## Reflections from Our Rector\_



Dear People of God.

Thomas Groome wrote a book titled "Educating for Life" some years ago. Groome succinctly says:

"Spirituality is not necessary like food and drink, but in the sense that without tending to our souls, we live less humanely. Humans are spiritual

beings. To neglect our spirituality is to be less than who we are. There is even a danger in not caring for our souls. If the innate desire for God is unmet, the temptation is to allay it in other ways — fame or fortune, power or prestige, work, drugs, or alcohol. None will satisfy, and when we make such substitutes a 'god,' they destroy us. As the French mathematician Blaise Pascal (1623-1662) wisely wrote, 'There is a God-shaped hollow in the human heart that nothing else can fill."

A vibrant spirituality lays a foundation for integrating all the bits and pieces of our lives, keeping us to live a whole and balanced life. As believers, we seek to connect the mystery of God with the mystery of our lives. Yet, our lives were stunned into shock, disbelief, horror, and myriad questions after the horrific terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. A man told Newsweek magazine, "I don't know what to tell my child because I don't know what to tell myself." Of this, I am sure."

We need God. I'll repeat it -We need God more than ever! The same can be said of the horrible tragedy on August 27 in Minneapolis at the opening of the year School Mass at Annunciation Catholic School.

The words of the following poem may help us seek the Lord in simple ways we never imagined.

The man whispered,

"God, speak to me."

But the man did not hear.

So, the man yelled,

"God, speak to me!"

And thunder rolled across the sky,

But the man did not listen.

The person looked around and said,

"God. let me see You."

And a star shone brightly,

But the man did not notice.

And the person shouted,

## The History of the Holy Rosary

### **Origins in Early Christianity**

register:

Before the rosary was formalized, early Christians used prayer beads to keep track of repeated prayers like the Our Father or Psalms. Monks in the early Middle Ages offer prayed the 150 Psalms of the Bible, but since most laypeople couldn't read, a simpler version of 150 Our Fathers was used instead. This led to the creation of prayer counters using pebbles or beads.

### Saint Dominic and the Legend

According to tradition, the Virgin Mary appeared to Saint Dominic in the early 13th century and gave him the rosary as a tool to combat heresies and convert sinners. Though historians debate the accuracy of this account, the Dominican Order played a key role in promoting the rosary throughout Europe.

## The Rosary's Structure Evolves

By the 15th century, the structure of the rosary began to take shape. A Dominican priest name Blessed Alan de la Roche helped formalize the devotion, organizing it into the 15 mysteries (Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious) to meditate on the life of Jesus and Mary. These were grouped with the 150 Hail Marys, reflecting the 150 Psalms.

## **Congrats to our Golden Wedding Anniversary Couples!**

■his weekend, the Cathedral is hosting the annual Golden Wedding Anniversary Mass for couples married in 1975. In a rare coincidence, this celebration occurs on the same day the Church celebrates the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This is a beautiful reminder of what marriage is and how, for the last



50 years, these couples have, in their own way, exalted the Holy Cross.

Holy Matrimony is the only one of the seven Sacraments our Church celebrates, where the bride and groom are the ordinary ministers. The priest or deacon acts as a legal and sacramental witness for weddings, but it is the bride and groom who give of themselves to each other and make Christ present in their love.

According to the Catechism, the end of marriage, meaning the purpose of marriage, is unity, openness to children, and indissolubility (CCC 1664). We could add one more purpose to marriage, the end goal of any vocation: holiness. As husband and wife, as ministers of the Sacrament who give of themselves totally and completely to the other, and their children, if children result from their married life, are meant to help the other get to heaven while striving for heaven themselves.

It makes sense that in marriage, the husband and wife are the ministers because they are the ones who promise to be faithful to each other, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love and honor each other all the days of their lives. It is not the priest making these promises, nor is it the community gathered that raised these two individuals who make this promise. It is the bride and groom who are making the promise to give of themselves, totally and completely, to their spouse and potential future children, and the world, through their married life together. Through this self-gift, the couple paves the way for holiness for each other and the world through this witness. In a sense, by entering marriage,

the man and woman take up a shared cross. They share sufferings and joys and struggles and peace, together. The celebration of the Golden Jubilarians and the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross show us that love reigns overall, and love is worth sacrificing for.

As Christians, we understand that love is a gift and, more fundamentally, love is meant to be shared with others. In my own life, my parents who celebrated 39 years of marriage this past June, have demonstrated to me and my brothers God's love and that the cross should always be embraced. My parents continue to illustrate Christ's sacrifice on the cross for us in their daily married life.

We join in congratulating the couples of the Archdiocese who celebrate 50 years of marriage this weekend as they gather for this Eucharistic celebration, the most perfect form of thanksgiving, here at the Cathedral. We also pray for those who have lost a spouse before this milestone, aware that those who have gone before us participate in the same heavenly liturgy. We give thanks to God for the Sacrament of Marriage, a tangible expression of Christ's love on the cross, shown through the married love of so many people throughout the world. And for the couples who have faithfully carried that cross with their spouse, in good times and in bad.




