



still remember like it was yesterday when I received a phone call from the priest placement board asking me to come to the Cathedral to be an associate pastor. First, I told the priest that he had got the wrong number. Second, I told him my English to come to the Cathedral was not very good. Third, I said I don't want to be downtown. I had a few more arguments about not taking the assignment, but the priest told me, "Marek, you need to go on retreat, pray about it and call me back." Have You Passed Through Our Holy Door?

A Holy Door is ultimately a symbol of Christ, and of his Sacred Heart, which is opened for all to encounter his love and his mercy as they walk into the Church. Since the 14th century, the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome has been opened for pilgrims to pass through during a Jubilee Year to obtain special graces and indulgences. The Holy Door represents Christ, who is "the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved and will come in and go out and find pasture" (John 10:9).

Since then, the doors at St. Peter's and the other 3 Papal Basilicas in Rome have been opened to commemorate Jubilee Years. The most recent Ordinary Jubilee was in 2000, with St. Pope John Paul II opening the Holy Door at St. Peter's on December 24, 1999, and the most recent extraordinary Jubilee was in 2015 with Pope Francis opening the Holy Door for the Year of Mercy on December 8, 2015. Up until 2015, to obtain the special grace of passing through the Holy Door, pilgrims would need to go to Rome. In 2015, Pope Francis allowed local Churches to designate a Holy Door so all the faithful can receive the grace associated with the Jubilee Year without needing to travel to Rome.

Holy Name Cathedral and the National Shrine of Mother Cabrini in Lincoln Park have been granted permission to designate and open a Holy Door for the 75th Jubilee of Mother Cabrini's canonization. The Jubilee Year will conclude on November 13th, 2022, the Feast Day of Mother Cabrini. By passing through the Holy Door, one seeks to renew their commitment to the missionary zeal given to us at Baptism, to spread the Good News to everyone we meet. As you pass through the Holy Door, either at the Shrine dedicated in honor of Mother Cabrini, or Holy Name Cathedral, a place where Mother Cabrini prayed while in Chicago, may Jesus, the Gate, inspire you to be a missionary in our world. May Mother Cabrini's intercession help you to realize that "Christ's Love Heals the World," and deepen your devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, while inviting others to find refuge in his love and mercy as well.

Living with the Saints

Remembering Saints who were Fathers

This saintly information compiled by Fr. John Boivin

St. Isidore the Farmer (1070-1130)

A farm worker who attended Mass every morning before working in the field; known for his kindness to the poor and to animals. His wife, Maria de la Cabaza, is also often identified as a saint. They had one son who died in his youth. (*May 15*) Spain

St. Paulinus of Nola (431)

A husband and father who gave his possessions to the poor; elected Bishop of Nola in 409. (*June 22*)

St. Louis Martin (1823-1894)

A watchmaker and husband of St. Zelie Martin, a lace maker; parents of 9 children, though only 5 daughters survived childhood, all entering religious life. Parents of Carmelite St. Therese of Lisieux (Oct. 1) and Visitation sister Venerable Francoise Therese (Leonie); in 2018, they became the first married couple canonized together. (July 12) France

St. Joachim (100 BC-10 BC)

Husband of St. Anne and father of Mary, grandfather of Jesus. (*July 26*) Holy Land

St. Stephen of Hungary (975 - 1038)

King of Hungary who united and Christianized the Magyar people; renowned for his charity to beggars. His wife Gisela is a blessed and their son is St. Emeric (*Nov.* 5). Gisela's brother is St. Henry (*July* 13) and Henry's wife is St. Cunegunda (*March* 3). (*Aug.* 16) Hungary

St. Louis of France (1214-1270)

Father of 11 children, Franciscan tertiary who cared for lepers, built Sainte Chapelle in Paris as a reliquary for the crown of thorns. (*Aug. 25*) France

St. Augustine (354 - 430)

Before his conversion, Augustine was in a 15 year relationship; a son was born to them and given the

name Adeodatus (A Gift from God) (*Aug. 28*) Northern Africa

St. Lorenzo Ruiz (1600 -1637)

Married, father of two sons and one daughter, a calligrapher, devoted to the Blessed Mother and the rosary. One of 16 missionaries arrested for their Christian behavior (Patience and Charity), tortured and martyred. (*Sept. 28*) Philippines

St. Joseph the Universal Favorite

Husband of Mary, father of Jesus, provider for his family through carpentry, listener to God's message spoken through an angel, silent in the Scripture, his actions were his integrity, universal role model and inspiration for all men, husbands and fathers. (*March 19*) Nazareth

For all fathers today, may they be like....

- St. Isidore, beginning each day with a prayer
- St. Paulinus, attentive to the poor
- **St. Louis Martin**, with his wife they inspired each other to sainthood
- St. Joachim, whose child reflected his holiness
- **St. Stephen**, as king his political life & spiritual life were the same
- **St. Augustine**, seeing their children as 'a gift from God'

• **St. Louis**, Caring for unwanted people as he cared for lepers

• St. Lorenzo, being known for his patience and charity

• And **St. Joseph**, that his actions be his integrity.

Theology 101

Facing Our Anxiety with God's Promise (Part 1)

he theme of the 2022 Annual Catholic Appeal is: *Making all things new: God's promise and our responsibility*. The theme draws on words from the Book of Revelation, "Behold, I make all things new" (Rev. 21:5). It highlights God's promise of complete renewal and our responsibility in making that promise a reality. In accepting the promise, we work with the Lord to renew and transform our world and our very lives.

This year's theme provides an antidote to the pain and struggle that we've all endured from the pandemic during these past two years. Illness, death, isolation, job loss, social upheavals — these things and more have laid bare the deep and troubling experience of anxiety.

Anxiety is more than simple worry or fretting. It is even more than a generalized fear. Anxiety is a sense of impending loss accompanied by a feeling of losing control.

If you understand anxiety this way, then certainly the pandemic has left all of us anxious. That fear of the unknown coupled with a sense of doom — never sure who might succumb to the illness, when it might happen, and with what consequences — is always present. Add to this the often-mixed communications about the pandemic — its severity, its predicted course, needed mitigations, and a patchwork of public policies — it's no wonder that the whole world seems to be experiencing anxiety individually and collectively.

Certainly, we are anxious for ourselves and for what might happen to us, but even more poignantly, we are anxious for those we love. Think of all the parents concerned for their young and unvaccinated children. Think, too, of adult children fearful about their fragile and susceptible elderly parents. We wonder if and when the pandemic will ever end.

The anxiety that the pandemic has stirred in us is a human and psychological challenge that we need to address. That same anxiety also summons us as a people of faith to a spiritual response. We consider both these dimensions. From a human and psychological perspective, we note that anxiety in our circumstances today is not unreasonable nor is unexpected. There is good reason to be anxious. In this context, I recall a humorous but insightful exchange that I had with an elderly woman. She said to me, "With all the things that can go wrong in life these days, it's really scary to be alive." She had a point. Our anxious feelings are not off the mark.

It is not a pleasant feeling to be anxious, but there can be a positive side that can work to our advantage. Anxiety can make us aware of possible harm, which can mobilize us to respond appropriately to whatever is causing our anxiety.

On the other hand, in some circumstances, anxiety can immobilize us. We can be frozen with worry. That kind of emotional paralysis does not usually lead to good outcomes. Another and perhaps more common way that anxiety works against us is by distracting us. We can be so caught up in our fears and worries that we find ourselves continuously distracted from the task at hand. It takes more time to accomplish what we need to do, and we feel a disproportionate depletion of energy. This distraction of anxiety can invade our prayers and frustrate us terribly. Still, we are not without hope. There are spiritual strategies that help us face and address our anxiety...Part #2 will be featured in our June 26 Bulletin.

Join Our Ministry of Care to Bring Communion to the Sick

Ministers Needed As We Prepare to Restart Ministry

After an extended two-year+ hiatus, we are happy to announce that we will be resuming our Ministry of Care program at several of our local healthcare facilities. This includes Northwestern Memorial Hospital (Galter and Feinberg Pavilions and Prentice Women's Hospital), Shirley Ryan AbilityLab, and Warren Barr Rehabilitation Center. There are two additional locations that we hope to add in 2023. All these facilities are a short walking distance from the Cathedral. We also have several in-home visit opportunities for those unable to come to church.

What is the Ministry of Care?

Ministry of Care to the sick is a pastoral ministry of caring for those who are hospitalized, in nursing homes or confined to private homes. This ministry is provided by trained and certified lay men and women, ordained deacons, vowed religious sisters and brothers and priests within the Archdiocese of Chicago. Ministers are trained and formed to conduct pastoral visits with time to listen and pray about the concerns of the sick or shut-in person and to share Eucharist with them.

How does one become a Minister of Care?

As mandated by the Archdiocese of Chicago, each minister must complete a minimum of ten hours of training. Holy Name Cathedral is blessed to have a cadre of priests and deacons who collaborate with

Northwestern Medicine[®] Abilitylab. WARREN BARR Lori Doyle, Director of Pastoral Ministries, to design and deliver the training. It is primarily an inperson training with opportunities to practice patient interactions. We plan to start the training this

Qualities of a Minister of Care to the Sick

summer and into the early fall.

Ministry of Care to the Sick is a service offered to people at vulnerable and painful times in their lives. The person who cares for the sick and shut-in needs to have specific qualities and gifts, including a listening presence, compassion and empathy, a non-judgmental mindset, confidentiality, commitment and follow-through, prayerfulness, a gentle demeanor and commitment to continuous training and spiritual development.

Serving as a Minister of Care is not

volunteering; it is a ministry. As such, it's important that Ministers not act on their own, but on behalf of the Church.

How often do I serve as a Minister of Care?

The schedule for ministers is highly flexible. We serve seven days a week, 365 days a year. Some ministers serve on a weekly basis while others serve every other week or twice a month. You may visit your assigned patients anytime during patient visiting hours on your assigned day.



Today, we observe the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. This beautiful feast celebrates the gift of the Eucharist, which the Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches is the source and summit of our Christian faith. "For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole



spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ Himself" (CCC paragraph 1324).

The very word, Eucharist, means "thanksgiving" or "gratitude" and so this feast is especially meaningful to all of us who are striving to live as grateful stewards of all God's blessings to us. Surely the Eucharist is the greatest of all blessings because it is not only from God, it is God – the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

"The Lord Jesus... took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you.'" How can we possibly show our gratitude for such a sublime gift? We can receive the gift of the Eucharist with the greatest possible reverence and love. And, following our Lord's example, we can give ourselves generously to others in the week ahead.

What is a Mass Intention?

Holy Name Cathedral offers you different possibilities when you request that Mass be celebrated for a particular intention.
