Reflections from Our Rector ___



Dear People of God,

Easter Joy!! On this most glorious celebration of the power of life over death and love over hate. I would like to share the following story with you...

Two notoriously bad little brothers, Andrew and Joe, started to get into trouble soon after leaving the cradle.

They were always catching blame, and they usually deserved it. After they started a small riot in school, their parents decided to send the older son, Andrew, who was in the sixth grade, to their pastor for counseling. Little Andrew was terrified. He wondered what it would be like to be one-on-one with the pastor. The priest looked at the boy compassionately and asked, "Young man, where is Jesus?" The boy had no idea what to say and sat as silent as a stone. The priest asked again, "Where is Jesus?" Andrew's jaw remained locked. When the priest asked the question a third time with greater emphasis. Andrew bolted out of the parish office, raced home, and ran upstairs to pack. Seeing his younger brother, he said, "Joe, you'd better pack, too. They've lost Jesus, and I know for sure they're going to blame us!"

We know that Jesus is not lost! He who was thought to be dead lives! In fact, Jesus lives forever! Because of Jesus' victory over death, we are no longer lost; we are found and claimed as God's children forever.

We travel with Jesus from aloneness to fullness within a Faith Community, from brokenness to healing, from death to life. The Lord is risen, and we rise with Him.

We wonder what the meaning of this remarkable event is in our lives. We share the Lord's Easter peace, presence, and power on this great Easter Day. In return, the Lord tells us that he wants our love shown through lives that are lived for others. Jesus wants us to be real disciples. To be a real disciple of Jesus means three distinct things:

- 1. First, it means vulnerability. I must acknowledge that I cannot always be in control and turn to the Lord, trusting completely in Him. It means I accept life will not always be on my terms and allow God to work through me.
- 2. Secondly, it means that I live life deliberately. We are a pilgrim and mission people. Through our Baptism, we

are called to give witness to our loving God through our actions as well as our words. We are called to love this world continually back into life by what we do and say, and how we act and love.

3. Lastly, a disciple has a radical dependence on God. The Lord can make a difference in our lives if we give Him a chance. A disciple communicates frequently with God. The devil does not want us to consult with God.

The gospels do not explain Easter; instead, Easter explains the gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter; Easter gives meaning to our lives. Faith is the story we tell through our lives. Jesus discovered what to die for and what to live forever for.

For the believer, death means life is changed, not ended. We look forward to eternal Life with God.

My prayers are with you and all your loved ones for a blessed and joyous Easter.

It is truly remarkable that for 150 years, Catholics in River North, Gold Coast, and Streeterville have called Holy Name their parish church. This Cathedral, a beacon of faith, has been a spiritual home for Catholics throughout the Archdiocese, state, nation, and world. It's where we come to worship, pray, and be consoled and strengthened by celebrating the Sacraments. Our shared history is a testament to our faith and the enduring power of our community.

But, as we all know, time takes its toll. In 2008, a piece of our ceiling fell, prompting the closure of the Cathedral for structural checks. Then, in February 2009, an electrical fire in the ceiling was averted by the heroic efforts of our Chicago firefighters. These incidents serve as a stark reminder that we must act now to secure the future of our Cathedral for the next 150 years.

Our current lighting system, while once adequate, is now struggling to meet the demands of our daily Masses. The hardware shows wear and tear, and parts are no longer available, so it's time to upgrade. A new lighting system is not just a necessity, it's a game-changer. It will transform our worship space, enhancing the spiritual experience for generations to come. Your support is crucial in making this transformation a reality.

As we seek to raise the required \$1.7 million for the lighting project, we are reminded of our shared responsibility towards our Cathedral. The generosity of many does not go unnoticed. The lights are needed as we move further into this new millennium and gather to worship daily and give glory to His Holy Name.

May Our Lights Shine Ever Bright in This Easter Season

ight plays a crucial role in our life of faith. From candles and ■ physical lights in our worship spaces, light reminds us of the Resurrection and of being able to see. And sometimes, we take light for granted. Every year at Easter, parishes get a new Easter candle. The Easter candle is blessed at the Great Vigil of



Easter and symbolizes the Risen Lord. The Lord descended into the darkness of death and brought his light to those in darkness. We are given the same light at our baptism to dispel the evil of sin and death in our lives. The candle itself also contains deep symbolism to our life of faith.

Before we light the Easter candle, it is blessed with the year (showing every year it is a new candle), and five nails are put into the candle, symbolizing the five wounds of Christ on the Cross. After the blessing of the fire and the new Easter candle, the priest lights the candle by saying, "May the Light of Christ rising in glory dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." Then, the procession to the darkened church begins by following that single flame, the flame that even death cannot extinguish. As the faithful walk into the church that evening, the light spreads from the Easter candle to everyone else in the congregation. Once that blessed Light illumines the church, we sing the Exultet, the Easter Proclamation. This proclamation tells the story of salvation and how, on this night, Christ conquered death and rose victorious from the underworld. The Easter Vigil follows from there, when we proclaim Christ risen from the dead. The Easter candle is lit every day for 50 days during the Easter season and then for funerals and baptisms throughout the year as a symbol of life beginning and ending in Christ.

As candles provide light, so do the physical lights in our sacred space. Here at Holy Name Cathedral, our current lighting system is starting to wear out. For years, the faithful have gathered throughout the liturgical year to give glory and praise to God for his goodness and

offer thanks for the blessings He has showered upon us. Moving into this Easter season, there is a pressing need, as we have renewed our commitment to sharing in the spiritual light of Christ who has risen from the dead, to renew our commitment to supporting the physical lighting of the Cathedral, which proclaims the Holy Name of Jesus.

The projected lighting campaign, "Let There Be Light," reminds us that God created all things for his glory. Renewing the lighting system of the Cathedral will allow us to glory in the gift of this historic Cathedral. From the beautiful vaulted ceiling made entirely of wood to recalling our mortality as we gaze upon the six red galeri of our previous cardinal archbishops hanging from the ceiling to illuminating anew the Resurrection Crucifix, the new lighting system will enhance the way we worship here at Holy Name Cathedral.

The message of light dominates the Easter season: the Easter Candle, the light emanating from the angels at the Tomb, the light of the Risen Christ, and the light that shines in our hearts who profess Christ is risen. As we renew our desire to live in that light, may we show our commitment to supporting the physical light that shines when we gather in this place, where we continuously return to that encounter with the Risen One to share his light with others.

Have Questions? Join the New OCIA Inquiry Cohort

As we receive 32 adults into the Catholic faith at the Easter Vigil, we begin a new cohort for the coming year. These inquirers meet monthly and ask questions, share their faith journeys, and simply inquire about the faith.

On April 28, I will join Dr. Gloria Groom from the Art Institute of Chicago to offer a presentation linking art, faith, and the ecological concerns Pope Francis explored in his encyclical letter Laudato si': On the Care of Our Common Home.

They met a stranger traveling on the same road but did not recognize him as he explained why the Messiah needed to suffer these things to enter his glory. The disciples invite the stranger to continue talking with them as they journeyed to Emmaus and to share their dinner. As the stranger broke bread with them and gave thanks, the disciples' eyes were opened, recognizing him as Jesus. Their conversation and the breaking of bread symbolize the key parts of our Mass, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, opening us up to the true identity of Jesus in our midst.

Over the upcoming 50 days of Easter, leading up to the Road to Emmaus Revival on Sunday, June 8, we invite you to journey with our Faith Community. We will have a variety of programs for you to participate in including small groups to explore your personal Road to Emmaus, self-guided pilgrimages, witness videos, a special May Crowning event honoring our Blessed Mother, a fun-filled service event at the Lawson House, and a Faith & Fitness event exploring walking for spiritual reflection and physical health.

We also invite you this Easter to join our Holy Name Cathedral community on the **Hallow app**, embrace the freedom of the Resurrection as we pray with Sr. Miriam and other exciting guests through the spiritual classic, *Interior Freedom* by Fr. Jacques Philippe.

The Emmaus Moment

■ his is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad!" Hallelujah! The Lord is risen! With His Resurrection comes joy - absolute joy. It's the song of mercy, the hymn of God's goodness echoing through history. Jesus has conquered death. The stone the builders rejected has become



the cornerstone. That's not just a poetic phrase — it's the bedrock of our faith. I pray and hope this Easter that we encourage one another with St. Paul's words: "If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God." That invitation isn't easy in a world drowning in noise and distractions. The temptation is to skim the surface of life. But Easter calls us deeper.

During our Young Adults mission in Piura, Fr. Joe suggested a walk to St. Paulo Parish. Initially hesitant, I found that walk rewarding. When I asked an altar server about his favorite part of Mass, he excitedly recalled his First Communion and the Eucharist, describing it as the "source and summit of Christian life." At just twelve, he shared how prayer helped during his mother's illness, leading him to dedicate his life to God in gratitude. These moments are true Emmaus moments — ordinary yet profound.

This Easter, let's reflect on the unwavering desire of Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary, who sought the Lord at the tomb. How strong is our desire for heaven amidst the world's struggles? Let Easter awaken our hearts, prompting us to walk farther, listen deeper, and recognize Christ in the breaking of the bread. I love being a priest. JMJ.




