

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

The Spirit of the Lord is upon us! The feast of Pentecost celebrates images of the Holy Spirit: sometimes a tongue of fire as in the Pentecost story, more often a hovering dove. But there is another way to imagine this gift of the risen

Jesus: the word "spirit" itself. In Greek, the language of the New Testament, the word for spirit is identical to the word for wind or breath. Wind, breath, spirit — all the same! Even deeper, it is God's own breath of life. And do we let the Spirit of God take our breath away?

The feast of Pentecost — a feast celebrating the Spirit upon and with each one of us — means we do not walk through life alone. The Lord Jesus is with us, and the Spirit of the Lord is upon us, and we are the Church!

What does the Spirit of life — wind and breath — look like? What difference should this Spirit make in our life and in the lives of those we touch? Keep reading ...

Years ago, a mother bought tickets to a concert by Ignacy Paderewski, the great Polish pianist. She took her five-year-old son with her hoping the experience would encourage him to continue piano lessons. She was delighted to see how close to the stage their seats were. Then she met an old friend and got so involved talking with her that she didn't notice her son had slipped away to do some exploring.

At 8 p.m., the lights dimmed, the audience quieted down and the spotlight came on. Then, to her horror. the woman saw her five-year-old on the stage, sitting on the piano bench, picking out with one finger the only tune he knew, "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star."

Before she could move, Paderewski walked onto the stage. Walking over to the piano, he whispered to the boy, "Don't stop, keep playing." Then, leaning over the boy, the great pianist reached out his left hand and began to fill in the bass. A few seconds later, he reached around the other side of the boy and played a running obligato with his right hand. Together the maestro and the boy mesmerized the audience with their playing. When they finished, the audience broke

into thunderous applause. Years later almost all those present forgot the pieces that Paderewski played that night, but no one forgot "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star."

Today we celebrate the feast of Pentecost, the coming of the Spirit to the Apostles in Jerusalem. It seems to me that Paderewski and the child playing together is a splendid image of the Spirit and the Church. The Lord Jesus promised that he would send the Spirit to help his followers. They were largely an unlettered, unsophisticated group from a tiny corner of the world. They felt lost without Jesus. Yet, moved by the Spirit, they went out to the entire world, converting thousands and changing the course of history.

As followers of Jesus, many times we feel overwhelmed and helpless. How do we overcome our temptations of greed and lust and power? How will we ever raise our children in this world? As Church, what do we do with the ocean of war and violence out there? As followers of Jesus, how can we possibly feed the vast army of hungry in our world?

The answer is clear — for ourselves, we can do little if anything. But, with God, all things are possible. The real solution is to love the Lord, keep the commandments, trust in the Spirit and keep doing our part, however small it may be.

To return to the image of Paderewski and the child; which of the two surprises us more? Paderewski was a genius and a veteran as well. The child, it seems to me, is the greater surprise. Most children would have stopped playing when a stranger approached. But this determined boy kept right on playing his little tune as best he knew how, and surrounded by the pianist's arms, watching his fingers fly, hearing the glorious sounds come from his playing as well as Paderewski's, he continued to play. When it was over, I imagine the boy was smiling and immensely pleased by his performance.

On the Feast of Pentecost, let us resolve to do our best to continue, to play our role in the world. But we may say: "Isn't our part insignificant?" Not when we are embraced and empowered by the Spirit of God.

May the Spirit Move and Guide You This Pentecost

ith the Feast of Pentecost, our 50 day celebration of Easter concludes with the promise Jesus made before his Ascension, that he will send us an Advocate — the Holy Spirit. For the past 50 days, we have celebrated with joy the power of the Resurrection. And though we move



into Ordinary Time, the longest consecutive liturgical season of the liturgical cycle, we know Jesus is still risen from the dead. We know that He is still at work in the world through the Spirit, which proceeds from the Father, and the Son.

The Spirit at work in our life is found throughout the New Testament. St. Paul writes on countless occasions that the Spirit is crucial to our life as disciples. In his Letter to the Romans, Paul says that "if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you" (Romans 8:11). In his Letter to the Corinthians, he speaks of how there are different gifts and talents, but

they all come from the same Spirit (1 Corinthians 12). Another example is in his Letter to the Thessalonians, where he says that we should not quench the Spirit (1 Thessalonians 5:19), showing us that the Spirit moves us to worship, to ministry, to service.

Pentecost is not just another day in our liturgical season. It is the foundation of everything we do as Christians. Because it was at Pentecost that impelled the Apostles to leave the upper room and proclaim the Good News. It was Pentecost that fulfilled Jesus' promise that he will send an Advocate after he ascended to the Father. It was at Pentecost that the Church was born.

As we celebrate Pentecost this weekend, in a particular way, here at Holy Name Cathedral Parish, we are inviting all parishioners to welcome the Spirit into their hearts. To listen to the Spirit guide them to use their gifts and talents and to serve the parish community. To follow where the Spirit leads them. To fall in love with the Spirit who gives us direction and purpose and meaning to everything we do as Christians. May this Pentecost weekend inspire you in ways you never though imaginable, and to go out, like the first Apostles, to proclaim the Good News.

Living with the Saints

The Road to Sainthood is Paved With Prayer & Miracles

he saints of our Catholic Tradition have always been a source of inspiration to their contemporaries and to the generations who follow. Each saint has a personal story of how they loved God and showed that love in their daily lives. An often-asked question is: What is the process of being declared an officially canonized saint of our Catholic tradition?

The process is listed below including the titles designated for each stage. The required miracles depends our prayers for the intercession of these holy people.

Stage I: Examination of the Candidate

Phase 1: Five years must pass from the candidate's death before a cause may begin (less emotion, more objectivity), though the Pope can dispense this waiting period. The bishop of the diocese where the person died is responsible for beginning the investigation. Following is a series of consultations with the episcopal conference, the faithful of his diocese and the Holy See. If granted a 'nihil obstat', a diocesan tribunal is formed to investigate the martyrdom and/or heroic virtue.

Phase 2: When phase 1 is completed, the documentation is sent to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. A positio is prepared, a summary of the evidence; this undergoes examination by nine theologians. If the majority of the theologians are in favor, it is passed on to the cardinals and bishops. If their judgment is favorable, it is passed on to the Pope. If his approval is given, the person is now declared Venerable (Blessed if a martyr).

Stage II: Beatification

It is necessary for a miracle (attributed to the person's intercession) verified after his/her death, and proven through canonical investigation, concluding with a decree. With this decree, the Pope grants beatification and the title Blessed is given with limited public

veneration (usually only in the diocese). No miracle is required for a martyr.

Stage III: Canonization

Another miracle is needed for all Blesseds (martyrs & heroic virtue), attributed to the intercession of the Blessed and having occurred after the beatification. Canonization allows for veneration by the Universal Church. The title of Saint is given. The feast day is assigned to the date of death or a significant event in that person's life.

Servant of God: Candidate for sainthood whose cause is under investigation.

Venerable: Title given to candidate for sainthood whose cause has not yet reached the beatification stage but whose heroic virtue has been declared by the Pope.

Blessed: A title given to a person after rigorous investigation into the person's life and writings that shows a heroic level of virtue or suffered martyrdom. A miracle attributed to the person's intercession has been proved (scientifically inexplicable).

Saint: Title given to someone formally canonized by the Church as sharing eternal life with God and offered for public veneration and imitation.


Networking with HNC Career Network


Thank you, Fr. Trail






