Reflections from Our Rector.



Dear People of God.

The month of September clearly speaks of change. Children resume classroom studies — the summer vacation gives way to the season of fall — baseball pennant races — Bears football – and all of us telling each other that the months are

flying by much too quickly!

The start of the school year stresses the importance of faith, education, and studies. What lessons are the children learning? What lessons are we teaching both in and outside the classroom? I share with you what was sent to me several years ago.

Interview with God

I dreamed I had an interview with God. "So, you would like to interview me?" God asked. "If you have the time," I said. God smiled. "My name is Eternity. What questions do you have in mind for me?" I said. "What surprises you most about humankind?"

God answered, "That they get bored with childhood. They rush to grow up and then long to be children again. That they lose their health to make money and then lose their money to restore their health. That by thinking anxiously about the future, they forget the present, such that they live in neither the present nor the future. That they live as if they will never die and die as if they have never lived."

God's hand took mine and we were silent for a while. And then I asked, "As a parent, what are some of life's lessons you want your children to learn?"

God replied with a smile, "To learn that they cannot make anyone love them. What they can do is let themselves be loved. To learn that it is not good to compare themselves to others. To learn that a rich person is not one who has the most but is the one who needs the least. To learn that it only takes a few seconds to open profound wounds in persons we love, and it takes many years to heal them. To

learn to forgive by practicing forgiveness. To learn that there are persons who love them dearly, but simply do not know how to express or show their feelings. To learn that two people can look at the same thing and see it differently. To learn that it is not always enough that they be forgiven by others, but that they must always forgive themselves. And to learn I am here always."

And never lose a sense of humor — keep reading!

Did you hear about the Texas teacher who was helping one of her kindergarten students put on his cowboy boots? He asked for help and she could see why. Even with her pulling and him pushing, the little boots still didn't want to go on.

Finally, when the second boot was on, she had worked up a sweat. She almost cried when the little boy said, "Teacher, they're on the wrong feet." She looked and sure enough, they were. It wasn't any easier pulling the boots off than it was putting them on.

She managed to keep her cool as together they worked to get the boots back on --- this time on the right feet. He then announced, "These aren't my boots." She bit her tongue rather than get right in his face and scream, "Why didn't you say so?" like she wanted to. And once again she struggled to help him pull the ill-fitting boots off his little feet.

No sooner had they got the boots off when he said. "They're my brother's boots. My mom made me wear 'em."

Now she didn't know if she would laugh or cry. But she mustered up the grace and courage she had left to wrestle the boots on his feet again. Helping him into his coat, she asked, "Now, where are your mittens?"

He said, "I stuffed them into the toes of my boots."

What I Find Rewarding About the Priesthood

ast Sunday, at our final 2022 Theology on Tap, I answered some questions that people were interested in asking a priest. They were all excellent questions, and I enjoyed my time thinking about the answers on the spot. But as I thought more deeply about some of the questions, I wanted to answer one of them in more detail.



The question was, "what do I find most rewarding about priesthood?" I can't remember the exact answer I gave. But the answer was simple as I thought more about it Sunday night after the event and Monday morning. What I find most rewarding about priesthood is I am doing what I believe God created me to do. This belief is the foundation of a vocation. It is a calling. It is what we are made for. Some are made for marriage, some are made for religious life, and some are made for single life. And those people in larger vocations have specific vocations such as a teacher, a lawyer, a guide. And to live out one's vocation should bring a feeling of happiness and joy that cannot be taken away.


However, whatever your vocation does not mean there will not be struggles. In our Gospel today, Jesus tells

us whoever does not take up their cross cannot be his disciple. Every vocation has a cross. But every cross leads to life. And every cross leads to glory.

In fourteen months of priesthood, I have had a lot of joys and high points. And honestly, a few low points and sad moments. But at the end of the day, what is rewarding is even in the sorrowful moments of my priesthood, knowing I am doing what I believe God called me to do, scatters the darkness. My hope in my priesthood is to bring God to the people I serve. Whether the families whose loved ones I anoint in the hospital, the person who comes to confession, the wanderer who comes to Mass, the couple I prepare for marriage, or the person I meet after Mass.

So what is most rewarding so far in my priesthood? I love being a priest because I have felt the call to serve God in this way since I was eight years old, and I am doing it. I have had the support of my family, friends, and parishioners at my ordination and every day since then. I am blessed to serve as the Cathedral's Associate Pastor and Director of Worship. I am blessed to be loved by God and by his people, a sinner, and a disciple on the journey with you. 

Theology 101

In Modern Society, it's Hard to Be Humble

esus spoke often and forcefully about humility. The phrase "Whoever exults himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles. himself will be exulted" occurs regularly in the gospels. Although



humility has a prominent place in Jesus' teaching, it does not have such a prominent spot in our awareness today.


In fact, our contemporary mindset positions a humble person as odd or even psychologically unhealthy, something like a living doormat. Humility is associated with groveling, putting oneself down, and having a negative self-image coupled with low self-esteem. As a consequence, we may feel caught between Jesus extolling humility and our contemporaries trying to move well beyond it. Who is right and what does this all mean?

Resources for understanding humility and finding models of it are rare. In our world, people often look to public figures to give them some sense of how to live

the good life or even to understand what the good life is. Do not, however, expect anyone from the world of politics, entertainment, or business to cast some light on humility. The ideal in most sectors of life today is bold self-assertiveness. We do, however, have ways to understand genuine humility by drawing on our biblical and spiritual tradition.

Saint Thomas Aguinas, for example, wrote about humility in many different contexts. In some of his writings, he approaches humility in an especially striking way. He links humility with honesty. One commentator summed up Saint Thomas' position this way: humility is the honest pursuit of one's own excellence. For our contemporaries, that may seem to put a strange spin on humility, but further reflection bears out how insightful Saint Thomas was. To be humble is to own one's gifts and limitations. This amounts to a true recognition of who we really and truly are — no more and no less. Beyond this fundamental and honest self-recognition stands self-acceptance, claiming our lives in all their complexity. Finally, what begins in honest self-knowledge and self-acceptance leads to a way of living, deciding, and acting guided by both.

Want to become Catholic?

The Year-Round Rite of Christian Initiation (RCIA) Process at Holy Name is Unique

In most parishes, a person who feels a "calling" to consider becoming a part of the Catholic Church must wait until the next RCIA process begins around mid-September and concludes at the Easter Vigil.

Well, not at Holy Name. We welcome inquirers throughout the year. Our three RCIA teams believe that we invite adults to the journey when the Holy Spirit calls them. Each cohort (a group being formed together) gathers under the patronage of a saint, chosen by a team member. For instance:

- At Easter 2022, we welcomed nine adults from the St. Josaphat cohort into the Church.
- In early autumn 2022, we will welcome eight adults from the St. Therese de Lisieux cohort
- Next Easter, we plan to welcome adults from the St. Francis of Assisi cohort
- There are preparations to begin a new cohort in autumn 2022, yet to be given a patronage.

hat an extraordinary day!" the boy exclaimed, and as soon as he had his mother's attention, he asked, "What is going on in the village today? Why is everyone carrying a broom and dustpan? And you are also carrying a mop. Is this a new kind of fashion festival?"

His mother chuckled and answered the boy explaining, "We are heading to church to clean our spiritual home." This is a regular event in the boy's village. The parish is the center of many everyday activities, and they want to make it known that they care for their church. People of the village would attend Mass, clean up their spiritual home and celebrate certain feast days. On national holidays, the people would recite many prayers and feast on delicious foods (all cooked at the parish center). The church campus was always filled. I grew up in this kind of neighborhood back in Vietnam.

When I came to Chicago and related these stories about my village, especially when talking to parishioners who live on the Southside (e.g., St. Bernadette in Evergreen Park), they would often tell me, "It used to be like that here in the States." I asked them. "How was your experience when the Church was the center of the neighborhood's life?" They all responded, "We loved it!" "So, why don't we continue this tradition?" I asked. Well, friends, you can help me answer this question.

Do we remember what King David did when the Ark of the Lord entered the city? He leaped, danced, offered sacrifices, and was very joyful. Why? Because David profoundly encountered the Lord. Where is the Ark of the Lord at the Cathedral? It is the Tabernacle.

And do we remember what Jesus did when he went to the temple and saw people selling doves, raising their voices for attention to get a better sale, sometimes cheating other worshipers, and leaving dust and trash in the temple? Jesus drove them out and said, "Don't





make my Father's house a marketplace."

I am always amazed by people who try to come to Church for Mass or devotions, even though they are not on their way to work or travel. Some even spend a few minutes pulling out weeds in the courtyard, picking up the trash around the campus. It is so encouraging and awe-inspiring to witness those holy examples, and I admire them for them. Why do people do so? Because it is the Lord's house and our spiritual home. JMJ




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
