Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God.

The Gospel of Matthew contains the powerful teaching known as the Beatitudes. Jesus sketches the new spirit of the Kingdom of God for all who would listen-be open – and willing to be challenged. The Beatitudes are literally BE-

ATTITUDES or ATTITUDES OF BEING. What are my BE-ATTITUDES or posture towards life? Faith? Living out the Gospel? Have all my life's experiences made me bitter or better? Am I aging gracefully or a pain to others? The Spirit of God is always at work in our lives. We all have good days and tough days - wonderful memories and moments which have broken our hearts. With the help and grace of God, I choose how my attitudes and actions will affect my life and the lives of others – every day. The following story wonderfully captures an elderly woman's response to the gift of life.

The 92-year-old, petite, well-poised lady, who is fully dressed each morning by eight o'clock, with her hair fashionably coiffed and makeup perfectly applied, even though she is legally blind, moved to a nursing home today. Her husband of seventy years recently passed away, making the move necessary.

After many hours of waiting patiently in the lobby of the nursing home, she smiled sweetly when told her room was ready. As she maneuvered her walker to the elevator, I provided a visual description of her tiny room, including the eyelet sheets that I had hung on her window. "I love it," she stated with the enthusiasm of an eight-year-old having just been presented with a new puppy.

"Mrs. Jones, you haven't seen the room...just wait." "That doesn't have anything to do with it," she replied. "Happiness is something you decide on ahead of time. Whether I like my room or not doesn't depend on how the furniture is arranged...it's how I arrange my mind. I already decided to love it...It's a decision I make every morning when I wake up. I have a choice: I can spend the day in bed recounting the difficulty I have with the parts of my body that no longer work or get out

of bed and be thankful for the ones that do. Each day is a gift, and as long as my eyes are open, I'll focus on the new day and all the happy memories I've stored away...just for this time in my life."

Old age is like a bank account...you withdraw from what you've put in.

At the same time, God has blessed us with many gifts. It's so easy to take life, faith, love and one another for granted. The gift of humor is sometimes overlooked or "frowned upon." The dark clouds and shorter hours of daylight can melt when mixed with a douse of humor! Enjoy ... and share the following with family and friends.

- The prospective father-in-law asked, "Young man, can you support a family?" The surprised groom-tobe replied, "Well, no, I was just planning to support your daughter. The rest of you will have to fend for vourselves."
- A little boy in church for the first time watched as the ushers passed around the offering plates. When they came near his pew, the boy said loudly, "Don't pay for me, Daddy. I'm under five."
- During my brother's wedding, my mother managed to keep from crying until she glanced at my grandparents. My grandmother had reached over to my grandfather's wheelchair and gently touched his hand. That was all it took to start my mother's tears flowing. After the wedding, Mom went over to my grandmother and told her how that tender gesture triggered her outburst. "Well, I'm sorry to ruin your moment," grandmother replied, "but I was just checking to see if he was still alive."
- "Oh, I sure am happy to see you," the little boy said to his grandmother on his mother's side. "Now maybe Daddy will do the trick he has been promising us." The grandmother was curious. "What trick is that?" she asked. "I heard Daddy tell Mommy," the little boy answered, "that he would climb the walls if you came to visit."

Today's Gospel contains a wellknown parable of the widow and the corrupt judge. One of the main points of the parable is,



namely, that persistence is necessary in prayer remains timeless. So when Jesus pictured this widow approaching a corrupt judge, his point was not about persistence but resolute persistence in the face of nearly insurmountable odds. In the end, this is a definitive portrait of faith.

The widow persists. Carrying the grief of death and injustice, the widow keeps coming back to the dishonest judge. What if grief propelled her into action? What was there to lose by seeking justice? More importantly, there was everything to gain: new life and new possibilities. Seeking justice gave the widow a sense of purpose. Instead of dwelling on what was, she focused on what was possible.



Celebrate the Rosary in the Month of October

he month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. The feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary is Oct. 7 and is a memorial of the miraculous battle of Lepanto in 1571, a naval battle between the Holy League, comprised of Spain, Italy, and the Military Order of Malta, against the Ottoman



Empire. The Ottoman Empire's naval fleet had not lost a battle in over a century, which contributed to the expansion of their empire.

Pope Pius V created the Feast of Our Lady of Victory as Oct. 7, to commemorate this victorious battle, and over the centuries before and after this battle in 1571. various other days celebrated Our Lady of Victory for her intercession in action. Following the Second Vatican Council, the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary was set to Oct. 7 as an obligatory memorial, meaning we must use the prayers for the Mass that day.

Throughout October, I invite you to take time and ponder the great mystery of the Holy Rosary. From early Christian days, the desert fathers had braided strands containing 150 knots to help them pray the 150 psalms. By popular belief, the Rosary is believed to have been given to St. Dominic de Guzman in 1214. However, records show the style and devotion to the Rosary were around in the 9th century before Dominic was born.

Regardless of how the Rosary was created/formed, it is a beautiful sacramental of our faith, something that points us to Jesus of Nazareth. The Rosary is a prayer of meditation and contemplation on the Scriptures, but more so on the life of our Lord. Pope St. John Paul II said in his 2002 Apostolic Letter "On the Most Holy Rosary" that "to recite the rosary is nothing other than to contemplate with Mary the face of Christ." To pray the Rosary is to look at Jesus, with Mary our Mother, guiding us to see him as she sees him.

With John Paul II's Apostolic Letter, he added a fourth set of mysteries to the Rosary, the luminous mysteries to go along with the other mysteries — the Sorrowful, the Joyful and the Glorious mysteries.

May this month serve as a reminder that we have a powerful intercessor on our behalf, Mary, our Mother. Even if praying a whole rosary is daunting or tedious, try to pray a decade a day and allow Mary to guide you closer to her Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ.

I can see in Luke and many others that "they live their young adult years as if it was their first and last day to live." If we let the Word of God live in our hearts, we will not allow any opportunities in life to pass us by without living it to its fullness. What is your first and last, your only time to do what? 

Stewardship Requires Humility, Reflection

In last week's readings we were encouraged to remain persistent and constant in our prayer life.
Today we focus on



the proper attitude of a steward at prayer.

In the Gospel passage from Luke, Jesus illustrates the humble attitude we must have as we approach God in prayer through a parable of two praying men. One is a Pharisee, a man with respected status, theological training and all the right credentials. He marches right up to the front of the temple to speak a prayer "to himself," thanking God for making him just a little bit superior to everyone else!

The other man is a tax collector, known by those of his day to be a cheater. In contrast to the Pharisee, he stands near the back and cries out to God in a simple and honest way: "Be merciful to me a sinner."

Jesus tells us that it is the tax collector and not the Pharisee who leaves the temple justified. Why?

The Pharisee was full of self as he approached God. He felt no real need for God as he rattled off his resume of good works and spiritual practices. He was simply going through the motions of prayer. His lack of humility prevented him from entering into a real dialogue with the Father. He was not transformed by his time of prayer because he was so full of himself that He left God no space to enter in.

The tax collector, by contrast, emptied himself as he approached God. He recognized who he truly was (a sinner) and asked simply for mercy, leaving all the rest up to God. This is the kind of attitude that God can work with! This is how a good steward prays — with trust, with complete openness to God's will, with a listening mind and heart, ready to serve as God leads.
