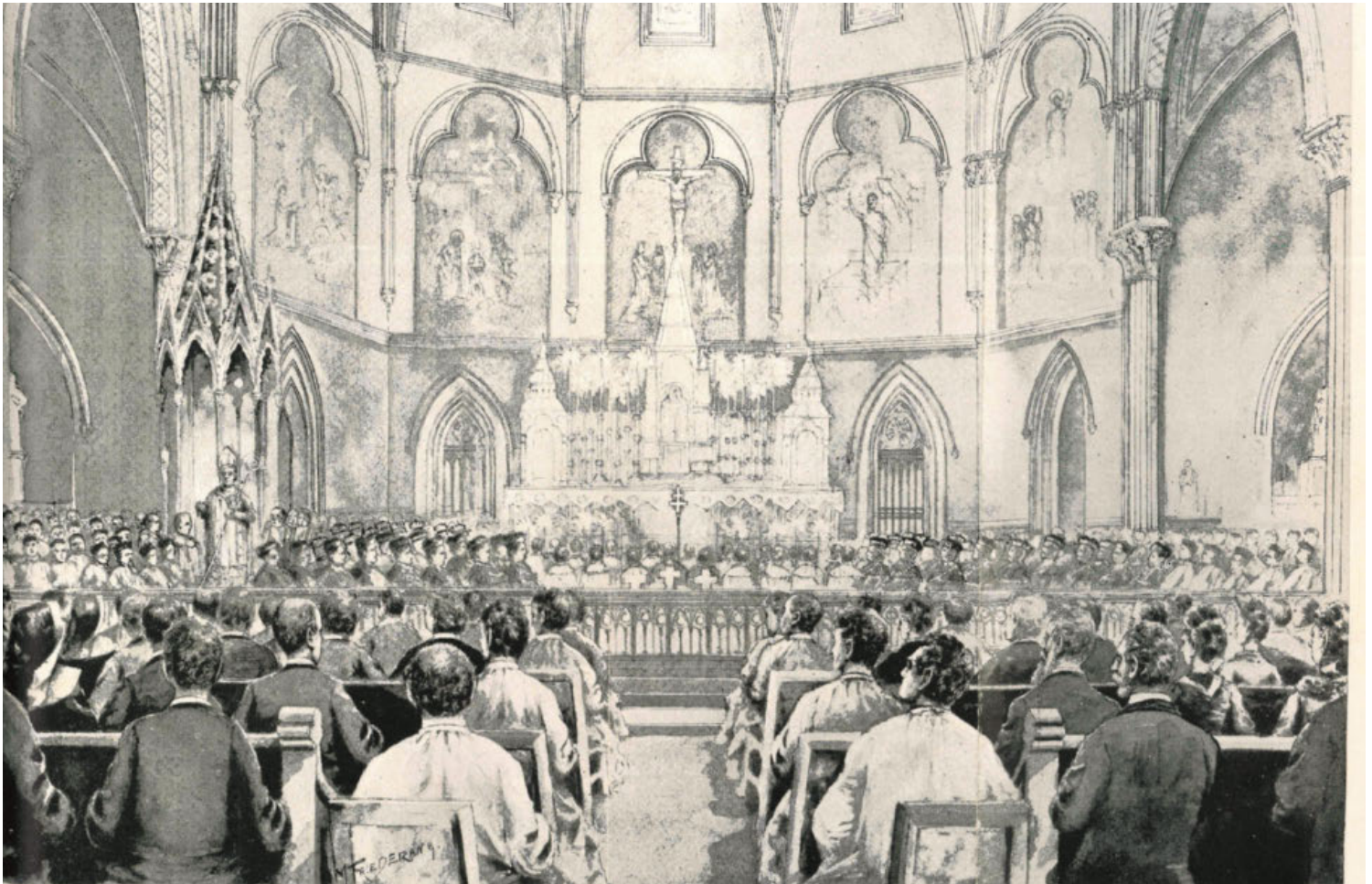

Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

In January 2014, Columbia magazine ran a marvelous article, “The Gospel of Life According to Pope Francis.” This article traces Pope Francis’ key pro-life statements, starting when he became Cardinal Bergoglio and including recent comments since his

Papacy began in March 2013.

During his 15 years as Archbishop of Buenos Aires to the present time, Pope Francis has always defended the dignity of human life from the moment of conception to natural death. Pope Francis has consistently had primary concern for the most vulnerable and defenseless human beings, including children (born and unborn), the disabled, and the elderly. We have seen this lived out on live television — inviting children into the sanctuary and kissing the elderly and sick.

Public Responsibility

‘I want to focus in particular on two stages of life that I consider essential for the growth in peace of different generations: childhood and old age. They are the two extremes of life, and they are the most vulnerable and the most forgotten. A society that abandons its children and eliminates its elderly is mortgaging its future.’

On Abortion

“The moral problem with abortion is of a pre-religious nature because the genetic code of the person is present at the moment of conception. This means that a human being already exists. I separate the issue of abortion from any religious concept. It is a scientific problem. To not allow further progress in the development of a being that already has the entire genetic code of a human being is not ethical. The right to life is the first human right. Abortion means killing someone who cannot defend himself.”

Saying “Yes” to Life

“All too often, as we know from experience, people do not choose life, they do not accept the ‘Gospel of Life’ but let themselves be led by ideologies and ways of thinking that block life, that do not respect life, because they are dictated by selfishness, self-interest, profit, power and pleasure, and not by love, by concern for the good of others. It is the eternal dream of wanting to build the city of man without God, without God’s life and love --a new tower of Babel.... Dear brothers and sisters, let us look to God as the God of Life, let us look to his law, to the Gospel message as the way to freedom and life.... Let us say “Yes” to life and not death. Let us say “Yes” to freedom and not enslavement to the many idols of our time. In a word, let us say “Yes to the God who is love, life, and freedom, and who never disappoints... Let us ask Mary, Mother of Life, to help us receive and bear constant witness to the ‘Gospel of Life.’”

“Be witness and diffusers of the “culture of life.” Your being Catholic entails a greater responsibility: first of all to yourselves, through a commitment consistent with your Christian vocation; and then to contemporary culture, by contributing to recognizing the transcendent dimensions of human life, the imprint of God’s creative work, from the first moment of its conception. This is a task of the new evangelization that often requires going against the tide and paying for it personally. The Lord is also counting on you to spread the ‘Gospel of Life.’”

Plenary Indulgence During the Jubilee Year at Holy Name

Pope Francis has granted special Indulgences to the faithful who observe and take part in the celebration of the Jubilee of Hope. One may gain this special Indulgence by participating in any pilgrimage, and fulfilling the usual conditions (see below) during the pilgrimage, to one of the 24 churches across the archdiocese

designated as Jubilee pilgrimage sites for the Jubilee of Hope from Dec. 29, 2024, through Dec. 28, 2025.

The pilgrimage could be by an individual, or it could be a group of the faithful from the parish. For example, a parish might organize a group to go to a particular site for the celebration of Mass, or they might organize a group to go together to a particular site for a visit.

What must one do in order to receive the special Plenary Indulgence?

In order to gain this special Indulgence, a Catholic is required to make sacramental Confession before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by celebrating the sacrament at the site during the parish's regularly scheduled times), receive the Eucharist at Mass before or after visiting a designated Jubilee pilgrimage site (it may be fulfilled by participating in Mass during the site's regularly scheduled times). In addition, a person is to make a profession of faith and offer prayers for the Holy Father's intentions.



In addition to and in conjunction with fulfilling these conditions, one may then take part in any of the following observances of the Jubilee of Hope.

- Make a pilgrimage to Holy Name Cathedral, or any one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there participate in Mass, or

the Sacrament of Penance, or take part in another liturgy or devotion (e.g., a liturgy of the word, the Liturgy of the Hours [Morning Prayer or Evening Prayer], the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary).

- One may also gain the Plenary Indulgence by visiting one of the designated Jubilee pilgrimage sites and there, for a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration or meditation before the tabernacle, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith (Nicene or Apostles' Creed), and invocations to Mary, the Mother of God.

- Those who for various reasons cannot participate in a Pilgrimage or visit, particularly the sick and people who are elderly and alone, e.g., confined to the home, those incarcerated, can obtain the Jubilee indulgence, under the same conditions if, united in spirit with the faithful who take part in person, they recite the Our Father, the Profession of Faith and invocations to Mary.

Ordinary Moments for Ordinary Time: The Offertory Rite

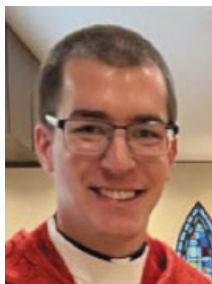

The offertory rite begins after the conclusion of the Prayers of the Faithful. We sit down, the music starts to play, and the Ushers begin to take the collection. While it may seem shallow to take a collection at Mass, “Oh, the Church is asking for money again,” it is essential to remember that, like any organization, the Church needs funding to perform her ministry. Like any organization, each parish has a different budget based on the scope of the ministries undertaken. The collection taken up at every Mass funds the parish’s ministries and helps fulfill the Church’s mission.

The mission at Holy Name Cathedral is to “form a community of disciples who inspire, nurture, and join people on their faith journey to encounter and grow in Jesus Christ.” We do that through Worship, Service, Evangelization, and Stewardship, the main pillars of the Cathedral’s strategic plan. By placing money in the basket or giving electronically, you are actively contributing to helping others grow in their faith, even without knowing the impact. Electronic giving is easy to set up and a safe way to consistently give without having to remember your envelope.

As the Ushers move through the pews for the collection, individuals attending Mass bring up the gifts of bread and wine from the halfway point at the Cathedral, symbolizing a procession. This signifies that the gifts we offer come from the community gathered. The bread symbolizes the work we have done over the past week; the wine symbolizes the sufferings we endure. As we know, the bread and wine become the body and blood of Jesus Christ, whose life, death, and resurrection changed the world. We then see that by offering our monetary treasure and the essential elements of bread and wine, we are contributing to Jesus’ saving actions here in our local community.

Everything we do in the liturgy has meaning and should



change us. As we continue to experience the offertory rite at each Mass, let us allow ourselves to be changed as we offer resources to carry on the mission, as we see the bread and the wine processed up, as we give what we have, both literal and spiritual, back to the Father, so through the priest, what we offer can be taken, blessed, broken, and shared, with the world.

Our mission states: Holy Name Cathedral, as both a parish and the seat of the Archdiocese of Chicago, forms a Faith Community of disciples who inspire, nurture, and join people on their faith journey to encounter and grow in Jesus Christ.

Cathedral Tours After 8:30, 10:30, 12:30 Masses Today

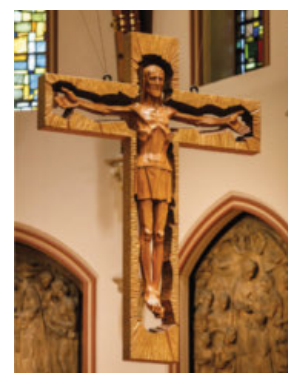

Learn & Be Inspired by St. Damien of Molokai

Come see 'Damien' Play with Wayne Messmer on March 2, 7pm in the Cathedral

Who was St. Damien?

Part 1 of 2: The man who would become St. Damien of Molokai was born in rural Belgium on January 3, 1840. His name was Jozef De Veuster, and he was the youngest of seven children. Growing up on the farm, Jozef was prepared to take over for his family, but he did not want the responsibility. Instead, he followed his older brother and two sisters, who took religious vows.

Jozef attended school until he turned 13 when his family needed his help on their farm full-time. He aided his family until he was old enough to enter the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary. As part of his commitment to the religious order, he took the new name of Damien after a sixth-century martyr, a common practice that symbolizes a new life and dedication to the faith.

In 1864, Damien's brother, who was also in the same religious order, was ordered to Hawaii. But his brother became ill, so Br. Damien, in a selfless act of love, offered to go in his brother's place.

The brothers worried that Br. Damien was too uneducated



to become a priest, although he was not considered unintelligent. Br. Damien demonstrated his ability by quickly learning Latin from his brother. He was also devoted to prayer, Br. Damien prayed daily before an icon of Saint Francis Xavier that he would be sent on the mission. Despite these challenges, his religious brothers agreed to send him and have him ordained.

Br. Damien arrived in Hawaii in March 1864 and was ordained as a priest on the Big Island of Hawaii two months later. He worked on the island for nine years as a priest, leading a meaningful yet undistinguished life.



In 1866, Hawaii established a leper colony on the Kalaupapa Peninsula on the island of Molokai. It was still mistakenly believed that leprosy was highly contagious. This belief resulted in the forced quarantine of leprosy patients. These people still needed spiritual and medical care, so Fr. Damien discerned his call to serve them. In 1873, Fr. Damien made the trip to care for these people in their colony.

Come See The 'Damien' Play on March 2 at Holy Name

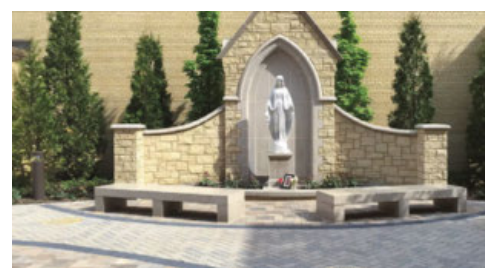
We will have a special presentation of "Damien," a one-man play by Aldyth Morris starring Chicago sports personality Wayne Messmer as Father (St.) Damien of Molokai on Sunday, March 2 at 7:00pm in the Cathedral.

The play tells a powerful true story of how a Belgium priest ministered to thousands of marginalized, abandoned men, women and children living with leprosy, which was an incurable and thought-to-be highly contagious disease in the 19th Century. These people were living in exile in an isolated leper colony in Molokai, Hawaii.

Tickets are free, but need to be reserved by scanning the QR code. Preferred, reserved seating is available for \$15 and includes a pre-play dinner. This reception starts after the 5:15pm Sunday Mass and runs until the play begins at 7:00pm. Reception attendees will be admitted through a separate door.

Stewardship Reflection

Let Us Take Care to Listen to Our Blessed Mother

Today's Gospel reading from John recounts the familiar story of the wedding feast at Cana when Jesus launched His public ministry by performing His first miracle at his mother's request.

In the midst of the feast, the Blessed Mother noticed that the wine had run out and pointed out the problem to Jesus. Then, she gave the servants instructions that are equally applicable to us modern-day stewards, saying, "Do whatever He tells you." Jesus gives the servants a simple and seemingly mundane task, telling them to fill some stone jars with water. They did what He told them to do. And Jesus used their obedience in the accomplishment of that simple task to perform His first miracle, turning the water into the choicest wine

Our Lord didn't have to include those servants to perform this miracle — He chose to. And today, 2,000 plus years

later, He still chooses to include us in the performance of His miracles through our cooperation with Him in using the gifts and talents He has given us. What a privilege!

Let us take care to listen to our Blessed Mother: let's examine our lives this week to see if we really are "doing whatever He tells us," cooperating with God to make the best use of the gifts He has given us for the benefit of those around us. If we all take this call seriously, He will perform miracles in our families and our parish.

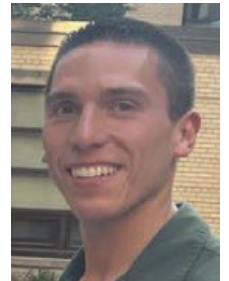
Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Begins Feb. 1
