

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

In Holy Week, we celebrate the most sacred mysteries of our own Christian faith when we gather to remember Christ's dying, through which he destroyed our death, and His rising, through which he restored our life.

These mysteries we celebrate are not

only something long ago, but are as close as our own and the world's — struggle with living and dying.

To deepen our experience of life together, and to celebrate Christ's dying and rising to new life, we need to gather to tell the stories of God, to break bread together. We need to celebrate together, to be at peace with one another, to give thanks as a people who continually grow in faith.

The Holy Week liturgies invite us to ponder the meaning of Christ's life, death and resurrection. I encourage you — yes, I urge you — to be present at the celebrative moments in the life of the Christian Faith Community. For it is when we gather, that we are most truly Church — the People of God.

Our complete Holy Week schedule is listed on Page 6. I would also invite you to celebrate with us.

Holy Week provides an opportunity and a window to put life in perspective. The following story is powerful. Take time this Holy Week to connect the pieces of our lives with the Paschal mystery — the Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Allow the Lord Jesus to heal those parts of our lives that ache for fullness, healing, new life and a deeper trust in God.

The Broken Heart of God

One of the world's greatest art treasures is Michelangelo's Pieta, created from a single piece of marble in 1498. It shows Mary, the Mother of Jesus, holding the broken body of her son on her lap. One does not have to be Christian to be moved by it. The combination of love and sorrow on Mary's face speaks to anyone who has ever loved and cared for another.

Yet, in moving us so deeply, the Pieta strikes us as so right and true. Why? In his book "The Lord is

My Shepherd," Rabbi Harold S. Kushner offers this insight into the Pieta: He sees in Mary the love and tenderness of "God in His feminine aspect ... the God who created life in all of its vulnerability, the way a mother creates life, a God who grieves for His children when they suffer, who suffers with them when they are cruel, hurt or kill one another. Every parent who suffers the loss of a child is reenacting God's grief at the death of one of His own ... God's was the first heart to break."

In the passion and death of His beloved, God is rejected and humiliated, God suffers and dies just as every human being experiences. But God allows himself to be broken in order that we might understand the fragile, impermanent nature of this life. As we will see as the Gospel unfolds this Holy Week, the brokenness we both suffer and inflict can be healed in the love of God. In the broken body of Jesus, we are reconciled with God: in the broken body of Jesus, our lives are transformed in the perfect love of Christ; in the broken body of Jesus, God's spirit of humility and compassion becomes a force of hope and re-creation in our hurting and despairing world.

The following words of Pedro Arrupe, S.J., say it best as we begin Holy Week:

"Nothing is more practical than finding God, that is, than falling in love in a quite absolute, final way. What you are in love with, what seizes your imagination, will affect everything. It will decide what will get you out of bed in the morning, what you do with your evenings, how you spend your weekend, what you read, who you know, what breaks your heart, and what amazes you with joy and gratitude. Fall in love, and it will decide everything."

May we take the time to put life in perspective this Holy Week. Fall in love with God. Make the time to journey to the cross of Christ and together may we celebrate the resurrection — from death to eternal life. Jesus promises each one of us love, forgiveness and eternal life. If you get a better offer — take it!

Giotto di Bondone: "Entry into Jerusalem" Fresco in Arena Chapel, in Padua, Italy, ca. 1305.

We see the crowd's joy at the entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem, yet it is striking at how alone and vulnerable He is portrayed. We know that



Jesus' days of teaching and healing are behind Him, and He will alone face the upcoming betrayal and violent death after this joyful Palm Sunday.

The artist has placed Jesus in the center with the disciples on the left and the crowd on the right. We see the faces of some disciples cautiously watch the crowd, alert to what they have heard about Jesus' imminent arrest and death. The future is uncertain, and the crowd's outburst is both hopeful as well as unsettling.

Perhaps if we were there, knowing what is about to happen, would we try to get Him to leave Jerusalem? Until we remember this King comes bringing salvation, salvation we so deeply need.





Holy Week Happenings: Chrism, Tenebrae & Triduum

e enter a sacred time this week. Holy Week is very symbolic for our life of faith. We enter Jerusalem with the crowd waving palms as Jesus enters into the Holy City.



On Tuesday, the priests and parish representatives of the Archdiocese gather for the Chrism Mass, where the priests renew their priestly promises and Cardinal Cupich blesses the three oils — Sacred Chrism, Oil of the Sick and Oil of the Catechumens. The oils will be distributed throughout the Archdiocese for sacramental use until next Holy Week 2023. And on Thursday, we begin the Sacred Triduum, the three holiest days of the year, commemorating the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth.

The Triduum is three days, each distinct, yet part of a continuous journey. We begin in the Upper Room on Holy Thursday evening with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. There is only one Mass allowed to be celebrated in each church this day. The Mass does not end with the final blessing, but moves to the altar of repose, a representation of Christ in the garden and in prison awaiting trial.

Good Friday is the only day in the entire year Holy Mass is not celebrated. The Service of the Lord's Passion is simply that, a service. The Eucharist that is offered during the service is consecrated at Holy Thursday. The Good Friday service does not begin with the sign of the cross, because it is a continuation of the liturgy on Holy Thursday, nor does it end with a final blessing, but in silence because God is dead in the flesh.

On Holy Saturday, just like Holy Thursday, there is only one mass to be celebrated in each church: the Great Vigil of Easter. This Mass also does not begin with the sign of the cross, but rather begins outside the church with the blessing of the fire to light the newly blessed Easter candle. It is only at the end of the Easter Vigil does the priest give a final blessing, concluding the three holy days.

One service, however, that is often overlooked, is Tenebrae. At the Cathedral, our Tenebrae service is held on Wednesday at 7:00pm. Tenebrae is a religious service that uses psalms and light as a tangible preparation for the Triduum. With each psalm or reading, a candle is extinguished, and the light dimmed, until the final candle in the darkened church is taken away, only to return after the great "strepitus" or earthquake. The Christ candle shows us that even death cannot extinguish the light.

As we enter Holy Week, the Liturgy Department invites you to join us during each of these sacred days to deepen your encounter with the Lord through his passion, death, and resurrection.



Tenebrae Service

Wednesday, April 13 at 7pm in the Cathedral

A favorite liturgical event for many in our Faith Community is the Holy Week Tenebrae Service. After a two-year hiatus due to COVID, this special service returns on April 13. Tenebrae is Latin for "darkness" and is held three days before Easter. This service provides moments of meditation. We meditate on His Sacred Heart, full of love for humankind and wounded by our sins. We meditate on His Incarnation and what it means for the dignity of man. We meditate on the hopelessness of life without Him during our Tenebrae services before Easter time — and all in emotionally moving ways. Please join us for this beautiful service.


Join Our Thursday Daytime ACT II Scripture Study Group

The Thursday Morning Scripture Study was initiated in 2013 by the late Toni Kieres, with the support of Fr. John Boivin. Gene Finnegan has continued as the Ministry Program Coordinator, building on all the great work started by Toni. Since COVID hit, the group moved to teleconference mode for their weekly meeting.

Living with the Saints

Reflecting on the **Cross of San Damiano**

This saintly information compiled by Fr. John Boivin

s we Catholics worship in our parish churches or visit shrines and sacred sites, our attention is always drawn to the crucifix. Artists of every medium have expressed this powerful moment in our salvation history. As we begin this Holy Week, we reflect upon the famous San Damiano crucifix that unfolded God's plan for the life of St. Francis of Assisi.

In 1205, St. Francis was praying before a large Romanesque cross in the abandoned San Damiano chapel near Assisi. He heard the voice of the Lord telling him "Go repair my church which as you see is falling completely in ruin." He at first concentrated on the church buildings, but his great repair was the founding of the Franciscan order.

An unknown Umbrian artist painted this crucifix in the 12th century. It looks like an icon cross, painted on walnut wood to which cloth has been glued. The cross, measuring about 74 inches tall and 47 inches wide, tells the story of the death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord.

The central figure of the icon is Jesus, not only by size but especially by light. He stands upright, not nailed. His eyes are open as He looks out into the world. The letters above the crucifix stand for 'Jesus of Nazareth. king of the Jews'.

The next largest figures are the five witnesses to the crucifixion. On the left side are Mary the Mother of Jesus and the Apostle St John. On the right side are Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and the centurion who asked Jesus to heal his servant.

There are two small figures in the corners of the cross. On the lower left is Longinus; the Roman soldier who pierced the side of Jesus

with his lance. The figure on the lower righthand corner is the soldier who offered Jesus the

sponge soaked in vinegar.

At each end of the crossbar, there are two angels and one saint depicted by a halo. The gestures of their hands

suggest they are marveling at the death and resurrection of the Lord.

At the top of the icon is the right hand of God with two fingers. This is the blessing of God the Father on the sacrifice of His Son. The Ascension is portrayed within

the circle of red above the head of our Lord. The Lord is breaking out of the circle (the tomb) and he is holding a golden cross. Ten angels welcome him into heaven.

At the foot of the cross there are six figures: the patron saints of Umbria: St. Damian, St. Michael, St. Rufino, St. John the Baptist, St. Peter and St. Paul. The whole icon is surrounded by shells, a symbol of beauty and eternity.

In 1257, the Poor Clares moved to the Basilica of Santa Chiara and took the original San Damiano cross with them. During Holy Week of 1957, this

cross was placed on public view and veneration for the first time, and it still welcomes pilgrims.

A copy of this crucifix hangs in our Cathedral sacristy, and the story of St. Francis before this image has been the inspiration for our current Archdiocesan program Renew My Church. As the Gospel proclaimed today is the passion of Our Lord Jesus according to St. Luke, we again are telling the story of the crucifix. One way to make this Holy Week holy is to do what St. Francis did 800-plus years ago: Fervently pray before the crucifix, listening for the Lord to speak to you as He did to him.

Embracing Stewardship

Two different responses to our Lord's passion are highlighted during the Gospel reading from Luke today: the response of Simon and the response of Jesus' acquaintances. Of Simon we are told, "They took hold of a certain Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country; and after laying the Cross on him, they made him carry it behind Jesus." We don't know whether Simon took up the Cross willingly or with a grudge. But we know he did his part faithfully. He stayed near to Christ, carrying the Cross until our Lord reached Golgotha, the site of His crucifixion. We also know that Simon's family was among the first Christians. Staying near to Christ, embracing the Cross, transformed his life and his family's lives.

In contrast, near the end of this Gospel, we are told of another reaction to Jesus' passion and death, namely that "all His acquaintances stood at a distance." They knew Jesus, heard him preaching and teaching, witnessed His signs and miracles and maybe even benefited personally from them. Perhaps they didn't participate in mocking or calling for His crucifixion. But they chose to stay a safe distance when things got tough. Unlike Simon, they refused to go too near to Christ.

Where will you place yourself this week? Keeping your distance from all the pain and suffering Christ endured? Or staying near to Him as Simon did? It is when we go near to Christ that we can be transformed by Him. It is by embracing the crosses in our lives, stewarding them well rather than trying to run from them, that we become His true disciples.

A QCD gift (a.k.a. IRA charitable rollover) allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free. This way of giving does not generate taxable income, which may lower your annual income level. If you are age 72 or older, the amount you transfer may count towards your required minimum distribution.

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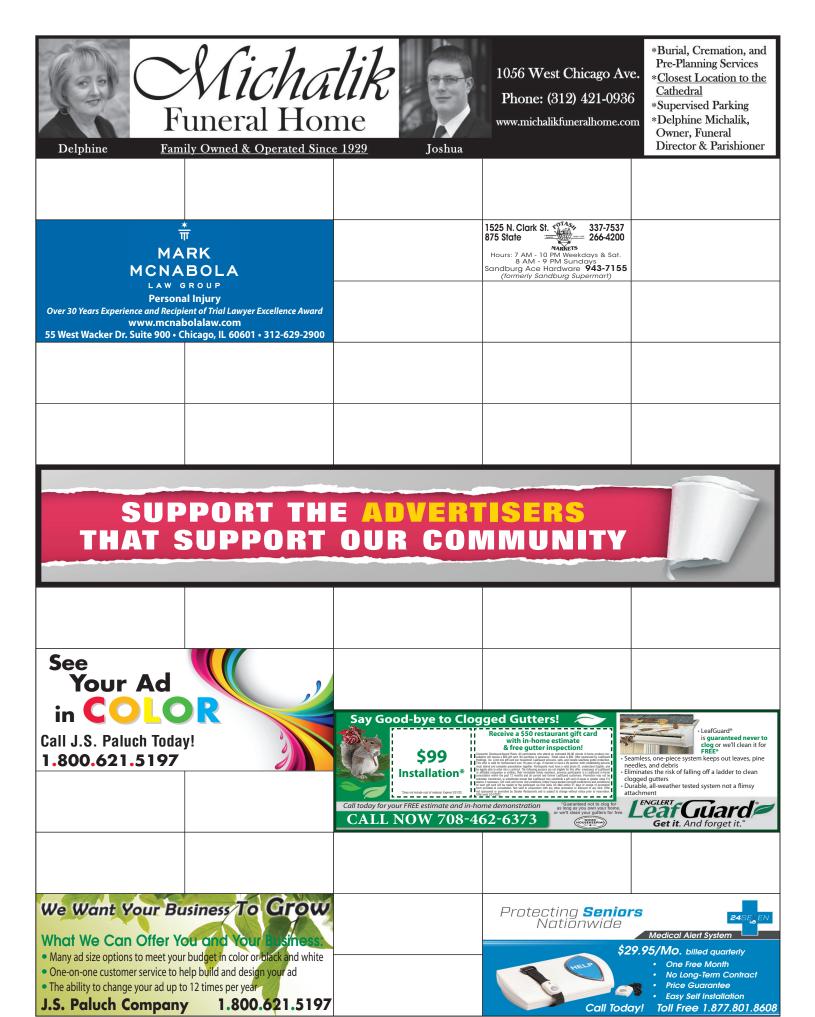
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
