regular and intense way, require a life of prayer. Progression forward in our love of God depends in practice on our life of prayer."



IMPORTANT! Please be sure your vehicle exits the parking lot within the validated time on your ticket (e.g. two hours for Masses). This is important for people who are arriving for the next Mass. If you do remain beyond the validation period, there is a \$100 fee (payable in the garage) in order to exit the parking garage. There is no overnight parking. Cars remaining overnight will be subject to towing.

Important Validation Tips

Only insert your parking ticket into the validation machine one time. If you insert the ticket twice or more, it will cancel your validation and you will not be able to use it to exit the garage.

When you approach the exit gate, insert your validated ticket into the machine. Do not attempt to scan it as this will not open the gate.


