Reflections from Our Rector



Dear Easter People,

Our Easter Season journey is a marvelous time to put our lives and priorities into perspective. ... Keep reading. ...

A group of graduates, well established in their careers, were talking of a reunion, and

decided to go visit their old university professor, now retired. During their visit, the conversation turned to complaints about stress in their work and lives. Offering his guests hot chocolate, the professor went into the kitchen and returned with a large pot of hot chocolate and an assortment of cups — porcelain, glass, crystal, some plain looking, some expensive, some exquisite — telling them to help themselves to the hot chocolate.

When they all had a cup of hot chocolate in hand, the professor said: “Notice that all the nice looking, expensive cups were taken, leaving behind the plain and cheap ones. While it is normal for you to want only the best for yourselves, that is the source of your problems and stress. The cup that you’re drinking from adds nothing to the quality of the hot chocolate. In most cases it is just more expensive and, in some cases, even hides what we drink. What all of you really wanted was hot chocolate, not the cup; but you consciously went for the best cups.

And then you began eyeing each other’s cups. Now consider this:

Life is the hot chocolate; your job, money and position in society are the cups. They are just tools to hold and contain life. The cup you have does not define, nor change the quality of life you have. Sometimes, by concentrating only on the cup, we fail to enjoy the hot chocolate God has provided us. God makes the hot chocolate; people choose the cups. The happiest people don’t have the best of everything. They just make the best of everything that they have. Trust God. Live simply. Love generously. Care deeply. Speak kindly. And enjoy your hot chocolate.”

And may I add — Pray. Go to church as a family and

develop an attitude of gratitude by always giving God thanks — both during our great days and tough days! And never forget to sprinkle with a little bit of humor. ...

This Pentecost, Serve the Lord by Serving Others



As we approach the grand celebration of Pentecost in this local community of Holy Name Cathedral, we are preparing to reignite our parish through serving others in the various ministries we offer. Pentecost is sometimes considered the birthday of the Church because it is here when the Apostles received the promised gift of the Holy Spirit and then went and proclaimed the Good News to the known world. The Spirit enlivens our lives with the courage to go out from ourselves and share with others what Jesus has done in our lives and serve others.

The past two years have taught us many lessons about living through a pandemic. I was ordained a deacon in August 2020 and then ordained a priest in May 2021. So many people have shared with me how their faith got them through the difficult times of the pandemic and how they missed the community they worshiped with.

We are at a new Pentecost in our community now, inviting the Spirit to enliven our hearts and our minds, aware that we have an opportunity to once again be like the first Apostles and go spread the Good News.

The Holy Spirit will inspire you to serve the Holy Name Cathedral Faith Community and our neighbors who need a helping hand. On June 5, Pentecost Sunday, the Cathedral will invite her parishioners to be empowered by the Spirit and serve the community in the various ministries we offer. 

Holy Name Cathedral hosted the third-annual Child Abuse Prevention Mass on April 30, 2022. Michael

Living with the Saints

Meet the 10 Newest Saints of the Church

Last Sunday, May 15, Pope Francis canonized 10 new saints (six men and four women). It was the first canonization Mass since the coronavirus and drew one of the largest crowds in St. Peter's Square in recent times.

Pope Francis told the 45,000 gathered that these ten new saints embodied holiness in everyday life. Our Holy Father said that the Church needs to embrace this idea rather than an unattainable ideal of personal achievement. "Holiness does not consist of a few heroic gestures, but of many small acts of daily love."

Meet these 10 new Saints and mark your calendar for their feast days:

- **Charles de Foucauld:** A French soldier and explorer who became a Trappist monk and Catholic missionary to the Muslims in Algeria. Known as Brother Charles of Jesus, he lived among the Tuareg peoples in the Algerian Sahara and was killed in 1916 at the age of 58. (Dec. 1)
- **Lazurus** (his original name was Devasahayam): An 18th century Indian convert who mixed with India's lower castes and was considered treasonous by India's royal palace which ordered him arrested and executed in 1752. (Jan. 14)
- **Titus Brandsma:** A Dutch priest, professor and journalist who opposed Nazi propaganda in Catholic newspapers. He was killed by lethal injection in Dachau in 1942. (July 27)
- **Marie Rivier:** The founder of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Presentation. The Frenchwoman founded the order in 1796, at the age of 28, during the Reign of Terror. (Feb. 3)
- **Maria Francesca of Jesus:** A 19th century missionary founder who crossed the Atlantic Ocean seven times by boat to establish an order of Capuchin sisters in Uruguay, Argentina and Brazil. (Oct. 6)
- **Maria Domenica Mantovani:** The first general superior of the Institute of Little Sisters of the Holy Family,

which she co-founded to serve the poor, orphaned and sick in Italy in 1892. (Feb. 2)

- **Maria of Jesus Santocanale:** The founder of the Capuchin Sisters of Immaculate Mary of Lourdes in Sicily in 1910. She spent most of her free moments, day or night, in front of the tabernacle. (Jan. 27)
- **Cesar de Bus:** A French Catholic priest who founded two religious congregations in the 16th century. He was a zealous preacher and catechist, who performed many works of charity. (1607) (April 15)
- **Luigi Maria Palazzolo:** An Italian priest who is known for having established the Sisters of the Poor, opened an orphanage, and worked for the poor. (1886) (June 15)
- **Giustino Maria Russolillo:** The founder of the religious congregations of the Vocationist Fathers, the Vocationist Sisters of the Secular Institute of the Apostles of Universal Sanctification in Italy. The priest was devoted to educating young people and cultivating the vocations. (1955) (Aug. 2)

As their lives spanned the 17th through 20th centuries, they are what Pope Francis meant when he said, "A saint is a luminous reflection of the Lord of History".

In future years, some of our Catholic parishes and schools will bear their names, their statues and holy cards will become familiar to us. They will inspire us in the 21st century as they inspired their contemporaries.

Their home countries and religious communities attended the Canonization Mass. How proud they are of these holy people! We in Chicago eagerly await sharing in that same joy and pride as we pray that day when Rome announces the canonization of St. Augustus Tolton, the first African American priest in the United States and the first African American priest in Chicago.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month

Total wellbeing means that you feel fulfilled in all aspects of your life.

Your mental health is a big part of your wellbeing. It is important to be aware of the signs or symptoms of mental stress so you can seek help or recognize when someone you care about may need help.

5 reasons why it is important to pay attention to your mental health and wellbeing:

1 Mental illness is more common than you think. Mental illness does not discriminate, it effects people of all ages, genders and ethnicities. One in five U.S. adults experience mental illness, 1 in 20 U.S. adults experience serious mental illness and 17% of youth aged 6–17 experience a mental health condition. Unfortunately, too many don't seek help.

2 Mental illness affects your physical health. Your brain is part of your body. Mental and physical health are connected. In fact, mental illness can be the root of many physical symptoms, For example, if you are suffering from insomnia, heart palpitations or fatigue, your doctor may want to rule out depression, anxiety or other mental health conditions as a potential cause.

TOGETHER for Mental Health

3 Diseases or injuries can increase your risk. Just as mental illness can cause physical symptoms in your body, physical diseases, like cancer, multiple sclerosis, diabetes and trauma such as head injuries, can raise your risk of mental illness. It is important that you are honest about your experiences when speaking with your doctor.

4 It runs in families. Mental illnesses tend to run in families due to genetic factors and family cultural issues. Remember to include things like depression, bipolar disorder and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder in your family health history along with information about heart disease, cancer and other conditions.

5 Early detection makes a difference. Like medical conditions, getting diagnosed early generally leads to better outcomes. Getting the help you need can prevent symptoms of mental illness from getting worse and causing negative effects on your life, including strained relationships and difficulty managing work and finances.


