

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

Our journey to the Cross has begun. The Season of Lent is a marvelous opportunity for repentance. conversion and a chance to see God's many gifts all around us.

"How's your life going? Someone asks you. "Well, so-so could be

better." Or "Didn't get the promotion." Or "The kids are driving me crazy!" Or "Will this pandemic ever end?" or "People won't leave me alone so I can finish my talk on selfishness."

Are we so focused on what we don't have that we are blind to what we have been blessed with from the Lord?

At the same time, we spend too much of our time worrying. We sometimes worry and fret because there is nothing to worry about at that moment! Max Lucado in his book, "Grace for the Moment," says this about worry:

Two words summarize Christ's opinion of worry: Irrelevant and irreverent. "Can all your worries add a single moment to your life? Of course not." (Matthew 6:27).

Worry is irrelevant. It alters nothing. When was the last time you solved a problem by worrying about it? Imagine someone saying, "I got behind in my bills, so I resolved to worry my way out of debt. And, you know, it worked! A few sleepless nights, a day of hand wringing. I yelled at my kids and took some pills, and glory to worry — money appeared on my desk."

It doesn't happen! Worry changes nothing. You don't add one day to your life or one bit of life to your day by worrying. Your anxiety earns you heartburn, nothing more.

Ninety-two percent of our worries are needless! Not only is worry irrelevant, doing nothing: worry is irreverent, distrusting God.

Come Thirsty

Beside worrying too much and sometimes focusing on what we don't have in our lives our "rugged individualistic" attitude can get in the way of living

life to the fullest. What do I mean? Some people have difficulty understanding the value of community and a sense of belonging to the wider community. George Bernard Shaw once said, "I am of the opinion that my life belongs to the community, and as long as I live, it is my privilege to do for it whatever I can." And learn the lesson from Canada Geese. ...

As each bird flaps its wings, it creates uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own. People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily, because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front. If we have the sense of a goose, we will stay in formation with those people who are heading the same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies as point. It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. Always encourage those who have the courage to be out front.

Finally, and this important, when a goose gets sick or is wounded by gunshot, and falls out of the formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies; and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their own group. If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by each other like that.

Something to think about this Lenten journey.

How Long is Lent?

very year, I am always asked by a family member or a friend, "can I do/eat/drink whatever I gave up for Lent on Sundays?" The first few times this was presented to me, I had to ask again what they meant. But after a deeper look, if



you count the number of days from Ash Wednesday to Easter, it is more than 40.

Traditionally understood, Lent is 40 days because Jesus fasted in the desert for 40 days (Matthew 4:2). But there is symbolism to the number 40. It was 40 days and 40 nights that the rains and floods came and destroyed the earth except for Noah and his family and two of every creature on the ark (Genesis 7:12). It was 40 days Moses fasted and prayed on Mount Sinai before the Commandments were given to him on two stone tablets (Exodus 34:28). It was 40 years that the Israelites wandered with Moses in the desert in search of the promised land (Exodus 16:35). It was also 40 days of fasting in Nineveh (Jonah 3). The number 40 usually represents a generation, but also a symbol of a long time, of testing and of waiting.

Going back to the original question, each Sunday of the year is referred to as a "mini-Easter." A day where we come together as the body of Christ to worship God for the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ. Counting from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday, there are 46 days. There are six Sundays in Lent, so excluding Sundays, there are 40 days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday. However, the liturgical season of Lent formally ends at the beginning of the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday when the Paschal Triduum begins. The Paschal Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday is a liturgical season unto itself because of the importance of these three days. We continue to keep our fast and pray during the Triduum.

So, the short answer is: however you decide to count

the days of Lent, though Sundays are always held in high regard for celebrating the Lord's defeat over sin and death, the season of Lent is more important than finding loopholes to do what we have given up. Do something special each Sunday, but it's not a "free ticket." It is an invitation for ongoing conversion and to allow the paschal sacrifice of Christ to take control of our lives.

Young Adults Music Ministry

Second Sunday of each month

One of the newest ministries to form at the Cathedral is the Young Adults Music Ministry, which was first offered in October 2021. The Music Ministry performs on the second Sunday of each month at the 5:30pm Mass. The idea for this ministry came from David Jonies, Director of Music and Organist at Holy Name, in collaboration with the Cathedral's Young Adults Board. The goal of this ministry is to welcome young adults into new lay roles for the celebration of the Mass.

The group is comprised of young adults, ages 18 to 40 years, who enjoy singing in the choir or in accompaniment as musicians. Auditions are not necessary — individuals of all levels and abilities are welcome to join during any month. The new ministry offers new ways to participate and share in the music at Mass and to meet other young adults. It is a beautiful mass as our young adults bring voice and instruments to the prayers reflected in the hymns. Following this Mass, they host a social gathering in the Parish Center across the Courtyard, open to all young adults in the 18 to 40 age group.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

No tax help on March 12, returning on March 19

Holy Name Cathedral is pleased to announce it will continue sponsoring the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program this year. Volunteers will assist clients with incomes below \$58,000 in preparing their 2021 tax returns for free. Please note there are no VITA services on Saturday, March 12, but will return every Saturday from March 19 through April 9.

The site (Parish Center in FXW School, across the Courtvard from the Cathedral) will be open at 10:00am. Clients are assisted on a first-come, first-serve basis provided they arrive by 10:30am. For assistance, please bring a government-issued photo ID and Social Security card for all individuals listed on the tax return including dependents and all tax documents. There is no charge for this service.

Free parking is available in our new parking garage, located at 14 W. Superior on Lower Level One and Lower Level Two. Bring your parking ticket with you to the VITA center. You will be given instructions on how to validate your parking ticket. DO NOT validate the ticket in the church.

World Day of the Poor

Each November, Holy Name Cathedral joins with Catholics worldwide in answering Pope Francis' call to serve poor and disadvantaged people in our communities on World Day of the Poor.

Each year, Cathedral volunteers organize a local World Day of the Poor program. In pre-COVID years, we held a luncheon for our neighbors in need in the Parish Center cafeteria. Each attendee received a warm meal, served by our volunteers, while musicians played throughout the meal. In 2021, two of our lay commissions, Human Concerns and Parish Life, collaborated on a program that would meet pandemic restrictions on in-person gatherings, shifting to a Saturday morning pre-assembly of "kindness bags" containing gift cards to purchase food, toiletries, snack bars and a prayer card. Volunteers then gathered the following week at a Sunday morning Mass and then distributed the bags throughout the city to homeless individuals. Volunteers also brought additional bags to Catholic Charities for the guests at our Friday evening suppers.
