

Dear People of God.

It is truly rare for any Cathedral to go from wonderfully celebrating its 175th Anniversary Year as a Faith Community to celebrating its 150th Anniversary the following year, as

a Cathedral "rebuilt by faith." However, that is, in fact, why we are gathering today at Holy Name Cathedral.

On Nov. 21, 1875, the previous Holy Name Church, a victim of the 1871 Great Chicago Fire, was rebuilt and dedicated as the Cathedral through the prayers, tenacity and generosity of the faithful from here and around the country. Through this tragedy, great hope was reborn as a sign that our Cathedral is alive and vital to our Archdiocese, neighborhood, city, and our country and, indeed, the world.

We remember, we celebrate, and we believe that our Holy Name Cathedral was built to remind us that we gather in this holy place and we are challenged to go

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

My heart is filled with great pride as I offer these words of gratitude to the Cathedral family as we mark 150 years since the dedication of this mother church of the Archdiocese of Chicago, rebuilt after the Great Chicago Fire.

At the same time, I am genuinely disappointed that other obligations will not allow me to be present for the Nov. 23 celebration. Nonetheless, please know that I am with you in prayer as together we recall how, across these centuries, countless men and women sacrificed generously to sustain and enhance both this magnificent physical structure and the vibrant community of believers who call it home.

Throughout this year, we will continue to ask God's help to fulfill our responsibility to hand on the traditions of faith as we strive to embrace and live the vision of Holy Name Cathedral: A World in Communion with Jesus Christ. In that task, I will surely walk with you as I want to make clear my deep appreciation to the people of Holy Name for the vibrant worship, consoling ministries and dedicated services you offer, making sure that parishioners, visitors and pilgrims, who come through the doors of the Cathedral, feel welcome. I especially thank you for the support you give to your priests, deacons, religious women, staff, lay leaders and volunteers, who so generously serve with admirable dedication. They too deserve our heartfelt thanks.

Saint Pope John Paul II described a cathedral as "the meeting-point of two movements: the descending movement of God's love for humanity and the ascending movement of the human longing for communion with God, the source of joy and peace." [May 30, 1999] You put those words into action so splendidly. In fact, in my experience as archbishop, I now have come to learn that you bring fresh vigor to Christ's mission simply by the joy, peace and hope that mark your faith-lives.

May the Risen One keep us all close to Him and each other as we make disciples, build community and witness to our faith in the world. May generations to come be blessed as you boldly and creatively build on the legacy we celebrate today.

Let me close by citing the same scripture passage the first rector of Holy Name Cathedral used when addressing his newly gathered congregation: "Do you not know that you are God's temple and that God's Spirit dwells in you? For God's temple is holy, and you are that temple." (1 Corinthians 3:16-17).


It is clear to me that you do know this. For that, I thank and congratulate you all.

Moving from Holy Name Church to Becoming Holy Name Cathedral



Nov. 18, 1849 — Holy Name Parish is dedicated with its first free-standing church (small wooden-frame building on the northeast corner of State between Huron and Superior) and Fr. Kinsella is appointed first pastor.

Aug. 3, 1853 — Cornerstone for Holy Name Church (soon to be largest Gothic Church in Chicago) is laid on southeast corner of State and Superior; it is constructed of Milwaukee



Brick (196-feet long and 82-feet wide with projected 248-foot steeple) at a cost of \$100,000.

Oct. 8/9, 1871 — The Great Chicago Fire breaks out, destroying 13,000 buildings, leaving 100,000 homeless with losses totaling more than \$1 million. Holy Name Church, St. Mary's Cathedral,




five other churches, many schools, convents and orphanages are burned beyond recognition.

1871-1872 — A makeshift wooden structure (dubbed "shanty cathedral" heated by single pot-bellied stove) is erected at the southwest corner of Chicago Ave. with



doors facing Wabash. For two years Bishop Foley and other clergy and laity travel across America and overseas to raise money for Chicago's new Holy Name Cathedral.



1874 — Brooklyn architect Patrick Charles Keely is hired to design and build a new "carpenter-style" Victorian Gothic cathedral on the northeast corner of State and

Superior. The new eight ton, 6'-long and 2'-high Cathedral cornerstone is dedicated; with the carved inscription: "At Jesus' Name every knee must bend in the heavens, on the earth, and under the earth, and every tongue proclaim to the glory of God the Father: Jesus Christ is Lord!" (Phil. 2:10-11)



Nov. 21, 1875 — On Feast of Mary's Presentation in Temple, Bishop Foley dedicates Holy Name Cathedral's nave (218-feet long, 70-feet high, 102-feet wide), transept (126-feet wide) and spire (210-feet high including 18-feet high cross) with lavish marble interior, bright-colored windows and ornamental paintings at total cost of \$260,000 (capacity 1,100-1,500 worshipers in parish of 2,700)

Happy 150th, HNC! What Makes a Cathedral a Cathedral?

n Fridav, Nov. 21, 2025, Holv Name Cathedral celebrated its 150th anniversary of its dedication as the Cathedral of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Some acknowledge an anniversary as just a number and a moment in time. something momentarily to move past.



But this anniversary means so much more.

There is only one Cathedral in every diocese worldwide. The word 'cathedral' comes from the Latin word cathedra, meaning 'bishop's chair'. The chair symbolizes the bishop's authority to teach and govern over that local church. There is only one 'Ordinary' in each diocese, and so there is only one chair for the bishop, which is found in the Cathedral.

As the Cathedral is the seat of the bishop, it also becomes the mother church of the diocese. It is here at Holy Name Cathedral, in these sacred walls, that the local church of Chicago gathers for significant celebrations in the lives of the faithful. We host ordination liturgies each year as men answer the call to serve as priests and deacons to meet the spiritual needs of the faithful. We welcome candidates and catechumens during Lent for the Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion, as their names echo off these walls and are recorded in the Book of the Elect in heaven. We gather during Holy Week to celebrate the Chrism Mass, during which the priests of the Archdiocese renew their priestly promises, and the oils for our sacraments are blessed and sent to parishes for the upcoming year.

Due to these celebrations and many others, the Cathedral of a diocese becomes a place where we come to be acknowledged, loved, forgiven, blessed, nourished, and supported. It is our home where we go when things are going well and when they are not. For 150 years, Holy Name Cathedral has been a place to come, to rest, to be loved, and to be sent back into the world on mission to share the Good News throughout the Archdiocese and the world.

Holy Name Cathedral has witnessed many historic events over the years. From countless weddings and baptisms to funerals and anniversaries, a papal visit in 1979, and the installation of new archbishops and the ordination of countless clergy to serve the faithful. For 150 years, Holy Name Cathedral has been a beacon of hope and light in this city and throughout the country.


Because of that reality, we celebrate and give thanks. We give thanks to God for those who have gone before us and created this spiritual home we call Holy Name Cathedral. We give thanks to God for calling us to be his adoptive children through water and the Holy Spirit. We give thanks to God for His Son Jesus, in whose Holy Name we bow and give glory to as we share His Gospel with the city of Chicago and beyond. We give thanks to God for his faithfulness, mercy, love, and peace we encounter when we gather in this sacred space.

As we gather to celebrate this grand Cathedral, let us continue to give thanks. For 150 years this building has not just been a physical structure, but a spiritual guide that has shaped the lives of countless people in thought, word, and deed. May she continue to send us forth on mission out into the world, that whatever we do, we always give glory to His Holy Name. Let us be inspired by the Cathedral's legacy and continue to live our lives in ways that honor its teachings and values.

very Thanksgiving, there's I always that one brave soul who ■ volunteers to make the turkey from scratch. You know the type brimming with confidence, armed with YouTube tutorials, and a false sense of culinary destiny. Hours later, the kitchen looks like a battlefield. the smoke alarm has gone off twice,



and the bird resembles something between a roast and a science experiment. I might be describing myself if I ever tried cooking the turkey! (You can always ask Fr. Andy for his recipe — he's the real pro who makes it every year for his family.)

But here's the truth: no matter how beautiful the turkey looks on the outside, the real test comes when you carve it open. What spills out — authentic juices or something dry and flavorless? Dec. 5, 6:00pm; Dec. 7, 2:30pm; Dec. 10, 6:00pm at Siskel Film Center






