



There was a successful job recruiter who interviewed executives for top jobs around the country. He got his

clients to relax during the interview by having them take off their suit coats and talk about sports, their families, and their hobbies.

Once the recruiter had the client very relaxed, he asked them, "So what's your purpose in life?" Just about every person he interviewed was speechless when he asked this question. But one day, a man piped up without missing a beat and said, "The purpose of my life is to get to heaven and to take as many people as I can with me." The job recruiter was speechless!

The Paradox of Our Time

The paradox of our time in history is that we have taller buildings, but shorter tempers, wider freeways, but narrower viewpoints. We spend more but have less; we buy more, but enjoy less. We have bigger houses and smaller families, more conveniences, but less time. We have more degrees but less sense, more knowledge, but less judgment, more experts yet more problems, more medicines, but less wellness.

We drink too much, smoke too much, spend too recklessly, laugh too little, drive too fast, get too angry, stay up too late, get up too tired, read too little, watch TV too much, and pray too seldom. We have multiplied our possessions, but reduced our values. We talk too much, love too rarely, and hate too often.

We've learned how to make a living, but not a life. We've added years to life, not life to years. We've been all the way to the moon and back, but have trouble crossing the street to meet a new neighbor. We conquered outer space but not inner space. We've done larger things, but not better things.

We've cleaned up the air but polluted the soul. We've

conquered the atom, but not our prejudice. We write more, but learn less. We plan more, but accomplish less. We've learned to rush, but not to wait. We build more computers to hold more information, to produce more copies than ever, but we communicate less and less.

These are the times of fast food and slow digestion, big men and small characters, steep profits and shallow relationships.

These are the days of two incomes but more divorce, fancier houses, but broken homes. These are days of quick trips, disposable diapers, throwaway mortality, one-night stands, overweight bodies, and pills that do everything from cheer to quiet to kill. It is a time when there is much in the showroom window and nothing in the stockroom. A time when technology can bring this letter to you, and a time when you can choose either to share this insight, or just to hit delete...

Remember to spend time with your loved ones, because they won't be around forever. Remember, say a kind word to someone who looks up to you in awe, because that little person soon will grow up and leave your side.

Remember to give a warm hug to the one next to you, because that is the only treasure you can give with your heart, and it doesn't cost a cent.

Remember to say "I love you" to your partner and your loved ones, but most of all, mean it. A kiss and an embrace can mend hurt when it comes from deep within you.

Remember to hold hands and cherish the moment, for someday that person might not be there again. Give time to love, give time to speak! And give time to share the precious thoughts in your mind.

Sacred Heart of Jesus



An Essential, Sustaining Devotion for the Spiritual Journey

ecently, I spoke with a Jewish friend who was very curious about Catholic devotions. He wondered about devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Growing up with this devotion, I never found it strange. Still, to someone outside the family of faith, attachment to a



particular bodily organ of the Lord could seem odd.

To respond to my Jewish friend, I drew on a classmate's research in graduate school. Fortunately, he did his doctoral dissertation on the Sacred Heart in the theology of Karl Rahner, a giant of Catholic theology in the 20th century. My classmate uncovered the central dimension of this devotion.

According to Rahner, devotion to the heart of Jesus enables believers to anchor themselves in a true sense of the humanity of Jesus, who is, of course, true God and true man. The human heart of Jesus, who is one person, encapsulates both his human and divine love for us. In a most extraordinary way, the infinite and otherwise inaccessible love of God becomes close, accessible, and even palpable for us in the heart of Jesus. When we look at devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus in this way, it is clearly an essential part of our spiritual journey.

Pope Francis has furthered Rahner's thought and blessed us with an encyclical letter on the Sacred Heart of Jesus: Dilexit nos: On the Human and Divine Love of the Heart of Jesus Christ (Oct. 24, 2024). It is available online by searching "Dilexit nos Pope Francis."

This encyclical will be a major part of the spiritual legacy of Pope Francis. It is truly worth reading, pondering and using as a resource for prayer and inspiration. Rather than trying to summarize this rich text, permit me to offer a sampling of passages that spoke powerfully to me.

The heart of Jesus and the emotions of Jesus. After describing the human heart as the seat of our feelings, Pope Francis speaks of Jesus' deep emotions: "Jesus' words show that his holiness did not exclude deep emotions... He could be deeply moved and grieved, even to the point of shedding

tears. It is clear that Jesus was not indifferent to the daily cares and concerns of people, such as their weariness or hunger ..." (n. 44) That God feels for us through the human heart of Jesus is an extraordinary and consoling truth that we all need to absorb.

The mystery of the union of human and divine love in the heart of Jesus. "The eternal Son of the God. in his utter transcendence, chose to love each of us with a human heart. His human emotions became the sacrament of that infinite and endless love... In gazing upon the Lord's heart, we contemplate a physical reality, his human flesh, which enables him to possess genuine human emotions and feelings, like ourselves, albeit fully transformed by his divine love." (n. 60) The heart of Jesus helps us to know that God understands us and our human condition in all its dimensions from the "inside" of our human experience.

The social dimension of devotion to the Sacred Heart of **Jesus.** If, in the past, devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus was deeply personal and perhaps even individual and private, Pope Francis opens up larger social dimensions of the devotion. For example, in numbers 167 and following. he speaks of "extending Christ's love to our brothers and sisters." In numbers 205 and following, he reflects on "the social significance of reparation to the heart of Jesus Christ." We can see in a new and fresh way the inextricable link of the love of God and of others.

Dilexit nos is a precious gift that Pope Francis has given us. Take it up and receive it.

On Monday, Wish a Happy Birthday to the Blessed Mother

irthdays are a staple of our lives. We literally would not be here if there were not a day we were born. Some people like celebrating birthdays, while others do not. In the Catholic faith, it is a common misconception that the feast day of a saint is the day they were born. Although that may be the case



for some, most saints are remembered on their "heavenly birthday," the day they passed away.

However, since the Church is not opposed to birthdays, we celebrate three "nativities" or birthdays in our calendar year. The most obvious being the Nativity of the Lord, also known as Christmas, on Dec. 25. The second birthday we celebrate is that of John the Baptist, on June 24. The reason these two births are six months apart is found in the Gospel of Luke. After the Annunciation, when the Angel Gabriel appeared to Mary to announce the plan of salvation with her Yes, Gabriel said, "And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren." (Luke 1:36).

But also, the dates are based on the seasonal moons. John the Baptist said, "He must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30), and this is shown in the summer and winter solstices. With June 21, the days begin to decrease in the amount of sunlight, and after Dec. 21, the days increase in the amount of sunlight. A connection to faith and science is always a blessing!

And finally, the third nativity we celebrate is that of the Blessed Mother, which we celebrate on Sept. 8. Correct math shows us that nine months before Sept. 8 is Dec. 8. the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. The Feast of the Immaculate Conception is not when Jesus was conceived in Mary's womb, which is the Annunciation on March 25, but instead Dec. 8 recalls when Mary was conceived without original sin in the womb of her mother, St. Anne.

As Catholics, it is always worth noting that we do not worship or idolize the Blessed Mother. We honor her for her witness, her faith, courage, and love while she was among us. Without the birth of Mary, God's plan of salvation would not have occurred. God never forces His love upon us, and Mary, conceived without sin and full of grace (Luke 1:28), was completely open to the Will of God in her life. Her 'yes' to the Angel's message changed the course of human history.

We look to Mary, under her many beautiful and timeless titles, to guide us closer to her son, Jesus Christ. We look to Mary, throughout the Scriptures, who journeyed with Christ from his birth to his death and in his Resurrection. As we celebrate the birth of the Blessed Mother on Monday, let us renew our devotion to her, knowing that as she lives in eternal glory with her son in heaven, she can be our greatest intercessor for all of our needs. May we emulate her life by saying yes to what God asks of us, participating in his love, for all people.






