Statement of Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, on the Supreme Court's Decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization

June 24, 2022 — Today, the U.S. Supreme Court issued its ruling in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, which overturns the court's tragic 1973 decision that removed legal protection for unborn children. We welcome this important ruling and the opportunity it creates for a national conversation on protecting human life in the womb and promoting human dignity at all stages of life. This moment should serve as a turning point in our dialogue about the place an unborn child holds in our nation, about our responsibility to listen to women and support them through pregnancies and after the birth of their children, and about the need to refocus our national priorities to support families, particularly those in need.

The Catholic Church brings to such a conversation the conviction that every human life is sacred, that every person is made in the image and likeness of God and therefore deserving of reverence and protection. That belief is the reason the Catholic Church is the country's largest provider of social services, many aimed at eliminating the systemic poverty and health care insecurity that trap families in a cycle of hopelessness and limit authentic choice.

We also come to this dialogue as Americans, knowing that the principle that all human beings are endowed by the Creator with certain inalienable rights is enshrined in the Declaration of Independence, and that first among these is the right to life.

Make no mistake, because this ruling regrettably will have little impact on abortion in Illinois, as there are virtually no restrictions here, we will continue to advocate strongly for legal protections for unborn children. And we will redouble our efforts to work with all to build a culture that values the inalienable rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for all.

This ruling is not the end of a journey, but rather a fresh start. It underscores the need to understand those who disagree with us, and to inculcate an ethic of dialogue and cooperation. Let us begin by examining our national conscience, taking stock of those dark places in our society and in our hearts that turn to violence and deny the humanity of our brothers and sisters, and get to work building up the common good by choosing life.

Never in my wildest dreams would I have known that these years would be the hardest, saddest, happiest, most joyful times of my life. I've always known and found comfort in the fact that I was part of a



community here.

I say it all the time - "I can't do what I do without you."

Deacon Welter Retires From Archdiocesan Post, To Remain At Holy Name

Deacon Daniel Welter, J.D. is retiring as chancellor for the Archdiocese of Chicago — a role he has served for five years. Below is an excerpt of an article in Chicago Catholic. But Deacon Welter is not retiring from ministry. He will continue serving as an active deacon at Holy Name Cathedral.

The Archdiocese announced the appointment of Deacon David Keene as chancellor, effective July 1. Deacon Keene is currently the auditor-actuarius in the Office of Canonical Affairs.

hen Deacon Daniel Welter retires from his position as archdiocesan chancellor June 30, he will be leaving a post that on paper is all about keeping proper records, dotting the i's and crossing the t's.

The chancellor, after all, oversees all the diocesan records, under canon law. But that's not what Welter is all about, according to friends and colleagues. What he is about is serving people, the charism of a deacon.

"He always found the need of being of service," said Fr. Dominic Grassi. "He would go into any ministry wanting to find out, what did that ministry need? And then serving the people of the parish, the diaconal community, now he ministers to the people who work in the chancery. ... In this day and age, where people are concerned with titles and roles, rules and regulations, he is concerned about the task at hand."

Welter has been one of the Santas at Macy's department store on State Street, usually serving as the jolly old elf for special meals with Santa. That didn't happen in 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic. and in 2021, the store had its "Santaland" but no meals. Welter chose not to participate, noting that many of the others rely on the job for holiday income.

He did, however, portray Santa Claus at private events and even a few home visits. "I'll always be Santa Claus," he said, adding that he would be happy to return to Macy's as well.

What Welter will give up is the job of making sure the archdiocese keeps records in order and serving as the archdiocese's official notary.

In reality, Welter said, most of the actual keeping of records is done in the archdiocesan Archives and Records Center. His job, he said, is "really more about the 'other duties as assigned."

That includes advising Cardinal Cupich and other archdiocesan leaders as well as helping others. whether they are clergy or laypeople, when they need to understand and then figure out what to do about their own situations relative to the church.

Welter served for 22 years as a judge in Cook County Circuit Court, and started working in the Office of Canonical Services the day after he retired from the bench in 2008. He worked on the laicization of former priests in the wake of changes to policies having to do with clerical sexual abuse.

Living with the Saints

The Many Saints of Vietnam and the Philippines

his month our parish family welcomes Fr. Ton Nguyen (born in Vietnam) and welcomes back Fr. Don Cambe (born in the Philippines). As Fr. Marek Smolka and Fr. Robert Fedek were both born in Poland, what a reminder of how catholic (universal) our Roman Catholic Church is!

Each country has its native-born patron saints and each country has favorite images of our Blessed Mother. What better way to welcome our new associate pastors than to know and love their saints and titles of Mary.

We begin with the story of Our Lady of La Vang. During a persecution of Catholics in Vietnam in 1798, people hid in the rainforest of LaVang, and many became ill. Every night in the jungle, they gathered at the foot of a tree to pray the rosary. One night in the branches of the tree, a lady appeared wearing traditional Vietnamese clothing, holding a child in her arms, with two angels beside her. The Lady comforted them and told them to boil leaves from the trees for medicine to cure the illness. The tradition states that one definition of 'LaVang' means 'crying out'; another from a native word meaning 'leaf'.

Though not an officially Vatican recognition as a Marian apparition, Pope John Paul II in 1998 publicly recognized the importance of this title and expressed his support in rebuilding the basilica destroyed in the 1972 war. The feast of Our Lady of La Vang is August 15.

On June 19, 1988, Pope John Paul II canonized a group of 117 martyrs who died for the faith in Vietnam during the 19th century. 96 were Vietnamese, 11 Spaniards and 10 French. Eight were bishops. 50 were priests and 59 were lay Catholics. Some of the priests were Dominicans. others diocesan who belonged to the Paris Mission Society.

During the 17th to the 19th centuries in Vietnam, 130,000+ Christians suffered cruel martyrdom often by decapitation and strangulation. Among them was St. Andrew Dung-Lac; he was a Vietnamese diocesan priest from a poor, non-Christian family who was taught by a Christian lay catechist. Andrew was imprisoned and repeatedly tortured during the 1820-1840 persecutions of emperor Minh-Meng. Another Vietnamese Martyr was St. Peter Thi. Their feast day is Nov. 24.

Our Cathedral Filipino Network has been a vital parish group for over 20 years. Their great love for the Lord is often expressed in their devotion to Santo Nino and to the Black Nazarene of Quiapo. Also this bulletin has often featured the story of the first two Filipino saints, San Lorenzo Ruiz (Sept 28) and San Pedro Calungsod (April 2); both laymen of the 17th century, both martyrs.

The hymn of the international Eucharistic Congress in Manilla in 1937 speaks of Filipinos as a 'people in love with Mary'. There are several Marian titles and devotions that are in the spiritual life of Filipinos; especially well known are Our Lady of Penafrencia, Our Lady of Manaoag, and Our Lady of Porta Vaga.

For our Filipino Network, the first image of Mary that was present at our meetings was Our Lady of Antipolo, also known as Our Lady of Peace and Good Voyage.

This image of Mary was brought to the Philippines from Mexico in 1626. Its safe passage was attributed to this image; six other safe voyages with Mary on board were attributed to her. As a church to honor her was being built on the shores of Antipolo, Rizal in the 1630s, this image vanished several times, reappearing atop a tipolo tree. Her feast day is the first Tuesday of May.

Many Filipino homes have altars with images of Jesus and Mary as well as their native and favorite saints. Filipino Cardinal Luis Tagle has said that the Blessed Mother has always shown mercy to Filipinos, especially amid challenges, because 'Mary has gone through all that'.

To learn more about these titles of Mary and these Asian Saints, let the internet do what it does best. We look forward to Fathers Ton and Don sharing more about these holy people.

Renew My Church Update

During the past few months, Assumption, Old St. Mary's, Old St. Patrick's, St. Peter, St. James and Holy Name Cathedral parishes engaged in the Renew My Church (RMC) review and discernment process. The Grouping Feedback and Discernment team (GFDT), which was made up of members from each community, met to review and discern how to respond to the call to renewal for the grouping's parishes, including any potential changes to parish structures.

Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, archbishop of Chicago, the archdiocese's auxiliary bishops, and the archdiocese's Presbyteral Council met to discuss the Commission's recommendation. Based upon those discussions and prayerful consideration, Cardinal Cupich made the following decisions regarding the Downtown grouping.

The new structure will be:

- The Downtown grouping's six parishes will remain in their current structure.
- Old St. Mary's School will continue in its current structure.

The parish communities will continue to the next phase of renewal, focusing on strong evangelization to the world around us. We will continue to build the new reality, focused on deepening discipleship, and supporting disciples in becoming missionary disciples for the work of evangelization.


