

Dear People of God.

About ten years ago, I was having breakfast with my mother in her home. I noticed an Ann Landers column written over 30 years ago sitting on the table. The column and the six points were old, but the message is relevant to our lives

today. I share with you....

Thoughts to Ponder

Several years ago, the sociology department of Duke University did a study on "Peace of Mind." Several factors were found to contribute greatly to emotional and mental stability. They are:

- 1. The absence of suspicion and resentment. Nursing a grudge was a major factor in unhappiness.
- 2. Not living in the past. An unwholesome preoccupation with old mistakes and failures leads to depression.
- 3. Not wasting time and energy fighting conditions you cannot change. Cooperate with life, instead of running away from it.
- 4. Refuse to indulge in self-pity when life hands you a raw deal. Accept the fact that nobody gets through life without some sorrow and misfortune.
- 5. Cultivate the old-fashioned virtues love, honor, compassion, and loyalty.
- 6. Find something bigger than yourself to believe in. Self-centered, egotistical people score lowest in any test for measuring happiness.

We all seek peace of mind, and I am convinced, a deep faith in God must be at the heart of this search. The ride is never easy, and the following true story illustrates how struggle is part of life's journey.

A man found a cocoon of a butterfly. One day a small opening appeared. He sat and watched the butterfly for several hours as it struggled to force its body through that little hole.

Then it seemed to stop making any progress. It appeared as if it had gotten as far as it could, and it could go no further. So, the man decided to help the butterfly. He took a pair of scissors and snipped off the remaining bit of the cocoon.

The butterfly then emerged easily. But it had a swollen body and small shriveled wings.

The man continued to watch the butterfly because he expected that, at any moment, the wings would enlarge and expand to be able to support the body, which would contract in time.

Neither happened! In fact, the butterfly spent the rest of its life crawling around with a swollen body and shriveled wings. It was never able to fly.

What the man, in his kindness and haste, did not understand was that the restricting cocoon and the struggle required for the butterfly to get through the tiny opening were God's way of forcing fluid from the body of the butterfly into its wings so that it would be ready for flight once it achieved its freedom from the

Sometimes struggles are exactly what we need in our lives. If God allowed us to go through our lives without any obstacles, it would cripple us. We would not be as strong as we could have been. We could never fly!

With the grace and help of God, especially during time of struggle and pain – soar like an eagle!

Be Thankful for Guardian Angels, Our Personal Intercessors

ne of the first prayers I learned as a child was the Guardian Angel prayer. Oct. 2 on the General Liturgical Calendar is the Feast of the Guardian Angels, but we won't celebrate it at Mass because it falls on a Sunday this year. The feast reminds us we have a guardian angel. We all have a



personal friendship with them because they are with us in all of life's moments.

Angels are different than humans. When humans die, they do not become angels when they enter heaven. "Angles are spiritual creatures who glorify God without ceasing and serve his saving plans for other creatures" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 350). Humans die; angels do not. Angels serve others by promoting the divine plan of salvation, and humans learn what it means to serve God through their life of discipleship.

Throughout sacred scriptures, angels play a role in salvation history. From saving Lot from the destruction in Sodom and Gomorrah (Genesis 28-29) to guiding Moses and the Israelites from slavery to freedom (Exodus 32) to helping Tobiah, who suffered from cataracts as shown through the Book of Tobit, and even aiding the Prophet Daniel and whom the Prophet sees in the end times. In the New Testament, it is an

angel who delivers the message to Mary of the desire of God to become man, where she proclaims she is the handmaiden of the Lord (Luke 1:38) to proclaim the joyful news of the Resurrection to the women who came to the tomb early in the morning (Matthew 28:5).

Angels are spiritual creatures created by God as immortal beings to journey with us in life and announce the plan of salvation. There are three levels of angels: seraphim, cherubim, and thrones; dominions, virtues, and powers; principalities, archangels, and angels.

We trace the belief in guardian angels back to the Gospel of Matthew, when Jesus says, "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Matthew 18:10). Everyone has a guardian angel, everyone has a personal intercessor to God in heaven. What a beautiful thing to reflect on! We have a personal angel praying to God on our behalf!

As we continue to live, move, and have our being in God's ultimate design and wisdom, let us take the time to reflect on our Guardian Angel, particularly this weekend, as we honor their feast day.

The angel that God entrusted to us since our conception is with us in every step of life, guiding us, protecting us, and praying for us. Let us never take for granted the good and bad moments of life because even if we are alone, our angel is there to light, guard, rule, and guide us.


Grammy-nominated artist Stephen Tharp is recognized as one of the great concert organists of our



The Spirit of St. Padre Pio **Evangelizes**

The Catholic Church recognizes St. Pio as the patron saint of civil defense worker, adolescents and his birthplace of Pietrelcina, Italy. Pio suffered from

several illnesses most of his life and bled daily from stigmata wounds for 50 years, according to his biography by the Saint Pio Foundation. His feast day is Sept. 23.

Since 2019, Holy Name Cathedral has sponsored the Padre Pio Prayer group. Once a month, the group gathers for Mass, prayer and spiritual

direction, in accordance to the spirituality of St. Pio. Even during the pandemic, the group prayed for those affected not only by the illness and death, but also for the spiritual and emotional crises in people's lives. They evangelize in a quiet and spiritual manner for all humanity and mostly unknown.



Members of our Padre Pio Prayer Group, gathered for Mass, Sept. 17, in the Chapel, to celebrate the Feast of St. Pio, Sept. 23. In his homily, Fr. Lou Cameli spoke of how St. Pio modeled humility as a way of Catholic living. Prior to dismissal, Victoria Almeida distributed copies of "Imitation of Christ," written by Thomas A. Kempis. Victoria recalled encounters with each person: the loss of a loved one. joyful encounters and a shared love of God.

Beginning with the 9am Mass, the group continues with devotional prayers and concludes with a meeting in the rectory. Saturdays starting Oct. 15



Stewardship is a Privilege and a Responsibility

Our readings today show us that living a stewardship way of life, that is, a life focused on serving God and His Kingdom, is not easy. They also show us that our lives belong to God, not to us and that God will indeed bring about the fulfillment of His kingdom. We just need to have faith that He can do it and commit to our small part in His grand design. This is both our privilege and responsibility as Christian stewards.

Jesus makes this privilege and responsibility clear in today's Gospel passage from Luke. When the apostles ask the Lord to increase their faith. He tells them that even a mustard seed-sized faith is all that is needed to move mountains (because it is God who does the heavy lifting). We need only take the tiniest step forward, and He will do the rest.

But living our lives in His service is also very much our responsibility, as Jesus explains through the parable of the unprofitable servant later in this passage. Our Lord describes a scene in which a servant has just come in from tending to the master's affairs and asks whether it would be reasonable for the master to begin waiting on his servant. Of course, it would not be reasonable! The servant would be expected to continue to serve his master until he has completed the work the master has given him that day. Jesus says we should have this same attitude before God.

The time, talents, and treasure entrusted to us are all God's. Our very lives belong to Him. Whatever we do on God's behalf with our lives and our gifts is simply our God-given responsibility.

The stewardship way of life makes the privilege and responsibility of serving Christ and His kingdom a reality.
