



## Look to Pope St. Pius X to Fuel Our Eucharistic Revival

ike Christmas, saints' feast days fall on the same ■ numerical day every year. But unlike Christmas, if the saint's feast day falls on a Sunday, or on a major solemnity, such as Christmas or Easter, it is not celebrated in favor of the solemnity. On Aug. 21, the Church remembers Pope St. Pius X.



St. Pius X is a special saint to me personally, as I wrote my undergrad thesis for my Bachelor's degree in Religious Studies on him. He was Pope from 1903 to 1914, and was a very humble and simple man. The focus of my thesis was on his Eucharistic reforms in the Church.

As we move further into the National Eucharistic Revival, various saints stand out in our tradition for their devotion to the Eucharist. Leading up to Pius X's papacy, the practice of reception of the Eucharist at Mass by the faithful was very low. There was a movement, the Jansinist heresy, that said the Eucharist was only for the perfect. Pius X sought to crush that heresy in two ways. The first was encouraging the frequent reception of the Eucharist, and also lowering the age of First Communion.

Through his ministry, Pius X taught the faithful that the

sick need medicine, and the Eucharist is that medicine for our souls. So frequent reception of the Eucharist heals us, and also conforms us closer to Christ which is a good thing. Additionally, the age of First Communion was around 14 years old before Pius X's papacy. He lowered it to the 'age of reason' which Church law says is around 7 years old. Today, most parishes have First Communion in second grade, and some in third grade. By lowering the age, the Pope shows us that once we are able to determine right from wrong, and are able to begin to understand the mystery of the Eucharist, we should be able to receive that gift from God.

The Eucharist is a gift. It is God dwelling among us in the form of bread. The Eucharist strengthens us, nourishes us, forgives of us our venial sins, and sustains us on the journey of life. Everyone is in need of healing and an encounter with God. This is made possible through reception of the Eucharist. No, we as humans are not worthy of this gift, but the Eucharist is a gift, as Jesus freely broke and offered bread, and his life, for the salvation of the world.

On this Sunday, Aug. 21, though we celebrate the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time, let us also take a moment to thank God for the life and ministry of Pope St. Pius X. Without his vision and desire to return to the roots of our faith, we would not be grounded in our reception of the Eucharist. May he guide our National Eucharistic Revival, deepening our need for this 'food for the journey.'

### Want to become Catholic?

### The Year-Round Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) Process at Holy Name is Unique

In most parishes, a person who feels a "calling" to consider becoming a part of the Catholic Church must wait until the next RCIA process begins around mid-September and concludes at the Easter Vigil.

Well, not at Holy Name. We welcome inquirers throughout the year. There are times in the year when three separate cohorts are meeting. Each cohort (a group being formed together) gathers under the patronage of a saint, chosen by a team member. For instance:

- At Easter 2022, we welcomed nine adults from the St. Josaphat cohort into the Church.
- In early autumn 2022, we will welcome eight adults from the St. Therese de Lisieux cohort
- Next Easter, we plan to welcome adults from the St. Francis of Assisi cohort (pictured above right)
- There are preparations to begin a new cohort in autumn 2022, yet to be given a patronage.

Our three RCIA teams believe that we invite adults to the journey when the Holy Spirit calls them. We use Pope Francis' "Art of Accompaniment" as the basis of our



ministry: walk with the person, listen attentively, no prejudgment, gain trust and invite to the Catholic tradition.

### What can you do?

- Foremost, pray for our inquirers, team members and sponsors.
- Invite friends and family members who have questions about the Faith. YOU are the best ambassadors for those interested.
- Volunteer to help with some preparations and events surrounding the ministry.

## Join our Thu./Fri. Suppers Ministry at Catholic Charities

often think about the image of a seed bursting forth green leaves during summer and ask myself if my faith constantly seeks opportunities to grow like those plants! Being amazed at how wonderful this planet is and how



widely the Scripture applies to our daily lives, I'd like to share some of my musings with you.

"Then a shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse, and from his roots, a bud shall blossom" (Isaiah 11:1). The prophet Isaiah foretells an ideal Davidic King. He shall arise filled with the spirit of wisdom, understanding, counsel, knowledge, fortitude, piety and fear of the Lord to wholeheartedly serve his people. It is King David, a chosen one that God has anointed to lead his people to live in a relationship with the Lord and one another.

People at that time thought David was the figure of a savior. However, seeing salvation history as a whole, we know that Jesus Christ is our Savior. He is the second person of the Trinity, and God incarnated to be one of us, not to rule over us as an earthly king but to rule out of love for our salvation. Through Christ's life, death, and resurrection, he took the initiative to renew us into God's image; we are made new in the sacrament of baptism. In other words, if we use the language of the old self versus the new self, we are living in the newness of life and letting our old selves/corrupted parts/sin die out.

Since we are anointed like Jesus as a priest, prophet and king, I pray and hope that, from the stump of Jesse, a new image of loving grandparents, caring parents, respectful children, good friends, and kind neighbors will emerge and blossom. Together with Christ, we can live our new selves daily to build the kingdom of God on earth! With that in mind. I'd like to share a bit about Holy Name Cathedral Thursday/Friday Suppers Ministry at Catholic Charities.



Every Thursday and Friday night, Holy Name Cathedral provides a helping hand to 120 guests at the Catholic Charities at 721 N. La Salle St. We purchase meals from local restaurants and offer a hot or bagged meal to a community that depends on this for their dinner. This ministry was founded in 2006 by Fr. John Boivin and a faithful group of volunteers and has continued to thrive ever since. Everyone involved with the suppers knows Fr. Boivin!

Fr. Joe Tito came in during the pandemic and faithfully served this ministry, identifying new and safe ways to offer the meals. The guests often ask me about him, "Where is the kind, sincere priest who used to come here on Thursday and Friday?" I have big shoes to fill as I humbly take on this responsibility. Yet, I am confident that with a group of dedicated volunteers, your support, and your prayers, we will continue to be Jesus' hands and feet, serving our neighbors in need. The kingdom of God will thrive wonderfully. "Am I, then, a new king?" Well, we have only one King, and that is Jesus Christ. 

## **Stewardship Takes Spiritual Discipline**

Today's readings show us that it is not enough to be Christ's disciples in name only. To be a real disciple, we must live for Christ every day and in every aspect of life. This kind of life takes strength and discipline.

Intentionally and consistently offering the Lord the best of our Time, Talent, and Treasure through a stewardship way of life is a form of spiritual discipline. These spiritual disciplines teach us to

become ever more aware of God's constant provision for us and they keep us on the narrow path towards the Kingdom of Heaven. The more we embrace this way of life, the more we can be "trained" by the Lord in the ways of true discipleship. Though difficult, these disciplines become a source of spiritual strength.



Our Lord Himself speaks of the difficult path to the Kingdom of Heaven in today's Gospel passage from Luke. He is asked, "Lord, will only a few be saved?" Jesus responds, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough." Showing up for Mass on Sunday while living as if Christ is an afterthought the rest of the week does not make us disciples. What's more, this approach to our faith is an unjust and unloving response to our good God who has given us all that we have and are.






