Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

The story is told of a farmer who owned a mule. The mule fell into the farmer's well. The water wasn't very deep, so the mule could stand on the bottom.

The farmer heard the mule braying — or whatever mules do when they

fall into wells. After carefully assessing the situation, the farmer sympathized with the mule but decided that neither the mule nor the well was worth the trouble of saving. Instead, he called his neighbors together and told them what had happened and enlisted them to help haul dirt to help bury the old mule in the well and put him out of his misery.

Initially, the old mule was hysterical, but as the farmer and his neighbors continued shoveling and the dirt hit his back, a thought struck him. It suddenly dawned on the mule that every time a shovel load of dirt landed on his back, he should shake it off and step up.

This he did, blow after blow of the dirt hitting his back. "Shake it off and step up.... Shake it off and step up...shake it off and step up." The mule repeated this statement over and over to encourage himself. No matter how painful the blows or how distressing the situation seemed, the old mule fought panic and kept right on shaking it off and stepping up.

It wasn't long before the old mule, battered and exhausted, stepped triumphantly over the wall of the well. What seemed like it would bury him, actually helped him because of the manner in which he handled his adversity.

That's life. If we face our problems and respond to them positively, refusing to give in to panic, bitterness or self-pity, the adversities that come along to bury us usually have within them the very real potential to benefit us.

As people of faith, we know we do not walk alone. The Lord Jesus will always be our source of strength and peace. Life is filled with joy as well as sorrow. We are a people called to walk in the Light of the Lord Jesus, who will always guide our lives. We may wonder why God sometimes writes with crooked and contrary lines in our lives. Life is fragile, so always handle with prayer.

We may sometimes kick an old mule and get angry with God, life or ourselves. Yet, the Lord Jesus is with us --- even when we lock the Lord out of our hearts! We are richer today if we have laughed, given or forgiven, and trusted that the Lord Jesus is with us in our times of joy as well as adversity. Remember, sorrow looks back, worry looks around and faith looks up. For no one can go back and start a new beginning---but starting today you can make a new ending.

“The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary” by Mariano Salvador Maella (1739-1819)

On Monday, Aug. 15, we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Monday's Solemnity provides



a balancing point between the Annunciation on March 25 and the birth of Jesus on Dec. 25. Here Mary is honored both as *Theotokos* (God-bearer) and first and best example of the glory of the resurrection for human beings. Mary dies, but she is taken to heaven that we might all know what awaits us after this life. The vigil is not celebrated this year.

The Magnificat is a fitting Gospel reading for today. Things are going to be different. The lowly lifted up? The rich sent away empty? In today's Gospel reading, we're told of a new way of being. This is life where the hungry are fed and the poor are never left behind. This is life where mercy—not money sustains. This is reality where social norms are broken, and the world is better for it. This reality is the Kingdom of God.

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‘This is how you do Church.’

As I settled into my pew at Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago one recent Sunday morning, I gazed up at the beautiful interior, a feast for the eyes, and hoped for a liturgy that would be a feast for my soul. I was not disappointed; in fact, I was joyful, verging on giddy. Thumbing through the cathedral bulletin before Mass, I read an informative public policy piece on growing anti-Catholic sentiments and religious liberty; a short reflection on that day’s Gospel story; and a reflection on the upcoming Feast of Mary Magdalene that made this Magdala fan-girl smile from ear to ear. In terms of a spiritual meal, this spread was a feast of delicious appetizers that left me content and looking forward to the main course, which was everything I’d hoped for and more. The music was accessible and easy to sing. The homily was on-point and offered food for thought. The Liturgy of the Eucharist was reverent to the point of giving me goosebumps. The pews were filled with people young and old, families and singles, but, best of all, so many young adults. After a liturgy that was beautiful from start to finish, the lector ran through announcements about upcoming events — coffee and pastry in the courtyard after Mass, a summer jazz concert (BYO picnic dinner), a paint-and-sip party. Everything was free and open to anyone and everyone, no exceptions. I turned to my husband, Dennis, and said: “This is how you do Church.”

As we walked out of Mass, we were stopped multiple times by people encouraging us to join them in the courtyard. The young priest who wrote the Mary Magdalene reflection was greeting people in the back. (I knew he was the writer because he was wearing a name tag.) I stopped to thank him for the inspiration. Then I made my way over to the celebrant so I could



thank him as well.

Maybe the hopefulness of that morning has something to do with the population of Chicago in general. I had felt a surge of hope as we wandered the halls of the Art Institute of Chicago because it was so crowded with young adults and families, but I believe my Mass high was due to more than demographics. It was due to the intentional effort that had been made to welcome newcomers, to find points of connection, to offer something relevant and inviting, to recognize that, while the Eucharist is Source and Summit, we humans often need tangible benefits to go along with the transcendent intangibles.

For years I’ve given a talk called “Lost Generation,” which focuses on reaching out to adult Catholics disconnected from the faith. One of my key points has been that we cannot bridge the divide by starting with theology, or even with Eucharist. For many people who are inactive or uncatechized, the Eucharist is a Mystery that requires time, prayer and revelation that doesn’t always arrive all at once when someone walks through the door. We have to meet people at the door, connect with them where they are, and walk with them down the path until the mundane gives way to Mystery.

That connection begins with sincere welcome, with broad inclusion, with coffee gatherings and painting classes — not just once in a while and not just with minimum effort. Connection begins with a willingness to let go of the old mantra, “We’ve always done it this way,” and open our hearts and minds to new ways of doing things.

There’s a surefire way to know if we’re on target: Imagine you are a non-Catholic — or disconnected Catholic — walking into Sunday Mass at your church for the very first time. Would that experience of Church make you want to come back a second time? If the answer is not a resounding YES, it’s time to rethink the usual routines.

People are hungry for deep connection and loving community. If you build it, they will come. And they will bring their friends.

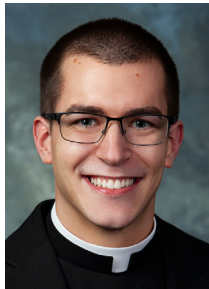
On Wednesdays, Come Let Us Adore Him at HNC

On the Feast of Corpus Christi, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus, the Church in America kicked off efforts for a three-year Eucharistic Revival to deepen the awareness of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist in the hearts and minds of her faithful. Here at the Cathedral, we had Mass followed by an outdoor procession, led by Bishop Jeff Grob, an Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago, to bring people into an encounter with Christ present in the Eucharist.

As the Cathedral is the Mother Church of the Diocese, to awaken the hearts of Christ's desire to be with his people here in Chicago, the Cathedral will be offering Eucharistic Adoration every Wednesday, following the noon Mass and concluding at 5pm, before the evening Mass, beginning on Wednesday, Sept. 7, 2022.

Eucharistic Adoration is a form of prayer where one sits in the presence of Jesus, who is placed in a monstrance. Monstrance comes from the Latin word *monstrare*, meaning "to show." In this context, Jesus is shown to the world in the form of bread, as the Lord of lords and



King of Kings. Every person approaches Eucharistic Adoration differently. Some read scripture, and some pray a Rosary or a Chaplet of Divine Mercy. Some journal, and some sit in silence. One can stay for five minutes to "check in" with God present in the Eucharist, or one can stay for a more extended period, deepening one's relationship with the One who calls us into being.

St. John Vianney, patron saint of parish priests, was asked what he says in adoration. He replied, "I say nothing. I look at God, and God looks back at me." By offering weekly Eucharistic Adoration here at the Cathedral, it is my desire that some people begin to fall in love with Jesus, and others rediscover their love for Him. Jesus of Nazareth, our Lord and our God, our friend and neighbor, our Savior and our Redeemer, is contained in the host that is "shown" to us in Eucharistic Adoration.

All are welcome to come and find a moment of rest in the presence of Jesus in the Cathedral through Eucharistic Adoration on Wednesday afternoons. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says, "Come to me all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). In a world plagued with many problems, may parishioners and visitors alike find refuge in these sacred walls, a place of encounter with Jesus who loves us, who knows us, and who desires to be in relationship with us.

Want to become Catholic?

The Year-Round Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) Process at Holy Name is Unique

In most parishes, a person who feels a “calling” to consider becoming a part of the Catholic Church must wait until the next RCIA process begins around mid-September and concludes at the Easter Vigil.

Well, not at Holy Name. We welcome inquirers throughout the year. There are times in the year when three separate cohorts are meeting. Each cohort (a group formed together) gathers under the patronage of a saint, chosen by a team member. For instance:

- At Easter 2022, we welcomed nine adults from the St. Josaphat



cohort into the Church. (pictured above).

- In early autumn 2022, we will welcome eight adults from the St. Therese de Lisieux cohort
- Next Easter, we plan to welcome adults from the St. Francis of Assisi cohort.
- There are preparations to begin a new cohort in autumn 2022, yet to be given a patronage.

Our three RCIA teams believe that we invite adults to the journey when the Holy Spirit calls them. We use Pope Francis’ “Art of Accompaniment” as the basis of our ministry: walk with the person, listen attentively, no pre-judgment, gain trust and invite to the Catholic tradition.

What can you do?

- Foremost, pray for our inquirers, team members and sponsors.
- Invite friends and family members who have questions about the Faith. YOU are the best ambassadors for those interested.
- Volunteer to help with some preparations and events surrounding the ministry.

Many children returning to school will benefit from the National School Lunch Program on weekdays. But when the weekend comes these same children are faced with food insecurity, not knowing where their next meal will come from until the following Monday. Our Blessings in a Backpack program is one way to mitigate this problem by providing them food for their weekend.

We plan to continue to serve St. Thomas of Canterbury School for the upcoming school year. In addition, we are exploring expansion to another school. To meet this growing demand, we need help from our volunteer community. Some of the needs include:

Program Management Coordinators: This group will provide an overall leadership role in general program oversight.

Delivery Drivers: We need team of volunteers to rotate deliveries to St. Thomas of Canterbury either Thursday or Friday.

Packing Weekly Bags: We typically pack 200 bags for 90 minutes Thursday mornings in the Rectory and always need volunteers.

Fundraising: We will be developing a new strategy to raise funds for our program. We welcome volunteers to brainstorm ideas.

Backpack Additions: We welcome ideas to add seasonal items or creative arts to add surprises items to the bags.

The Challenges of Stewardship

Today's readings set a high bar for us Christian stewards, reminding us that a stewardship way of life is meant to be a challenging way of life.



In the second reading, from the Letter to the Hebrews, we are told to live as Christ lived. And how did Christ live? "For the sake of the joy that lay before Him He endured the cross." If we are tempted to complain about the sufferings we must endure in living as Christ's disciples, we are told, "In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding blood." In other words, "If you're not bleeding, what are you complaining about?" That is quite a high bar!

The Gospel reading from Luke continues this challenging theme. Our Lord tells His disciples "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing."

Jesus's life and the message He brought were not meant to simply make us feel good. His words can make us uncomfortable at times. That's because His Good News is meant to change us, to make saints of us.

The stewardship way of life sets a high bar indeed. But deeply embraced, this way of life focused on God and others will make us the saints we are called to be.
