

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

Am I sometimes too quick in judging others? Do I expect life always on my terms? My way? Life is truly a mystery to be lived and not a problem to be solved. May we always hold a profound trust in God who is our hope, joy, strength and

destiny. ... and keep reading.

Don't we all?

"I was parked in front of the mall wiping off my car. I had just come from the car wash and was waiting for my wife to get out of work. Coming my way from across the parking lot was a homeless man. From the looks of him, he had no car, no home, no clean clothes and no money. There are times when you feel generous but there are other times that you just don't want to be bothered. This was one of those 'don't want to be bothered' times. "I hope he doesn't ask me for any money," I thought. He didn't.

He came and sat on the curb in front of the bus stop, but he didn't look like he could have enough money to even ride the bus. After a few minutes he spoke. "That's a very pretty car." He sat there guietly as I worked. The expected plea for money never came. As the silence between us widened, something inside said, "ask him if he needs any help." I was sure that he would say yes, but I held true to the inner voice. "Do you need any help?" I asked. He answered in three simple but

profound words that I will never forget.

We often look for wisdom in great men and women. We expect it from those of higher learning and accomplishments. I expected nothing but an outstretched, grimy hand. He spoke three words that shook me. "Don't we all?" he said. I was feeling high and mighty, successful, and important, above a homeless man in the street, until those three words hit me hard. Don't we all? I needed help. Maybe not for bus fare or a place to sleep, but I needed help. I reached into my wallet and gave him not only enough for bus fare, but enough to get a warm meal and shelter for the day.

Those three little words still ring true. No matter how much you have, no matter how much you have accomplished, you need help too. No matter how little you have, no matter how loaded you are with problems, even without money or a place to sleep, you may see someone that appears to have it all. They are waiting on you to give them what they don't have. A different perspective on life, a glimpse at something beautiful, a respite from daily chaos, that only you through a torn world can see. Maybe he was more than that. Maybe he was sent by a power that is great and wise, to minister to a soul too comfortable in himself. Maybe God looked down, called an Angel, dressed him in tattered clothing, then said, "Go minister to that man cleaning the car, that man needs help."

Don't we all?"



Experience an In-Depth Look at Holy Name Cathedral

s school bells begin to ring across the city and the country, these last days of August remind us that summer is concluding. But with conclusions come new beginnings. A reminder that next weekend, September 3 and 4, our evening Masses return to the original pre-pandemic time: 5:15pm.



This means all Saturday, Sunday, and Wednesday evening Masses will begin at 5:15pm. Additionally, every Wednesday, effective September 7, the Cathedral will offer Eucharistic Adoration beginning at the end of the noon Mass and concluding at 5pm. We will continue to offer First Friday Adoration following the 8am Mass and finishing at 11:45am on every First Friday.

We are also resuming tours of our Cathedral once again! Did you know Holy Name Cathedral is listed on the National Register of Historic Places? Have you ever wondered how many pieces of wood are in our ceiling? Or how many pipes are in the organ we use to enhance our worship? Have you noticed the six red hats hanging from the sanctuary's ceiling and wondered why they

are just hanging up there? All of these questions and more can be answered by one of our talented docents. A docent is a volunteer trained to walk people through our Cathedral, answering questions and explaining the beautiful space we have worshiped in since 1875.

Beginning Sunday, September 4, our docents will return to their ministry here at Holy Name Cathedral. On the first and third Sunday of the month after the 12:30pm Mass, a tour of the Cathedral will be offered. This in-depth tour of our worship space lasts around 45 minutes. And every Sunday after the 10:30am Mass, an 'express' tour of approximately 15 minutes will be offered. Due to an Archdiocesan or Parish event, we may have to cancel a tour due to other scheduled events in the Cathedral, as will be the case on Oct. 2.

I invite you, parishioners and visitors, to tour our Cathedral with a docent. The history, the beauty, and the stories behind the artwork are unique. Understanding our worship space will only enhance our appreciation for those who have passed through these doors, being fed from this sacred altar, seeking to encounter the Risen Christ. By coming to Holy Name Cathedral for Mass, you can learn more about it and become a part of our history.

New Cathedral Tours on Sundays Starting in Sept.

You're invited to take a tour of Holy Name Cathedral and discover the unique aspects of one of the oldest and largest churches in the Archdiocese of Chicago. Our Docents are excited to share the art, architecture and history of the Cathedral with you.

Starting in September, we have two opportunities for free tours on Sundays. No reservations needed!

· Every Sunday after the 10:30 a.m. Mass: Docents will give quick 15-minute express tours. The tours will begin



immediately after Mass and start at the front of the main, center aisle.

· On the first and third Sundays of the month after the 12:30 p.m. Mass: Docents will give a full tour that last approximately 45 minutes.

A Reluctant, but Hopeful Goodbye from Fr. Bill Moriarity

To my Holy Name Cathedral Family,

This is a hard letter for me to write, but I hope sharing my journey will provide both a perspective of our lifelong journey with Christ as well as give me an opportunity to thank you for my many years at the Cathedral.

There are a couple of ways to say this. Over these many years, I met many seniors going

through the challenges of illness, through my work as a Chaplain at Northwestern Hospital and in my ministry at Holy Name Cathedral. As these individuals reach a point where they cannot live as independently as they want, we prayed together and I invited them to see the possibility of new beginnings, perhaps in assisted living where they could be cared for and still be independent.

Many of you know I have been going through a variety of illnesses over the past months. I am blessed to have incredible caregivers through Luz O'Connor and her Lovely Hearts team. But when I was hospitalized in July with an infection, I listened carefully to what my doctors, my family, Fr. Greg, and you, the Holy Name community, had to say. I came to same the decision I witnessed so many others have made — I chose to move to an assisted living facility which meant my time as a resident in the Cathedral Rectory would come to an end.

This journey at the Cathedral started 30 years ago in November 1992 when I was on sick leave. I came to the Rectory to recover but, in the process, also discovered a new way for me to help as a priest. I saw that many patients at the hospital needed support, coping with illness, making decisions, quieting their minds. This was a new beginning for me as a chaplain, serving many patients and ministering with our many Ministers of Care from Holy Name Cathedral.

In my room is a picture of me looking at the Risen Christ, taken by a gifted photographer, Mark Joseph. I am holding the Cross in my hand -a deeply meaningful symbol as I held the Paschal Mystery of Christ who suffered, died and rose in sacrificial love. This mystery has been a hopeful mystery for me — for moments of loss and moments in my life where it was very fragile. I have learned that Christ suffers with me, embraces all of me, and that Christ rose for me to be my better self.


Each of you, in your own way, has mirrored this living, dying, and rising. Yes, I feel a sense of loss, especially not being a part of your lives and sharing in your ministry. You have shared the gifts of compassion, care, listening, humor (yes, you Fr. Greg!), and gifts of compassion and service.

Pope Francis recently said something that has helped me. He said "bitterly" complaining that "the world is evil; sin reigns" is "not Christian." We are called, instead, to have a view like that of God, who discerns what is good and persistently seeks it, sees it and nurtures it." The Gospel we share about Christ — he is always coming, coming in ways that can surprise us, bringing blessings to us if only we are open to it. The loss I feel for me is replaced with the invitation that Christ is inviting me to see the blessings, new faces and experiences ahead. This is not an ending but a new beginning for our friendship outside of the Cathedral.

I am deeply grateful to Cardinal Cupich who has contributed so much to all of us as a housemate over the past eight years, to Fr. Greg and my brother priests, the deacons, the Oblate sisters who have made me feel like I was at home, the wonderful Cathedral staff, and the parishioners who share their talents with so many. And most importantly, thank you to my family ... who always make sure I am cared for. Whenever I would leave my parents to go to seminary or to live out my ministry, my mother and father would blow me a kiss and say, "Safe home." Remember, wherever our home, we are held in love by God and the people in our lives.


Final Theology on Tap with Fr. Andy Matijevic

Want to become Catholic?

The Year-Round Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) Process at Holy Name is Unique

In most parishes, a person who feels a "calling" to consider becoming a part of the Catholic Church must wait until the next RCIA process begins around mid-September and concludes at the Easter Vigil.

Well, not at Holy Name. We welcome inquirers throughout the year. Our three RCIA teams believe that we invite adults to the journey when the Holy Spirit calls them. Each cohort (a group being formed together) gathers under the patronage of a saint, chosen by a team member. For instance:

- At Easter 2022, we welcomed nine adults from the St. Josaphat cohort into the Church.
- In early autumn 2022, we will welcome eight adults from the St. Therese de Lisieux cohort
- Next Easter, we plan to welcome adults from the St. Francis of Assisi cohort
- There are preparations to begin a new cohort in autumn 2022, yet to be given a patronage.

Blessings in a Backpack Begins Another School Year

Many children returning to school will benefit from the National School Lunch Program on weekdays. But when the weekend comes around, these same children are faced with food insecurity, not knowing where their next meal will come from until the following Monday. Our Blessings in a Backpack program is one way to mitigate this problem by providing

We plan to continue to serve St Thomas of Canterbury School for the upcoming school year. In addition, we are exploring expansion to another school. To meet this growing demand, we need help from our volunteer community. Some of the needs include:

Program Management Coordinators

This group will provide an overall leadership role in general program oversight. Will develop a knowledge of the general operations of the program and assist with coordination and overall planning.

Delivery Drivers

The program can not succeed without volunteers to deliver the packs to the school. We need team of volunteers so that this is not a burden to any one individual. St Thomas of Canterbury will be the delivery location, easily accessed from N Lake Shore Drive. We can deliver either Thursday or Friday during school hours.

Packing Weekly Bags

This involves packing the food sacks with the inventory of items that have been selected for the week. Our food items are typically delivered to the Cathedral midweek, so we typically pack on Thursday mornings in the Rectory. It usually takes about 90 minutes with a team packing 200 bags.

Fundraising

We will be developing a new strategy this year to raise





funds for our program. We welcome volunteers to brainstorm ideas and build plans for fundraising.

Backpack Additions

We welcome new ideas to add seasonal items or creative arts to add surprise elements to the children's bags. There are many ways to get involved in this

worthy program. Perhaps come to one of our weekly packing sessions to meet other members of ministry team. Just scan the QR Code and our program coordinator will be in touch with you.

Humility is a Virtue of Stewardship

Today's readings remind us of a chief virtue that characterizes the Christian steward: humility. This is a virtue that is widely thought of as a form of selfabasement. That understanding, however, is off the mark. Humility is simply the awareness of who (and Whose) we truly are.

On one hand, we are children of the Most High God who loved us into existence and who, by virtue of our Baptism, have the Holy Trinity dwelling within us. On the other hand, we are children who are completely dependent on God for our existence and for every breath we take.

Our Lord speaks of true humility in our Gospel passage from Luke, telling the parable of the guests invited to a wedding banquet and instructing us not to seek a place of honor at the banquet table, lest a more distinguished guest arrives and we are asked to move to a lower place.

Jesus has much more in mind here than an etiquette lesson. He is reminding us that all glory belongs to God. The visual image He offers in having to slink down to a lower seat at the table points out how silly we are when we forget to give God the credit for our blessings and talents.

On the other hand, when we live in humility recognizing that all we have is a gift from God and using those gifts to serve Him and others — then God "exalts" us by filling us with even more of Himself and His grace.

Jesus goes on to encourage us to serve and share our blessings with people facing circumstances that would make it impossible for them to offer us any worldly advantage or prestige — "the poor, the crippled, the lame."

Our attitude and how we serve and share should be centered on true humility — recognizing that we are all "little" ones in the eyes of God. We are all His children; brothers and sisters invited to our Father's heavenly banquet.


