

Reflections from Our Rector ____



Dear People of God,

Look at your hands. This is not a joke! Seriously, before you continue reading, take a moment and stare at your hands. For those who are older, notice the wrinkles that have formed over the years. Did you ever break or fracture a bone in your hands? How

about stitches to close a wound? What about arthritis? It is so easy to take our hands for granted until the pain reminds us that our hands do not "work" the way they once did years ago.

We are invited to respond to the gift of life with open hands and not clenched fists. Open hands can both give in love and receive in faith and trust. Life is difficult. At times, we are defensive and afraid to open our hands and hearts to others. Yet, we need to go to God with open hands and ask for God's strength, peace, forgiveness, hope, and joy for the journey. We need to make our lives a gift to others by opening our hands to help a hurting world back into life.

I share this powerful story with you. Enjoy and pass it on ...

Grandma's Hands

Grandma, age 99, sat feebly on the patio bench. She didn't move, just sat with her head down, staring at her hands.

When I sat down beside her, she didn't acknowledge my presence, and the longer I sat, I wondered if she was OK. Finally, I asked if she was OK. She raised her head and smiled. "Yes, I'm fine," she said in a clear, strong voice.

I didn't mean to disturb you, Grandma, but you were just sitting there staring at your hands, and I wanted to make sure you were OK," I explained to her.

"Have you ever looked at your hands?" she asked. "I mean, really looked at your hands?"

I slowly opened my hands and stared at them. I turned them over, palms up and down. No, I guess I had as I tried to figure out the point she was making.

Grandma smiled and related this story. "Stop and think for a moment about the hands you have, how they have served you well throughout your years. These hands, though wrinkled, shriveled, and weak, have been the tools I have used all my life to reach out and grab and embrace life. They braced and caught my fall when, as a toddler, I

crashed upon the floor."

"They put food in my mouth and clothes on my back. As a child, my mother taught me to fold them in prayer. They tied my shoes. They held my husband and wiped my tears when he went off to war."

"They have been dirty, scraped and raw, swollen and bent. They were uneasy and clumsy when I tried to hold my newborn son. Decorated with my wedding band, they showed that I was married and loved someone special."

"They have held my children and grandchildren, consoled neighbors and shaken in anger when I didn't understand."

"They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed the rest of my body. And to this day, when not much of anything else of me works real well, these hands hold me up, lay me down, and again continue to fold in prayer."

"These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of life."

"But more importantly, it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when he leads me home. And with my hands, He will lift me to His side, and there I will use these hands to touch the face of Christ."

I will never look at my hands the same again. But I remember when God reached out and took my grandma's hands and let her go home. When my hands are sore or hurt, or when I stroke the faces of my children, I think of Grandma. I know she has been held by the hands of God.

I, too, want to touch the face of God and feel His hands upon my face.

What a beautiful story! May our hands always reach out in love and compassion, for God holds us first. Let us go forward, using our hands to bring hope and healing to others — trusting that, in every moment, God is guiding us by the hand.






On the Cover

Catholic Illuminations

Join Us for our Annual Mass of Remembrance on Nov. 5

■ ach year on Nov. 2, our Church ■ invites us to commemorate ■ All Souls' Day, also referred to as the Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed. In Mexico, the day is known as *Día de los Muertos*, or Day of the Dead. From the beginning of Christianity, we have prayed for the dead. This is seen primarily in the



Roman catacombs, where the faithful visited the tombs of early Christians martyred for the faith.

Throughout the centuries, the Catholic Church has prayed for the dead in various ways. Two obvious examples are found within each celebration of the Mass. The first example is that generally, the last petition in the universal prayer is for the faithful departed. The second example is that in whatever Eucharistic Prayer the presider chooses (there are 10 options, and depending on the season, the presider is limited in his selection), there is always a reference to the dead. "Remember also our brothers and sisters who have fallen asleep in the hope of the resurrection, and all who have died in your mercy" (Eucharist Prayer II) and "To our departed brothers and sisters and to all who were pleasing to you at their passing from this life, give kind admittance to your kingdom" (Eucharistic Prayer III) are just two examples of the prayers for the dead in our liturgy.

And you may ask yourself, why? Why do we pray for the dead? Why do we continue to remember those who have died because the grief of their passing is so deep and heavy? It is because in our belief as Christians, those who have been baptized have already died in Christ, and the physical death of the body is when we await the promise of the resurrection. That those who have died in the flesh, "for God's faithful people, life is changed, not ended" (Preface for the Dead, I).

Death is a part of the human condition. In a sense, we are born to die. But as we live and move and have our

being aware of this reality, we are called to live our lives in accord with God's will, giving him glory and honor by doing what he created us to do: love. Grief is painful because the love we have for those who have died has nowhere to go. As people of faith, we remember our death by praying for those who have died, that one day we will all be united in the new and eternal Jerusalem.

Join us this Wednesday, Nov. 5, at the 5:15pm Mass for our annual parish Mass of Remembrance, where we remember in a special way those who have been buried from the Cathedral in the past year. Due to the music being sung and the remembrance of the deceased at this particular mass, the length of this mass will be longer than a typical Wednesday evening Mass. All those who attend are invited to bring a framed photo of their loved one and place it on the steps leading to the sanctuary for the duration of this Mass. Let us come to thank God for our loved ones and pray that they are enjoying the face of God for eternity.

Volunteers Needed to Help with World Day of the Poor

Ninth-Annual Event Will Be Sunday, Nov. 16

The World Day of the Poor in 2025 will be on Sunday, Nov. 16. This will be the ninth annual observation of the day, established by Pope Francis in 2016 to encourage reflection on and action against poverty.

The theme for 2025 is "You are my hope" (Psalm 7:15), and the official message for the day released by Pope Leo XIV on June 13.

The day encourages Catholics and people of goodwill to recognize the poor as protagonists of hope and to work for structural change. Holy Name Cathedral will once again gather to create winter survival kits for our neighbors living on the streets of Chicago.

The day includes packing the kits with items that are intended to ease the difficulties of winter weather, nonperishable food and spiritual reflections. After packing, volunteers are invited to bring the kits to the many people living on the streets. We provide guidance on how to work in pairs and where to go. Before leaving, all volunteers will receive a special blessing at Mass.

We welcome volunteers to assist in planning the day including defining and ordering the contents of this year's Winter Survival Packs, organizing the packing activities, recruit volunteers, and developing instructions for sharing the packs with those living on the streets of

Chicago.

Pray for Souls in Purgatory

t was a typical Tuesday evening.
Children gathered at the parish for their faith formation class. Leaving home after sunset, I followed a dimly lit dirt road. Everything seemed normal until I reached the eerie house near the elementary school, which



was rumored to be the storage place for a vehicle used to transport the deceased to the cemetery. As children, our vivid imaginations propelled us to sprint through that unsettling area at breakneck speed.

November had arrived, and in my hometown in Vietnam, it marked the time when our parish's custom called for students to visit the cemetery after their religious education class. We'd often travel in groups of 10 or 20, sometimes with our Catechist's guidance, but mostly without. The journey to the cemetery stretched approximately two miles. Things were tolerable until we ventured into a dark, tree-covered path within the cemetery itself. Occasionally, the eerie hoot of an owl would accentuate the already spooky ambiance.

On one unforgettable day, as brave children overcame these intimidating obstacles, we eventually arrived at the graves of our beloved family members. Here, we'd separate to light candles and incense sticks at the graves. In the end, we'd reconvene in front of a towering cross and recite the Our Father and the Creed to offer indulgence for the souls in Purgatory. Though we approached this solemn ritual with the utmost piety and reverence, it would invariably be disrupted by one mischievous child who'd suddenly shout, "Run, there's a ghost!" This startling exclamation would trigger a flurry of children making the sign of the Cross and dashing back home.

Why, you might wonder, would children willingly subject themselves to such a frightening experience at the cemetery year after year? Well, we were taught that the souls in Purgatory depended on our prayers. Have you recently paid a visit to the cemetery and prayed for the souls in Purgatory? I love being a priest! JMJ.






