Reflections from Our Rector.



Dear People of God.

Lent is a marvelous opportunity to ask questions, listen and take a few moments each day to ponder the rich meaning of our lives. The great Season of Lent provides a forty day window to better connect the mystery of God and our journey.

I am presently reading an outstanding book Seeking with All My Heart by Paula D'Arcy. I would highly recommend this book to all of you! The book deals with encountering God's presence in our everyday lives. She begins one of the chapters with a series of questions reflecting her journals over the years:

- Am I secretly waiting for someone else to make me happy?
- Am I willing to endure pain in order to grow?
- Can I accept the fact that it takes effort to bring about growth?
- Do I want truth even if it makes my life uncomfortable?
- Have I yet recognized that my points of view are also my judgments?
- Do I still project human emotions, feelings and desires onto God?
- Do I want to see who God really is?
- Will I ever give up the illusion of permanence?
- Will I continue to insist on certain beliefs, preferring them to direct encounters with the Divine?
- What am I really willing to know? And at what cost?
- Do I have the desire (or courage) to find God in life?

An outstanding range of questions to probe this Lenten Season! At the same time, connecting questions that touch the core of our lives cannot be disconnected from our everyday experiences. Life is a teacher if we are willing to listen. What lessons has life taught us through our experiences? Am I willing to let life surprise me? What have I learned?

Andy Rooney, a man who had the gift of saying so much with so few words shares the following:

- I've learned ... that just one person saying to me.
- "You've made my day!" makes my day.
- I've learned ... that being kind is more important than being right.

This is a fresco of Jesus and the Parable of the Barren Fig Tree in the crypt of the Saint Sava Temple in Belgrade. Serbia.



Today's Gospel prepares us to hear Lent's call to conversion and repentance as we hear Luke describing Jesus' journey to Jerusalem as He teaches and heals. He must also respond to those who question and challenge his authority and actions. While Mark and Matthew describe an incident in which Jesus curses the fig tree, today's reading makes the barren fig tree the subject of a parable...

...Jesus' words at first appear to have a fire-andbrimstone quality. Jesus changes from "repent or perish" to a tone that contrasts the patience and hopefulness of the gardener with the practicality of the property owner. When told to cut down the barren fig tree, the gardener counsels patience. If properly tended, the barren fig tree may yet bear fruit.

This is our reason for hope: Not only does God refuse to abandon us. he chooses to attend to us even when we show no evidence of his efforts.


Scrutinies: Deeper Reflections on Life

s we continue in this season of Lent, our liturgy offers us a unique look into the preparation of the elect – those who will be baptized, confirmed, and receive their First Communion at the Great Vigil of Easter on Holy Saturday. The period of purification and enlightenment begins at the conclusion of the Rite of Election, which was celebrated here at the Cathedral during the past two weekends, where the catechumens become "the elect." "This period of more intense spiritual preparation [for the celebration of the paschal mystery,] consisting more of internal reflection than in catechetical instruction" (RCIA #138).

The scrutinies, then, are ways for deeper reflection on what will take place in the life of those who will enter the Pascal Mystery on Holy Saturday. Within this period are two types of rituals, scrutinies, and presentations.

Very briefly, there are two presentations: the Presentation of the Creed and the Presentation of the Lord's Prayer. These are simple rituals that can be done in a small setting rather than within the Sunday Liturgy.



The scrutinies, however, take place during Mass for three consecutive Sundays, beginning on the Third Sunday of Lent and concluding on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The Scrutinies have their own readings and prayers for Mass, along with a minor exorcism and laying on of hands for each of the elect, and then their dismissal before the offertory rite begins.

The Gospels for the scrutinies: The Samaritan Woman at the Well, the Man Born Blind, and the Rising of Lazarus, have a deeper spiritual meaning than just being long. They are used to show that Christ is the living water, He is the light of the world, and He is the resurrection and the life (RCIA #143). Every ritual we have in the Church has power in our lives of faith and draws us deeper into an encounter with Jesus of Nazareth, whom we profess and believe is truly risen from the dead and desires a relationship with us.

The journey of conversion and renewal for the elect during this period of purification and enlightenment is also a reminder for us who have already been baptized of this great mystery. In these final weeks before their initiation, let us pray for the Elect as they make their way closer and closer to the font of new life, and for us as we prepare to renew our baptismal promises on Easter morning in the light of the Risen Lord.

Add the Stations to Your Journey

Fridays in Lent, 11:15am

The Stations of the Cross are a 14-step Catholic devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ's last day on Earth.

The 14 devotions, or stations, focus on specific events of His last day, beginning with His condemnation.

The stations are commonly used as a mini-pilgrimage as the individual moves from station to station. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until all 14 are complete.



In our church, the Stations of the Cross are found on the north and south walls of Holy Name Cathedral. Each Friday during Lent at 11:15am, everyone in our Faith Community is encouraged to "walk" with us through our Stations (in person or via livestream). On Good Friday, the Stations will be at 3:00pm. One of our lay ministries will lead the reflection each week.

Service

Thursday/Friday Suppers at Catholic Charities

Hunger and food insecurity are two of the most pervasive issues in Chicago and Cook County. Hunger is when you don't have enough to eat; food insecurity is when your life's circumstances



prevent you from regular and expected means of food. Addressing the needs of both adults and children are the focus of several of our Cathedral's lay ministries.

For more than 15 years, Holy Name Cathedral has partnered with Catholic Charities to provide hot meals and meals-to-go for our neighbors in need. Volunteers from the Cathedral gather every Thursday and Friday afternoon to prepare the 60 "to-go" meals and the set-up service for 60 hot meals at Catholic Charities' LaSalle Street location. While we have modified our service during COVID, we are beginning to expand the number of meals provided every week. All the food provided comes from local restaurants who have partnered with the Cathedral.

In addition to the team that provides the Thursday/
Friday Suppers, a corps of volunteer bakers provides
freshly baked cookies and small desserts for the
guests. And, on some occasions, volunteer live
entertainment is provided for our guests. Each supper
(ten in total) has a team captain who coordinates the
night's service. Some are led by some of our other
ministries like Young Adults and ACT II by contributing
their volunteers to help out.

Career Network Ministry

For nearly 10 years, Holy Name Cathedral has offered a variety of services and programs through our Career Network Ministry. Early on, the ministry focused on monthly events with services (resume writing, interview role play) for individuals seeking new employment. Over the years led by several volunteers and the support of Fr. John Boivin, it has evolved as the job market, job search, and career management has evolved.

Most recently, the ministry quickly pivoted as COVID shut down in-person events and the shock of pandemic layoffs rippled through many industries. The current ministry is led by Michael Ripani whose passion is to connect our Faith Community with highly relevant career topics and the latest job search tools. Now a monthly Zoom workshop, the ministry brings experienced human resources professionals, recruiters and career counselors to share insights critical to job search success: the use of social media in a job search, resume writing, interviewing skills, cover letters and thank you notes, maintaining confidence, personal finance management, finding a job at an older age, and more. The sessions are a combination of presentation, followed by a Q&A session. This ministry also provides professionals who can offer advice on resumes or conduct mock interviews.

The program has grown in popularity with more than 260 people among those interested in our program communications. Typically, up to 50 individuals register for a monthly event, depending upon interest in the topic. The April 21, 2022 event will focus on Age Issues in Job Searches. This workshop will provide tips, strategies and real-life examples to give a competitive edge to experienced professionals in career transition.



Caring for Our Architectural Treasure

As a parish and the seat of the Archdiocese of Chicago, Holy Name Cathedral is home to Cathedral and Archdiocesan liturgies and events which brings thousands of people into the Cathedral every year. Completed in 1875 after the Great Chicago Fire, Holy Name Cathedral was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2000. Caring for this great Gothic-Revival structure made of marble, bronze, stained glass and a ceiling of 23,000 individual pieces of wood takes a team of dedicated staff lead by Director of Facilities, Ryan Pietrzak and our head of Maintenance and Special Projects, Jesse Macias.

Preserving the architectural beauty and significance of the Cathedral as well as day-to-day upkeep requires constant cleaning and maintenance including repairs to the lighting, heating, cooling and plumbing systems. The Facilities team is responsible for the aesthetic integrity of the entire campus and has overseen numerous renovations required to repair the buildings.

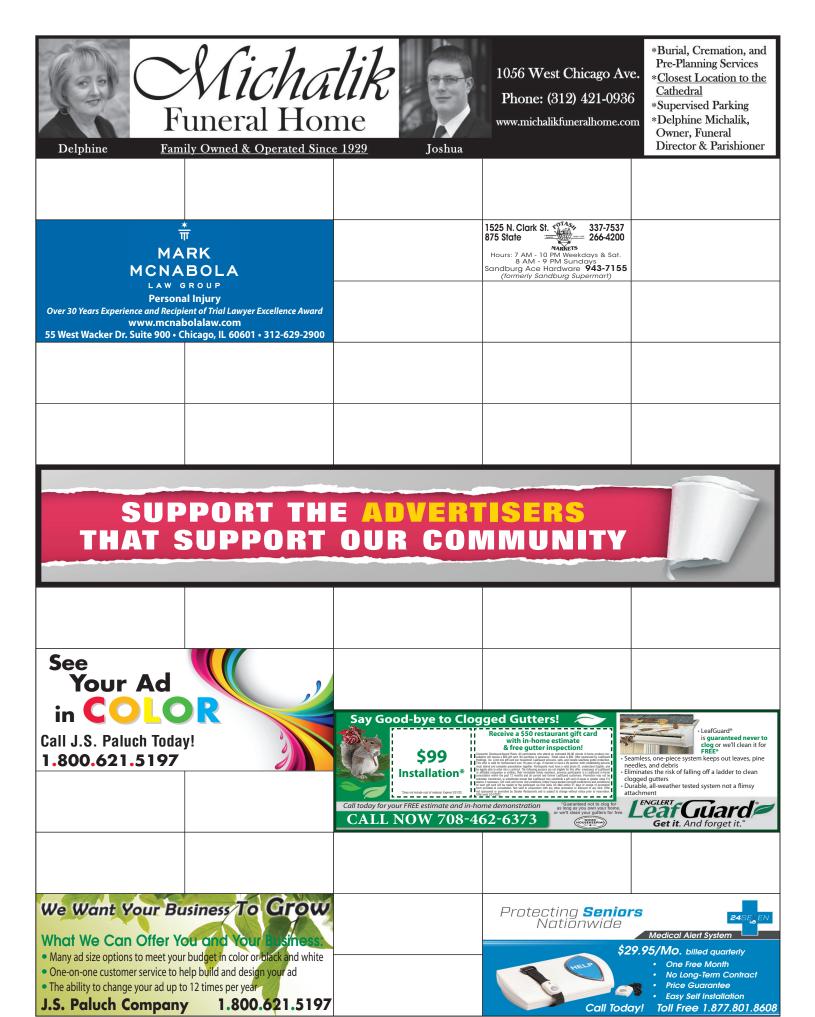


