

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear Easter People.

The Lord is Risen! Alleluia! The death of Jesus is not the final word. Life is so abundant that we call it eternal Resurrection. This is the Word of Good News! Joy. Hope. Promise.

The Gospels do not explain Easter — Easter explains the Gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter — Easter gives meaning to our lives. Faith is the story we tell with our lives.

Empty tomb. He is Risen!

Resurrection means Jesus lives. Our Lord discovered what to die for and live forever for: He invites us to do the same. Easter speaks of new life and hope always in the name of the Lord Jesus. Life places many choices on us. What are we choosing? Seeking? Finding in life? Easter is an opportunity to put life into perspective through the eyes of the "Easter faith."

I share with you a reflection given to me some time ago. It connects beautifully with our Easter journey with the Lord.

Fourteen-year-old Carly possesses an extraordinary sense of compassion. Since she was eight, she has helped others by assembling Thanksgiving food baskets, serving at a soup kitchen, and collecting winter coats for the poor. Wanting to do more that would change lives, she got the idea for the school.

After reading about the lack of schools in rural Vietnam, she said, "To see these kids and the conditions they're enduring every day inspired me to do something more," Carly said. So she decided to build a school. The \$50,000 needed did not deter her. She spoke to any school or club that would listen. The first meetings won polite applause but no donations. "Why should we help Vietnam?" one veteran asked. Carly replied, "They're kids. And I'm just a kid who wants to help out."

One night, Carly spoke to the Rotary Club in Minerva, Ohio. The audience responded with blank stares and dead silence. But then someone made a motion. "Let's give this girl a check right now." Carly had her first donation: \$500.

Carly's Kids Building Hope Foundation was on its way, achieving the goal in 18 months. Then the

Vietnam Children's Foundation matched with another \$50,000. A two-story school was built in the island town of Chau Doc in South Vietnam.

Carly and her family traveled to the Chau Doc for the school's opening. After building the school, Carly is looking for new challenges. She wants young people to know that she had to work hard, but her feat wasn't impossible — and that helping other kids is a memorable experience. "What's unique about this cause is that I want to pass it on," Carly says.

Easter calls us to roll away the rocks that seal our hopes and dreams in times of despair and cynicism. We need to continually love this world back into life by removing the stone.

Jesus took a journey — a long walk — which resulted not in death but Resurrection. Jesus also took an inward journey trusting God, His Father. As we live our lives, we also make an inward journey.

Paula D'Arcy beautifully reflects in her book: "Gift of the Red Bird" ...

"Why are we willing to make an endless outer journey but are loath to make the significant one: the journey within. The journey may frighten us, yet this journey holds the real treasure. There God's spirit waits to reveal mysteries and beauty beyond our imagination: the secrets of what is holy and the encounters with truth that change everything. It is the journey that opens the eye of the heart."

Laugh, cry and dance together with God, trusting God to lead and guide us through this Easter season — and all the days of your life. For Jesus is the Son of God, who died and rose to eternal life to show us how to live.

My prayers are with your entire family for a Blessed and Joyous Easter!

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we gather this year to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection, we cannot avoid our circumstances. Shadows of sin and death loom large over us. The pandemic, our experience of social unrest and daily violence on our streets, and, of course, the horrors of war in Ukraine and other parts of the world—all remind us how much we need the Lord's redemptive and healing power in our lives.

Our source of hope amid these challenges is anchored in all that we have witnessed in the liturgies of Holy Week. We have celebrated that the Lord Jesus entered into the fullness of our human experience. He went to the very darkest edges of that human experience. He entered into our suffering, struggle, and even our desperation, when he cried out on the cross, "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" He squarely faced sin and death on the cross.

And it was precisely in the moment he fully emptied himself, placing himself totally in the hands of God, that he was raised up from the dead victorious. But, his rising from the dead is not just a matter of his personal vindication. He came back from the dead for us, to give us a share in his victory. This is what takes place in our Baptism, which is confirmed in the Holy Spirit, and sustained by the Eucharist. He lives in us, and his victory over sin and death lives in us as well.

As Pope Francis reminds us, we need to share the victory of the resurrection with others, as Jesus did with us. We do this by being sisters and brothers to one another. As Church, we are a family of faith that walks with each other in moments of pain, struggle, and grief, keeping alive the promise that Jesus, the victor over sin and death, remains with us. We are never abandoned. My prayer for all of us in the Archdiocese of Chicago is that we will stand firm in hope, confident that the One who has gone before us in death has come back from the dead for us. May the peace of the Risen Lord be with you and those you love.





O Blessed Light!

arishes get a new Easter candle every year. It is blessed at the Great Vigil of Easter. The priest blesses the candle outside from the fire lit for this purpose. The Easter candle symbolizes the Risen Lord, the Lord who descended into the darkness of death and brought his light to those in darkness. This



same light is given at our Baptism to dispel the evil of sin and death in our own lives. The candle itself contains symbolism as well.

Whether the priest celebrant cuts these symbols into the candle or the candlemaker paints them on so the priest can trace them with his finger, he says, "Christ yesterday and today (vertical line for the cross), the Beginning and the End (horizontal line for the cross), the Alpha (letter A above the cross), and the Omega (Ω below the cross). All the time belongs to him (adds number 2 in the upper left corner of the cross), and all the ages (adds number 0 to the upper-right corner of the cross) to Him be glory and power (adds number 2 in the lower-left corner of

the cross) through every age and forever. Amen." (adds number 2 in the lower-right corner of the cross). Hence, there is a new candle each year so that the new year can be etched into the wax.

Five grains of incense, or nails, are added to the candle to symbolize the five wounds of Christ. As the priest places the nails into the candle, he says, "By His holy and glorious wounds, may Christ the Lord guard us and protect us. Amen."

After the blessing of the fire and the new candle, the priest lights the candle by saying, "May the light of Christ rising in glory dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." Then the procession to the darkened Church begins by following that single flame. And the Easter Vigil follows when we proclaim Christ risen from the dead.

Each parish needs to get a new Easter candle annually, both as a symbol of the resurrection and as a practical matter since the candle shrinks in size over the year. The Easter candle is lit every day for 50 days during the Easter season and then for funerals and baptisms throughout the year to symbolize life beginning and ending in Christ.

Whatever Catholic Church you walk into, look for the Easter candle, admire its beauty and remember that this candle symbolizes Christ, who conquered the grave and offers eternal life to those who follow the light.


Throughout these fifty days, you will be receiving

Divine Mercy Sunday



Next Sunday, on April 24, we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday. On the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter be called "Divine Mercy Sunday."

St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions from Jesus, including one of Jesus wearing a white garment with beams of red and white coming from His heart, which came to be known as the image of Divine Mercy. In her diary, she wrote that He said:

"I want the Image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it...My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy."

Divine Mercy Sunday focuses on the gift of mercy and love given through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. As Pope John Paul II stated, "Divine Mercy reaches human



beings through the heart of Christ crucified."



Holy Hour for Divine Mercy Sunday

Sunday, April 24 at 3:00p.m. in the Cathedral

Join us on Sunday, April 24 at 3:00pm for a Holy Hour for Divine Mercy Sunday. The monstrance that will be used for Eucharistic Adoration is from Mundelein Seminary, in celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the seminary. The monstrance was a gift to Cardinal Mundelein from Pope Pius XI for the 1926 International Eucharistic Congress in Chicago — the first Congress to be held in the United States. The Chaplet of Divine Mercy will also be prayed during this Holy Hour.



Friends of Fr. Augustus **Tolton**

Sunday, May 15, noon

Fr. Augustus Tolton, the first African-American priest in the United States, died 125 years ago in Chicago. He was born into slavery in 1854, Missouri. His mother, Martha Jane, escaped from Missouri to Quincy, Illinois. She headed across the Mississippi River with her three children, including an infant, during the Civil War in 1862. She traveled in a small boat with one oar while

Confederate soldiers shot at them, and Union soldiers defended the Tolton family.

In Quincy, Augustus often served at Mass at St. Peter Church, where the pastor, Fr. Peter McGirr, suggested that Augustus become a priest. Every seminary in America rejected Augustus due to his race. Finally, in 1880, Collegium Urbanum de Propaganda Fide in Rome accepted him. He expected to become a missionary priest in Africa. Yet, Cardinal Giovanni Simeoni said, "America has been called the most enlightened nation in the world. We shall see whether it deserves that honor. If the United States has never before seen a black priest, it must see one now." Fr. Tolton said his first Mass on April



25, 1886, at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, Instead of Africa, Fr. Tolton was assigned to Quincy.

Fr. Tolton became pastor of St. Joseph Church in Quincy. However, he continued to experience obstacles to acceptance. Archbishop Patrick Feehan invited Fr. Tolton to Chicago, and in 1889, Fr. Tolton became pastor of St. Monica Church. On July 9, 1897, Fr. Tolton returned to Chicago from a retreat. It was 105 degrees that day. Fr. Tolton collapsed on the street and later died of heat stroke. He was only 43 years old. While Fr. Tolton endured years of racism and other hardships, he

maintained a life of virtue, faith, and humility.

In 2010, Cardinal Francis George announced the Fr. Tolton cause of canonization. In 2019, Pope Francis gave Fr. Tolton the title of Venerable. The Friends of Fr. Augustus Tolton meet monthly to pray and sponsor presentations. We host the Fr. Tolton Tea annually, supporting Fr. Tolton's Canonization. On Sunday, May 15 at noon, the Pastor of

St. Thomas the Apostle, Fr. Michael Trail, will share a presentation on the Venerable Augustus Tolton. Please join us in supporting the Canonization of Fr. Tolton. Interested in joining the Tolton group, scan the QR code.




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
