

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

Please read both stories from the start and do not skip to the end. The ending left me speechless ... I have nothing to add.

Story Number One

Many years ago, Al Capone virtually owned Chicago. Capone was

notorious for everything from bootlegged booze and prostitution to murder. Capone had a lawyer nicknamed "Easy Eddie." Eddie was very good and kept Al out of jail for a long time.

To show his appreciation, Capone paid him very well. Eddie lived the high life and gave little consideration to the Mob atrocities that went on around him.

Eddie did have one soft spot — his son. Eddie saw to it that his son had the best clothes, cars and education. And, despite his involvement with organized crime, Eddie tried to teach him right from wrong. Eddie wanted his son to be a better man than he was.

Yet, with all his power, there were two things he couldn't give his son: a good name or a good example.

One day, Easy Eddie reached a difficult decision. Easy Eddie wanted to rectify the wrongs he had done.

He decided he would go to the authorities and tell the truth about Capone, clean up his tarnished name, and offer his son some resemblance of integrity. To do this, he testified against the Mob, knowing the great cost.

Within the year, Easy Eddie's life ended in a blaze of gunfire. But in his eyes, he had given his son the greatest gift, at the greatest price he could ever pay. Police removed from his pockets a rosary, a crucifix, a religious medallion and a poem clipped from a magazine.

The poem read: "The clock of life is wound but once, and no man has the power to tell just when the hands will stop at a late or early hour. Now is the only time you own. Live, love, toil with a will. Place no faith in time. For the clock may soon be still."

Story Number Two

World War II produced many heroes. One such man was

Lt. Cmdr. Butch O'Hare. He was a fighter pilot assigned to the aircraft carrier Lexington in the South Pacific.

One day his squadron was sent on a mission. After he was airborne, he looked at his fuel gauge and realized that someone had forgotten to top off his fuel tank.

He would not have enough fuel to complete his mission and get back to his ship. His flight leader told him to return to the carrier. Reluctantly, he dropped out of formation and headed back to the fleet.

On his return, he saw something that turned his blood cold; a squadron of Japanese aircraft was speeding its way toward the American fleet.

The American fighters were gone, and the fleet was all but defenseless. He couldn't reach his squadron nor could he warn the fleet.

Laying aside all thoughts of personal safety, he dove into the formation of Japanese planes, attacking one surprised enemy plane and then another. Butch firing until all his ammunition was finally spent.

Undaunted, he continued. He dove at the planes, trying to clip a wing or tail in hopes of damaging as many enemy planes as possible. Finally, the exasperated Japanese squadron took off in another direction.

Deeply relieved, Butch O'Hare and his tattered fighter limped back to the carrier. Upon arrival, the film from the gun-camera mounted on his plane showed he had destroyed five enemy aircraft. For his actions, he became the Navy's first Ace of WWII and the first Naval Aviator to win the Medal of Honor.

A year later, Butch was killed in aerial combat at the age of 29. His hometown would not allow his memory to fade, and today, O'Hare International Airport is named in tribute to his courage. So, the next time you're at O'Hare, visit Butch's memorial displaying his statue and his Medal of Honor. It's located between Terminals 1 and 2.

So what do these stories have to do with each other? Butch O'Hare was "Easy Eddie's" son.

For several weeks, we've felt the drama of end times building. Today, we find ourselves one Sunday away from the end of the



liturgical year, and the heat of impending judgment is high. The Gospel describes a terrible time of trial. Yet, as in the prophecy from Malachi (first reading), the faithful who persevere will be protected.

Jesus lays out the brutal path of martyrdom in today's Gospel. Those who give their lives for Christ will be seized, persecuted and even betrayed by the people closest to them. Yet amid this torture, Jesus promises "Not a hair on your head will be destroyed." (Luke 21:10). Jesus' teachings often involve holding two seemingly opposite realities in tension: death and life, poverty and riches, pain and salvation. Our call is to trust God's abiding love for us.



Yes, Cremation is Allowed in the Catholic Church

or years there has been a misunderstanding of the practice of cremation within the Catholic Church. The Church prohibited cremation in the first century until the 1960s for a few reasons. Cremation was primarily the use of deposition of the deceased for pagans and atheists. Since



death is the end of one's life and they don't believe in the resurrection, the cremation is the total annihilation of the body. It was believed that to destroy the body through cremation would be the final way to deny the existence of the resurrection, and by extension, of God.

In 2016, the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith issued an instructional document, "Ad resurgendum cum Christo/ To Rise with Christ," clarifying the Church's stance on cremation. The burial of the body gives tangible belief in the resurrection of the dead at the end of time. Burial also honors the dignity of the body, as each person is uniquely made in the image and likeness of God (To Rise with Christ, 3). Through a full-body burial, we show our belief in the resurrection and respect for the body, ultimately giving a fuller expression of the belief of our Christian faith in the face of death.

Since the Second Vatican Council in 1963, the Church changed to permit cremation with some parameters. Because of rising costs of a traditional full-body funeral, immediate cremation and a funeral Mass is becoming more popular. However, that is not the preferred way. The current stance of the Catholic Church is that the Church permits cremation; however, it prefers the body to be present for the vigil for the deceased (wake) and the funeral Mass. After the Mass, the body can be cremated and buried in a cemetery. The cremated remains should not be kept at home, scattered or divided among the family.

It is important to remember whether it is a full-body burial or cremation, the deceased's body should be treated with the utmost care and respect. We believe the body will rise from the dead because this body was made in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). This body was a dwelling for the Holy Spirit and received the body of Christ through the reception of the Holy Eucharist.

It is never too early to talk about your funeral plans with family, your Church's pastoral ministers or the staff at a funeral home or cemetery. With so many decisions, planning your funeral will take pressure off your loved ones and ensure your wishes are followed. As Christians, whether buried in the grave or having your cremated remains entombed in a niche, we continue to profess that when the trumpet sounds, all will rise from the dead to eternal glory.

Closing of the Holy Door

For the past year, we have been celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini's canonization.



Mother Cabrini was the first U.S. citizen to be canonized a saint and the first Chicagoan. On Oct 15, we blessed and dedicated a bas-relief reliquary containing a 1st class relic of Mother Cabrini, as well as a life size statue of her in our Courtyard. Throughout the year, the Holy Door was open, allowing pilgrims to obtain a plenary indulgence having fulfilled the necessary requirements. With Mother Cabrini's feast day on Nov. 13, the Holy Year has now concluded, and the Holy Door is now 'closed.' The next Jubilee Year with the opening of the Holy Door will be in 2025, with the universal theme of: Pilgrims of Hope.

Having traversed several blocks from home through a snow blizzard, I stopped momentarily to clear snow from my hood. As I raised my head to lead onward, I saw a person before me with what appeared to be a walking stick flailing in the wind.



Before I knew it, I was holding a frail woman by her shoulders and saw that she wore an ID around her neck that read "deaf and blind." I secured her walking stick in her hand, gently cleared snow from her hood and coat, and made a forward motion with her walking stick. I laced my arm through hers to keep her safe and steady and to guide me. I asked our Lord to watch over us.

We walked the same path I had just walked and beyond. Amid this terrible blizzard, I maneuvered us around snow drifts too high to overcome alone. We crossed the street three times and walked at least half a mile when we arrived at a familiar, long road of single-family homes with large open front lawns.

Halfway down the street, she motioned to turn, and we walked up some stairs, where she rang the doorbell. A blind man answered the door. I expressed joy at her safe arrival by clapping our hands together. She took my hands in hers and attempted to say something, which I could not discern, but I could see the great effort in her face to try again and said, "God Bless You."

Dear Faith Community,

I recently heard a story told by a doctor that touched my heart.

The doctor was to perform emergency surgery on a very young girl. She needed blood immediately and her twin brother was the only compatible blood type. Time was of the essence. The doctor explained the best he could to the young boy that his donation of blood was a matter of "life and death." The young boy agreed, disappeared and made the donation for his sister. The little boy later saw the doctor after the successful surgery and asked, "Now when will I die?"

There are times, as your Rector, that I witness the private sacrifices members of our Faith Community make to care for a homebound spouse, sibling or child, to walk with those who are ill, to provide sustenance for the poor with meals and so much more. The Faith Community of Holy Name Cathedral understands clearly our Vision Statement: "A world in communion with Jesus Christ."

That world which we aspire to as His disciples, calls each one of us to bring the love and mercy of Jesus Christ to those troubled in body, mind or spirit. The gospel of Jesus calls us to sacrifice our very selves for others in His Holy Name. St. Teresa of Calcutta reminds us where this begins: "A smile, a simple smile is the beginning of love."

As special temporal needs arise in the parish I will provide financial support to individuals and groups to whom we minister. I do this quietly in your name through a special fund called The Parish Assistance Fund. This separate fund, so graciously supported for many years through the volunteer efforts of Fr. John Boivin, is the sole resource for me to quietly financially support our Catholic Charities Suppers and so many other important people and programs in your name. Fr. Ton Nyugen now thankfully coordinates Catholic Charities Thursday & Friday suppers.

I need your help to sustain this fund and meet other needs of Holy Name Cathedral, which is why I am initiating **The Rector's Annual Appeal** this year. I have decided once a year I will humbly ask each of you for a special gift to support the "quiet" acts of mercy and love which come so frequently to my e-mail, phone and the rectory door.

Your weekly Sunday collection supports our day-to-day operations and needs as a parish. This is a request to go a step further and to support exceptional urgent needs.
