

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

Our journey to the cross continues. Lent is an opportunity to take a long look at our life. When all is said and done, how much is God part of my life?

Lent is a time to probe deeply those

areas of my life which keep me from being the person I need to be regarding loving, forgiving and being Christ to others. Let me offer a different lens. Something to think about. I share with you what someone some years ago gave to me. ... Read and pass it on. ...

Too many people put off something that brings them joy just because they haven't thought about it, don't have it on their schedule, didn't know it was coming or are too rigid to depart from their routine.

I got to thinking one day about all those people on the Titanic who passed up dessert at dinner that fateful night in an effort to cut back. From then on, I've tried to be a little more flexible.

How often have your kids dropped in to talk and sat in silence while you watched "Jeopardy!" on TV?

I cannot count the times I called my sister and said, "How about going to lunch in a half hour?" She would gas up and stammer, "I can't. I have clothes on the line. My hair is dirty. I wish I had known yesterday. I had a late breakfast. It looks like rain." And my personal favorite: "It's Monday." She died a few years ago. We never did have lunch together.

Because Americans cram so much into their lives, we tend to schedule our headaches. We live on a sparse diet of promises we make to ourselves when all the conditions are perfect! We'll go back and visit the grandparents when we get Steve toilet trained. We'll entertain when we replace the living room carpet. We'll go on a second honeymoon when we get two more kids out of college.

Life has a way of accelerating as we get older. The days get shorter, and the list of promises to ourselves gets longer. One morning, we awaken, and all we have to show for our lives is a litany of "I'm going to," "I plan on," and "Someday, when things are settled down a bit."

When anyone calls my "seize the moment" friend, she is open to adventure and available for trips. She keeps an open mind on new ideas. Her enthusiasm for life is contagious. You talk with her for five minutes, and you're ready to trade your bad feet for a pair of rollerblades and skip an elevator for a bungee cord.

My lips have not touched ice cream in 10 years. I love ice cream. It's just that I might as well apply it directly to my stomach with a spatula and eliminate the digestive process. The other day, I stopped the car and bought a triple-Decker. If my car had hit an iceberg on the way home, I would have died happy.

Now...go on and have a nice day. Do something you WANT to...not something on your SHOULD DO list. If you were going to die soon and had only one phone call you could make, who would you call and what would you say? And why are you waiting?

Make sure you read this to the end; you will understand why I sent this to you.

Have you ever watched kids playing on a merry-goround or listened to the rain lapping on the ground? Ever followed a butterfly's erratic flight or gazed at the sun into the fading night? Do you run through each day on the fly? When you ask, "How are you?" Do you hear the reply?

When the day is done, do you lie in your bed with the next hundred chores running through your head? Ever told your child, "We'll do it tomorrow." And in your haste, not seen his sorrow? Ever lost touch? Let a good friendship die? Just call to say "Hi?"

When you worry and hurry through your day, it is like an unopened gift.... Thrown away.... Life is not a race. Take it slower. Hear the music before the song is over.

Lent is a marvelous time to stop procrastinating and let the Lord Jesus steer the ship of our lives. I promise the Lord will never let us sink!

On the Cover

This scene of the biblical event of the Transfiguration of Jesus is captured in this beautiful fresco, painted in the Church of the Transfiguration, Mount Tabor, Galilee, Israel. The Transfiguration is significant because it was the glorification of the body of Jesus for those with Him saw Jesus in His glory. The appearance of Moses and Elijah spoke to Jesus being the One to whom the law and prophets spoke.

In today's Gospel (Luke 9: 28b-36), Jesus' disciples need reassurance. Shortly before this passage, Jesus, who was to be "savior" of all (Luke 2:11), has told his followers that he will suffer rejection and execution (Luke 9:11). On the mountain, the disciples receive their assurance: a dazzling vision of the glory that will follow Jesus' passion and a glimpse of the divine essence Jesus shares with the Father.

The familiar story of the Transfiguration makes one thing clear: prayer changes us. Just as a cloud came over Peter, James, John and Jesus as they prayed together on the mountaintop, so too does God overcome us at times when we pray. Do we cower in fear and cling to the familiar ways of life? Or do we heed God's command to listen?


Election Day at the Cathedral

cathedral in a diocese is known for many liturgical celebrations that are important to the life of the diocese.

Examples include priesthood and diaconate ordinations where men are ordained to serve God's people, Chrism Mass where the oils we use for our Sacraments — Chrism, Oil of the Sick and Oil of the Catechumens — are blessed by the bishop and distributed to the parishes, and even installation Masses of new bishops where a new shepherd takes leadership of his diocese. But one event that is often overlooked or neglected is the Rite of Election. This event takes place in the beginning of Lent each year and is important to the life of the local Church.

Last weekend and this weekend, Holy Name Cathedral is hosting the Archdiocesan Rite of Election and invites those to be baptized in the Church at this upcoming Easter Vigil, to come before the bishop to reaffirm their intention to be admitted to the Church through the Sacraments of Initiation. "Within the Rite of Election, the bishop celebrant or his delegate declares in the presence of the community the Church's approval of



the candidates" (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, #122). The whole Archdiocese is represented in this liturgical event as people from Cook and Lake counties come together to be accepted by the Church for the Easter Sacraments. As each catechumen's name is called in the rite, their name echoes throughout the Cathedral, joining with the names of so many who have been found worthy to

participate in the Paschal Mystery of Christ.

After the Rite of Election and until Holy Saturday, the catechumens are called "the elect" because they have been 'elected' to participate in the Sacraments of Initiation at the Great Vigil of Easter, Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist as the bishop says, "The Church in the name of Christ accepts their judgment and calls you to the Easter Sacraments" (RCIA, #132).

We, as the Cathedral parish, have a duty to pray for our brothers and sisters who will be baptized into the Church on Holy Saturday, at the Easter Vigil, because they will soon call the Cathedral their mother church as well no matter the parish they belong to in the Archdiocese. Let us then be mindful during this Lenten season to pray for those preparing to enter in Christ's passion, death, and resurrection, and celebrate with them the joy of Easter when they conquer sin and death with our Lord, the same victory we share in by our own baptism.

When the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the Gospel. Therefore, the readings from the Word of God are to be listened to reverently by everyone, for they are an element of the greatest importance in the Liturgy.

Holy Advice on How to Avoid Temptation and Sin



This saintly information compiled by Fr. John Boivin

As is our liturgical tradition, last weekend, on the first Sunday of Lent, the Gospel is the story of the temptations of Jesus in the desert. This year from St. Luke (4:1-13); last year from St. Mark (1:12-15); next year from St. Matthew (4:1-11). His temptations are to remind us of our temptations. Not one of us is a stranger to sin; aren't we all bombarded by temptations? We know firsthand how we have been seduced and deceived again and again. What do some of the holy people of our tradition write about temptation and sin?

"An excellent method of preserving interior silence is to keep exterior silence...even in the world, each one of us can make his own solitude, a boundary beyond which nothing can force its way unperceived. It is not noise in itself that is the difficulty, but the noise that is pointless; it is not every conversation, but useless conversations; not all kinds of occupations, but aimless occupations. In point of fact, everything that does not serve some good purpose is harmful. It is foolish, nay, more, it is a betrayal to devote to a useless objective powers that can be given to what is essential. There are two ways of separating ourselves from almighty God, quite different from one another but both disastrous, although for different reasons: mortal sin and voluntary distractions - mortal sin, which objectively breaks off our union with God, and voluntary distractions which subjectively interrupt or hinder our union from being as close as it ought to be. We should speak only when it is preferable not to keep silence. The Gospel does not say merely that we shall have to give an account of every evil word, but of every idle thought."

It's always good for me to keep in mind the lesson of these three Gospels: Jesus did not go into the desert alone. The devil was waiting there, and Jesus went there 'filled with spirit'. A year round choice for me to make: who fills me? The devil, my intimate enemy, the opportunist who is always waiting? Or the same spirit, the only reality is who is stronger?

Blessings in a Backpack

Nine years ago, I was serving on the Human Concerns commission. I wanted to find a way to help kids beyond a School Supply Drive. I discovered Blessings in a Backpack, a national organization focused on childhood food insecurity. One in seven kids don't have access to affordable, healthy food on the weekends. Each week through their local affiliates, BIB provides these children with a bag of food for the weekend.

Working with Fr. John Boivin, we started a BIB program at HNC and connected with St. Malachy, a local Catholic grade school. We organized a fundraising weekend and raised enough money to feed 50 kids. I'd order food from Jewel and have it delivered to the Rectory. A dozen or so volunteers would pack bags of food and deliver them to St. Malachy each Thursday.

The program quickly expanded to feed the entire school. The parish has always been incredibly generous in making donations to fund the program.

Eventually, I rolled off of HCC and passed the baton to others who expanded it kept the program thriving and truly making a difference at St. Malachy.

After a long hiatus due to COVID-restrictions, we are looking for volunteers to assist us in bringing the program back to the Cathedral. If you would be interested volunteering

Called to Christian Stewardship

In last week's Gospel, we followed Jesus into the desert where He fasted and prayed. This week, He leads us up a mountain to witness His

Transfiguration.



Why both experiences?

Jesus is preparing us to go with Him in a few short weeks to a hilltop — Golgotha — where He will lay down His life for our sake, and then finally to take us to an empty cave where He triumphed over sin and death once and for all.

Jesus perfectly understands our humanity. He knows we need desert experiences — times of self-denial and testing — in order to arrive at mountaintop moments when we see and feel His glorious presence in our lives. The purpose of these two types of experiences is summed up in the description of the Apostles who were with Jesus at that mountaintop experience in today's Gospel: "Peter and his companions had been overcome by sleep, but becoming fully awake, they saw his glory...."

The reason for all our fasting and prayer and almsgiving during Lent is to be reawakened to all God has done for humanity, and to all that He has done for each of us personally. It is all too easy to get lulled into complacency in our daily routines, to "sleepwalk" through life. But we are called to so much more!

This Lent, let us train ourselves, or more precisely, allow Him to train us to say "Yes" to His will and to offer our lives back to Him in gratitude. In so doing, we, too, will become "transfigured." This is what it means to live fully awake; this is a stewardship way of life, and it is glorious indeed.

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention.
