Reflections from Our Rector.



Dear People of God.

We speak of Lent as a joy-filled season which blossoms into Easter joy. The Lenten journey is a time and opportunity for opening our hearts and minds to a deeper awareness of God within and around us. Lent is our individual spring cleaning

to allow God to work in and through us. It's a time to change and allow God to touch and transform our hearts. But many times we keep getting in our own way or pointing the finger at someone else. Keep reading. ...

While on a road trip, an elderly couple stopped at a roadside restaurant for lunch. After finishing, they left the restaurant and resumed their trip. When leaving, the elderly woman unknowingly left her glasses on the table, and she didn't miss them until they had been driving about twenty minutes.

By then, to add to the aggravation, they had to travel quite a distance before they could find a place to turn around to retrieve her glasses. All the way back, the husband became the classic grouchy old man.

He fussed and complained and scolded his wife relentlessly during the entire return drive. The more he chided her – the more agitated he became. He just wouldn't let up one minute. To her relief, they finally arrived at the restaurant.

As the woman got out of the car and hurried inside to retrieve her glasses, the old geezer yelled to her, "While you're in there, you might as well get my hat and the credit card."

We can become so agitated with others that we are blinded to our own shortcomings and sinfulness. It Is always easier to talk about someone else than take the time and probe deeply one's own heart, Lent provides a beautiful time to focus upon our own life and do an individual baseball "spring training."

The following comment by a six-year-old boy after his dog died captures well why we human beings need Lent.

The little boy seemed to accept the dog's death without any difficulty or confusion. We sat together for

a while after dog's death, wondering aloud why animal lives are shorter than human lives. The six-year-old, who had been listening quietly, piped up, "I know why."

Startled, we all turned to him. What came out of his mouth next stunned me. I'd never heard a more comforting explanation. He said, "People are born so that they can learn how to live a good life — like loving everybody all the time and being nice, right?" The six-year-old continued, "Well, dogs already know how to do that, so they don't have to stay as long."

Remember, if a dog was the teacher, you would learn things like:

- · When loved ones come home, always run to greet
- Never pass up the opportunity to go for a joyride.
- · Allow the experience of fresh air and the wind in your face to be pure ecstasy.
- Take naps.
- Stretch before rising.
- Run, romp, and play daily.
- Thrive on attention and let people hug you.
- Avoid biting when a simple growl will do.
- On warm days, stop to lie on your back on the grass.
- On hot days, drink lots of water and lie under a shady tree.
- When you're happy, dance around and wag your entire body.
- Delight in the simple joy of a long walk.
- Be loyal.
- Never pretend to be something you're not.
- If what you want lies buried, dig until you find it.

Our Lenten journey continues as today's Gospel reading shares the well-known parable of the Prodigal Son. The wonderful, if perplexing, point of a parable is it



causes us to stop and reflect on what God is asking of us. In the Prodigal Son, we are challenged to consider that God's love and mercy to is so extensive that we cannot understand it, especially if we are comparing it to our human, often conditional, love and mercy for each other. Often, this logic equates justice with vengeance and fairness with retribution. But God uses the logic of divine love, not human justice. Even if you feel like you are the Prodigal Son, come let Him embrace you and fill you with His love. No matter how many steps we take away from God, it only takes one step to get back to Him.



Laetare: On Sunday, We Wear Rose

n this fourth Sunday of Lent, our liturgy changes its focus, which is marked by external signs of the liturgy. We are at the midpoint of our Lenten journey and next week, with the fifth Sunday of Lent, our liturgy focuses on the



imminent coming of the passion of the Lord and we enter the season of 'Passiontide'.

Laetare Sunday, along with Gaudete Sunday, the Third Sunday of Advent, are the only two Sundays in the entire liturgical year that the priest and deacon can wear a rare color vestment — the color rose. The rose-colored vestments are a visible expression of joy, of something different from the general season of Lent marked by the typical purple vestment symbolizing penance. By changing from purple to rose-colored vestments, it is an external symbol of the reality we will soon celebrate: the paschal mystery — the passion, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ and the same promise to those who are baptized into this mystery.

This Sunday's theme of rejoicing is found in the entrance antiphon for Mass: "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast" (Isaiah 66:10-11). We rejoice today because we draw closer to the reality of God offering us a chance to participate in his Son's death and resurrection through Baptism. He promised that he will not abandon his people to death, and through his Risen Son, we too are his sons and daughters and have the promise of eternal life.

As we continue to move closer to Holy Week, let us renew our Lenten desire to repent and believe in the Gospel through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Let us be joyful even in the midst of sin and death, because we will soon celebrate Christ's victory, and our own through baptism, over the power of sin and death.



Taizé Prayer Service

Wednesday, March 30 at 7pm

Everyone is invited to gather at Holy Name Cathedral as we acknowledge the two-year anniversary of the beginning of the pandemic. Taizé (pronounced tahzay) is a form of Christian prayer originating from the ecumenical Christian community of Taizé in France. You will be invited to rest in God through the singing of psalm verses and other simple chants, alternating with periods of silent reflection. It is a time to "come away" and rest awhile" through experience of the simplicity and depth of the Word of God.

Spending time in Eucharistic Adoration with our Divine Lord and Friend is a good place to go to ask what he wants with our life. Why not spend some time each week in adoration, in union, in contemplation of the Lord present in the Eucharist?

Pastoral Migratoria

Empowering Immigrants as 'Protagonists of Their Own Development'

Responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, our immigrant-led Pastoral Migratoria and Polish Immigrant-to-Immigrant Ministry leapt into action in urban and rural areas across the U.S., providing families affected by the virus and isolation with much needed pastoral companionship and resource support. Early on, parish teams were trained to utilize their cellphones and Zoom technology to respond initially with food supplies, rent and utilities assistance, then labor rights and mental health resources, working in collaboration with Catholic Charities and other community and governmental organizations.

Since 2008, Pastoral Migratoria engages hundreds of Hispanic and Polish lay leaders in dozens of urban and rural immigrant parishes in the Archdioceses of Chicago, New York and Baltimore, as well as the dioceses of Kansas City-Saint Joseph, Missouri and Stockton, California. Utilizing a faith formation and leadership model in the

vision of Pope Francis (Aparecida), Pastoral Migratoria invites immigrants to respond to their baptismal call and evangelize with their lives, by engaging in service, justice and accompaniment actions in their parish communities.

National Pastoral Migratoria is continuing to share the ministry model with other dioceses and parishes in the U.S. who are committed to fostering immigrant leadership that serves the needs of immigrants in their parishes and communities. Padre Pio was born Francesco Forgione in 1887 in the small Italian village of Pietrelcina. A Capuchin priest who had the stigmata, he spent fifty years in the monastery in San Giovanni Rotundo, where he was much sought after as a spiritual advisor, confessor, and intercessor. Despite his notoriety, he would often say "I only want to be a poor friar who prays." His life was devoted to the Eucharist and prayer. He died on Sept. 23, 1968, at the age of 81. He is considered the patron saint of civil defense volunteers and Catholic adolescents.

Healing and Keeping Prayer

Heavenly Father, I thank you for loving me. I thank you for sending your son, Our Lord Jesus Christ to the World to save and set me free. I trust in the power of your grace that sustain and restore me.

Loving Father, touch me now with your healing hands, for I believe that your will is for me to be well in mind, body and spirit. Cover me with the most precious blood of your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, from the top of my head to the soles of my feet. Cast out anything that should not be in me. Root out any unhealthy and abnormal cells.

Open any blocked arteries or veins and rebuild and replenish any damaged area. Remove all inflammation and cleanse any infection by the power of Jesus' precious blood. Let the fire of your healing love pass through my entire body to heal and make new any diseased areas so that my body will function the way you created it to function. Touch also my mind and emotions, even the deepest recesses of my heart. Saturate my entire being with your presence, love, joy and peace draw me ever closer to you every moment of my life. And father, fill me with you Holy Spirit and empower me to do your works so that my life will bring glory and honor to your holy name. I ask this in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, Amen.



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
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
