“The Parable of the Rich Fool” by Rembrandt, 1627 in the Gemäldegalerie, Berlin.

Today’s parable is one of Luke’s shortest but most powerful about the rich man facing a conundrum: “What shall I do with this



fantastic harvest? His solution makes sense — build larger barns — something that will help him with his anticipated big harvests in the years to come.

But he forgets a most basic truth: he is not governor of his time or his lifespan. God is surely not condemning this man’s hard work, dedication, or wealth. But what emerges is a definition of a fool — someone who cannot or does not see reality for what it is — uncontrollable. No one has control over the millions of circumstances that can and will affect his or her life. The most powerful can be stopped by a tiny blood clot to the heart or brain. An accident or an unforeseen disease can strike anyone at any time. The fool is one who sees himself as secure based on material things and therefore has a false sense of security.



Catholic Illuminations

With So Many Possibilities, Who's Your Patron Saint?

One of the most wonderful aspects of our faith is that we believe in the Communion of Saints. We profess our belief that life does not end with death, but that an eternal dwelling is made ready for God's faithful when our earthly reality turns to dust (Preface for the Dead I).



The Communion of Saints is a reminder to us that on this journey of discipleship, we do not walk alone. We have friends who are in the eternal glory we long for, because they did the will of God in their life and help us do God's will in our own life. And these friends pray for our needs to God, asking for his help.

On Aug. 4, we celebrate the memorial of St. John Marie Vianney, the patron saint of parish priests. Every publicly canonized saint is the patron of some place, cause or issue, or someone. And when I was in seminary, a good priest friend of mine told me some saints we become friends with because of what they are patrons of, and sometimes, the patron saint chooses us. In this case, I have become spiritual friends with St. John Vianney, because of his patronage of parish priests, while St. Rita of Cascia, I believe, has spiritually chosen

me to come into my life to bring me closer to Jesus.

Known for his pastoral heart, John Vianney struggled academically to be ordained, but finally was ordained to the priesthood in 1815. Throughout his priesthood, most of which was spent in the tiny French town of Ars, he spent hours each day in the confessional. He spoke to his people, guided them to heaven, and showed them the love of Jesus in his ministry. Due to his witness, Vianney was declared patron saint of parish priests by Pope Pius IX in 1929. All priests look to John Vianney as a model of what parish priesthood should be: to be present among your people, to minister to their needs and to walk with them on the journey to eternal glory.

This Thursday, as the Church celebrates one of her parish priests, please pray for those who serve you here at the Holy Name Cathedral Parish. Pray for the priest who baptized you, the priests who ministered to you as you grew up, as you were confirmed, the priest who married you, the priest who buried your family members, the priests who absolved you of your sins. Though the saints are enjoying the face of God now, that does not prevent us from seeing God in our priests who minister to us today. By their own ministry, our parish priests also help others see God in us, through our lives of discipleship.

Putting Works of Mercy Into Action

In his Oct. 12, 2016, General Audience address, Pope Francis reminds us of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy and how, when put into action, can change the course of people's lives. This applies to both the people who are served and those performing these acts of mercy. Take a few minutes to read over this address and see how you can perform "these simple, daily actions, we can achieve a true cultural revolution..."



Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful" (Luke 6:36). It is a responsibility that challenges the conscience and actions of every Christian. In fact, it is not enough to experience God's mercy in one's life; whoever receives it must also become a sign and instrument for others. Mercy, therefore, is not only reserved for particular moments, but it embraces our entire daily existence.

How can we, therefore, be witnesses of mercy? We do not think that it is done with great efforts or superhuman actions. No, it is not so. The Lord shows us a very simple path, made by small actions which, nonetheless, have great value in his eyes, to the extent to which he has told us that it is by these actions we will be judged. In fact, one of the most beautiful pages from Matthew's Gospel brings us the lesson which we can, in every way, hold to be true as the "testament of Jesus" by the Evangelist, who had experienced the action of Mercy directly on himself. Jesus says that every time we give food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty, cloth the naked and welcome the foreigner, visit the sick or imprisoned, we do the same to him (cf. Mt 25:31-46). The Church calls these actions "corporal works of mercy", because they assist people with their material necessities.

There are also, however, seven other works of mercy called "spiritual", which pertain to other equally important needs, especially today, because they touch the person's soul, and often create the greatest suffering. We certainly remember a phrase which has entered into the common language: "Bear wrongs patiently". And there are; there are troublesome people! It might seem like a minor thing which makes us smile, but instead contains a feeling of profound charity; it is the same for the other six [spiritual works of mercy], which are good to remember: counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, console the afflicted, pardon offences, pray to God for the living and the dead. These are daily things! "But I am afflicted..." — "But God will help you, I don't have time...". No! I stop myself, I listen, I give my time and console him; that is an act of mercy, and it is done not only to him, it is done to Jesus!

Theology 101

Thoughts & Prayers, Yes ... But Does That Really Work?

Fr. Cameli shared these reflections on Petitionary Prayer during his homily on Sunday, July 24. For reference, the Gospel reading was Luke 11: 1-13.



Petitionary Prayer

One of the characteristics of Luke's gospel is his emphasis on Jesus' teaching and practice of prayer. Today's gospel clearly demonstrates that emphasis.

We all have a stake in the questions that surround prayer, more particularly, petitionary prayer, that is, the kind of prayer that asks for things. In our current moment — a time of pandemic illness, war in Ukraine and other parts of the world, economic uncertainty, social upheavals and violence in our nation and our own city — we have a lot to pray for. When mass shootings occur, people routinely offer their “thoughts and prayers.” But we can legitimately have questions about this kind of praying.

The first question is pretty direct: does prayer that asks for something really work? And if God knows (and has determined) how things will end up, does this kind of prayer make any difference anyway? Aren't there times when people seemingly pray for really trivial things, like good weather for a picnic? Does that make any sense?

The theologian Karl Rahner points us to the way that the Lord Jesus taught us to pray. The first thing he notes is that in fact Jesus encourages us to pray the prayers of petition. He encourages us to ask for what we need. The second thing that Rahner notes is that every petition we make is made in the context of the one great petition of the Lord's prayer: thy kingdom come. The coming of the kingdom brings us every good we could want and even what we cannot imagine. Finally, Rahner says that praying for particular things (even good weather for a picnic) is important, because

it affirms that every circumstance of our life from the more serious situations we face to the “lighter” moments, every circumstance can be a vehicle for God's salvation to come into our life. He uses the German word *heilshaft* (salvation bearing).

If we focus on today's gospel and Jesus teaching, it seems that Jesus emphasizes three things about our prayer:

- It must be confident, trusting that the God we call upon, who is indeed our father, will truly listen and do what is best for us.
- It must be persistent. Just as the friend knocking in the gospel, so too we must be persistent. That persistence enables us to grow in confidence and trust. It's not that God needs to be harangued. No, we need to keep learning (persistently) to rely on God in all the circumstances of our lives.

- Finally, our prayer must be responsible. If we pray for something, we also need to take up our own responsibility to cooperate and collaborate with God. If, as Jesus says in the gospel, we pray for forgiveness, then we must responsibly be ready to forgive others. If we pray for health, we need to responsibly take measures to achieve that goal with God's help.

The Eucharist we celebrate together is a great prayer of praise and thanksgiving. It is also a great petitionary prayer that begs God's blessing on the world and our lives. And we will hear: “Taught by our Savior's command and formed by divine teaching, we dare to say...”


