

share with you some of the perks when one reaches the age of 70.


- 1. Kidnappers are not very interested in you.

Many consider mercy to be the same as pity and that being merciful can make one feel superior to the offender. Today's



Scripture readings, though, invite us to a more nuanced understanding of mercy that we must aspire to if our lives are to be holy.

In today's Gospel, which is part of Luke's sermon on the plain, is a teaching on loving one's enemies. From a practical point of view, we are told that we should treat others awe we would want to be treated. More important, from a God-centered point of view, we are told to be merciful like our Heavenly Father, who is kind to everyone, even the ungrateful and the wicked. The Greek word translated here as "kind" (Luke 6:35) is chrestos, meaning "useful" or "kindly."

Reflection: This Gospel is not about taking a passive stance against injustice – in fact, it's just the opposite. Jesus encourages the disciples to think creatively about ways to actively resist injustice without getting violent.

Liturgical **Changes for Lent**

We begin our Lenten journey next week on March 2 with the distribution of ashes. Our liturgy



provides us with many visual and audible changes to this season, reminding us of what it is we prepare for to celebrate at the end of these 40 days.

In a way, these changes reflect the Lenten practice of fasting in the context of the liturgy. The green vestments symbolizing hope are exchanged for purple, symbolizing the penitential aspect of this season. The plants and foliage that surround the altar are replaced with branches and rocks, a reminder of the desert we have entered.

During Lent, we do not sing the Gloria. The Gloria is known as the song of the angels; the song that the angels sang to the shepherds keeping watch over their flock in the field when Christ was born in a cave in Bethlehem (cf. Luke 2:8-14). The Gloria is a song of praise to God for His goodness and for his salvific acts accomplished through Jesus Christ, who came among us to bring us back to the Father. Therefore, until these salvific acts have taken place, we refrain from singing this song of praise as we continue to wander in the desert, seeking to enter again the presence of God.

The Alleluia is not sung during Lent either. Alleluia comes from the Hebrew word meaning "Praise the Lord." Alleluia is typically associated with the angels around the throne of God, praising Him for His goodness, love, and mercy.

In Lent, we are made more and more aware of our sinfulness, which would ordinarily prevent us from entering God's presence. But with Christ's death and resurrection, our sinfulness is wiped clean, and we are made new in the waters of baptism, able to praise God now, and for eternity.

With these changes to our liturgy during this sacred time, we see that Lent is a period of preparation for something great. We know that after Lent comes Easter, the celebration of the Resurrection. After Lent, we experience the joy of new life, and that joy becomes real for us as we renew our baptismal promises. May this season of Lent allow us to reflect in a new way on how our liturgy, what we say and what we do, prepares us for the greatest feast of the year, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

Drop Off Your Dried Palms

As we prepare for our Lenten season this year, if you have any palms at your home, you are invited to return them to the Cathedral Rectory during business hours, so we can burn them for ashes to be distributed



on Ash Wednesday (March 2).

Living with the Saints

The Importance of Being St. Peter and His Successors

On our liturgical calendar, Feb. 22 is The Chair of St. Peter, the Apostle. This feast 'celebrates his taking responsibility for the pastoral care of the city of Rome', and in turn the worldwide church. So some trivia about N

St. Peter: the statue. the basilica and his successors



The ancient statue of

St. Peter portrays him as he gives a blessing with his right hand and preaches, while holding the keys to the kingdom of heaven in his left hand. Some scholars attribute the statue to Anolfo di Cambio (1245-1302), but others believe it is a fifth century casting. Pilgrims traditionally touch and kiss its foot so that it is literally worn thin. Often they pray asking St. Peter to be merciful and open the gates of heaven if they died during pilgrimage.

On June 29, the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, the statue is clothed with an amice, alb, tiara, stole, red cope and a ring.

Q. In the basilica, there were four major relics. What were they?

A. The veil of St Veronica; a part of the true cross found by St. Helena; the lance of St. Longinus; and the skull of St. Andrew, brother of St. Peter.

Q. Why are there now only 3 major relics in St. Peter's?

A. In 1966, Pope Paul VI sent the skull of St. Andrew as an ecumenical gift to the Church of St. Andrew of Patraxos.

So many more details of this famous basilica; such limited space in this column. Future articles may focus on the tomb of St. Peter, the only stained-glass window, the doors, the chapels, the monuments and so much more.

Popes and Saints

Eighty-three (83) of the 265 predecessors of Pope Francis have been canonized as saints, of whom 31 are martyrs. Fifty three of the first 54 pontiffs are also acknowledged as saints.

Q. What is the longest time ever needed to elect a Pope?

A. After Pope Clement IV died in 1268, it took the assembled cardinals 2 years, 9 months, and 2 days to elect Teobaldo Visconti as Pope Gregory X on September 1, 1271.

Q. What Pope wrote a cookbook?

A. Pope Pius V (1566-72) compiled The Cooking Secrets Pope Pius V. His favorite dessert in the cookbook was a quince tart.

Q. What Pope was the most accomplished linguist?

A. Pope John Paul II spoke his native Polish and easily conversed (without a dictionary) in Italian, French, English, German, and Spanish. He was fluent in Latin; he enjoyed a working knowledge of Japanese and Tagalog; he was familiar with several African dialects.

Q. Why did Pope John XXIII state that "Everyone wants me to be pope, except the tailors"?

A. When a pope is elected, the Roman tailors prepare three sets of white robes (small, medium, large). No allowance had been made for a man of a very large girth, as was the newly elected Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli.


