



Reflections from Our Rector_



Dear People of God,

How quickly our Advent Season gives way to Christmas morn later this week! Advent celebrates not only the coming of Jesus at Bethlehem, but the Lord coming into our lives — at this moment! Like a fine wine. I have saved this fantastic story for the Fourth

Sunday of Advent. Please share with family and friends. The author of this modern parable is the late Paul Harvey.

Christmas Story of the Man and the Birds

Now, the man to whom I'm going to introduce you was not a Scrooge; he was a kind, decent, mostly good man. Generous to his family, upright in his dealings with other people. But he just didn't believe all that incarnation stuff which the church proclaims at Christmas time. It just didn't make sense, and he was too honest to pretend otherwise. He just couldn't swallow the Jesus story, about God coming to earth as a human.

I'm truly sorry to distress you, he told his wife, "but I'm not going with you and the children to church on Christmas Eve."

He said he'd feel like a hypocrite. That he'd much rather just stay at home, but that he would wait up for them. And so he stayed, and they went to Midnight Mass. Shortly after the family drove away, snow began to fall. He went to the window to watch the flurries grow heavier, then returned to his fireside chair and began reading his newspaper. Minutes later, he was startled by a thudding sound, then another, and then another. Sort of a thump and a thud. At first, he thought someone must be throwing snowballs against his living room window.

But when he went to the front door to investigate, he found a flock of birds huddled miserably in the snow. They'd been caught in the storm and, in a desperate search for shelter, had tried to fly through his large landscape window. Well, he couldn't let the poor creatures lie there and freeze: he remembered the barn where his children stabled their pony. That would provide a warm shelter, if he could direct the birds to it.

Quickly, he put on a coat and goloshes and tramped through the deepening snow to the barn. He opened the doors wide and turned on a light, but the birds did not come in. He figured food would entice them in. So he hurried back to the house, fetched bread crumbs and sprinkled them on the snow, making a trail to the yellowlighted, wide-open doorway of the stable. But to his dismay, the birds ignored the breadcrumbs and continued to flap helplessly in the snow.

He tried catching them. He tried shooing them into the barn by walking around them, waving his arms. Instead, they scattered in every direction, except into the warm, lighted barn. And then he realized that they were afraid of him. To them, he reasoned, I am a strange and terrifying creature. If only I could think of some way to let them know that they can trust me. That I am not trying to hurt them, but to help them. But how? Any move I make tends to frighten them, confuse them. They just won't follow me. They won't be let or shooed because they fear me.

"If only I could be a bird," he thought to himself, "and mingle with them and speak their language. Then I could tell them not to be afraid. Then I could show them the way to the safe, warm barn. But I would have to be one of them so they could see, hear, and understand.

At that moment, the church bells began to ring. The sound reached his ears above the wind. And he stood there listening to the bells — Adeste Fidelis — listening to the bells pealing the glad tidings of Christmas. And he sank to his knees in the snow.

God became human so we could become divine! May we always know God's wonder, feel His warmth and share His love.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Our Christmas celebrations coincide with the beginning of winter. There is less light at this time of year and more cold than we might want. The contrast is striking for people of faith. We remember God's only begotten Son born of the Virgin Mary. He comes into a dark and cold world as its light and its warmth.

In chapter four of Matthew's gospel at the beginning of the public ministry of Jesus, the evangelist cites words of the prophet Isaiah:

...the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned. (Mt 4:16)

Events of this past year could suggest that all we have is indeed a cold and dark world. That seems to be the message of the wars fought around the world, of the tragic school shootings and political assassinations in our nation, and of our frayed connections with each other.

Again, for us as people of faith, the contrast is stark. We are realistic, and we know well the challenges of our world in this tense moment of the world's history. We also know, however, a larger narrative of God's love incarnate in Jesus Christ, the light that breaks the power of sin and death. Saint John wrote of him: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:5) This light enlightens us and warms us. Whatever struggles we face, we are assured because he walks with us.

As you gather with family and friends and fellow parishioners, I urge you to reassure each other with our convictions of faith. Take responsibility in the world to be a sign of hope and a source of encouragement for others. In this way, you will bring Christ the light to those who need him.

Join me and pray for our world, our nation, and our local communities that we can all walk in the light.

What You Need to Know for Christmas Masses at HNC

In preparation to celebrate the Lord's Nativity, Holy Name Cathedral will follow these measures to allow safe and welcoming worship to our parishioners and visitors who join us for Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Christmas Eve Masses

All will be asked to line up outside on State Street. The line will begin at the staircase and flow north on State towards the FXW school building and Chicago Ave. The center doors will open at 2:15pm and 5:15pm prior to the 3pm and 6pm Christmas Eve Masses (handicap and stroller access available on the corner of State and Superior.) There will be no saving pews and we ask that all members of the family be present when entering the Cathedral.

There will be an overflow Christmas Eve Mass at 3:15pm in the auditorium, which will be a full Mass with music. When the Cathedral reaches capacity, everyone not in the Cathedral at that time will be directed to the auditorium for Mass at 3:15pm. This is the only overflow Mass for the Christmas liturgies.

Midnight Mass

For Midnight Mass, the line will be divided between ticketed and non-ticketed persons. Those with tickets are asked to have them ready by the time doors open at 11pm. Non ticketed persons will be admitted at 11:30pm.

Christmas Day Masses

For the 7:00am Christmas Day Mass, the Cathedral doors will open at 6:30am. For all remaining Masses, everyone will be asked to remain outside until the previous Mass participants have exited the Cathedral. We encourage people, as on Christmas Eve to stand with their families as saving pews will not be allowed due to the expected number of Mass attendees.

Thank you for understanding and for joining us for the celebration of Christmas at Holy Name Cathedral. These measures will ensure accurate seating for our liturgies, less congestion between Masses. The Cathedral staff thanks everyone for joining us for these sacred liturgies and for your cooperation.



Midnight Mass Tickets Now Available Online!

In addition to Midnight Mass, we are offering three masses during the day on Christmas Eve and four masses on Christmas Day. There is no need to register for these other Christmas Eve or any of the Christmas Day Masses. All are welcome, and it is a first come, first seated for all our Christmas Masses. There is no overflow seating for Midnight Mass, so it is strongly suggested that you reserve your tickets in advance. Just scan the QR code to make your reservation.

All those who have preregistered will be allowed to enter the Cathedral at 11:00pm. At 11:30pm, Christmas carols begin and we open our doors for all others waiting without advance registration.

We will have free parking with extended time for Christmas Carols and the full Mass. Just pull your ticket to enter our garage at the Holy Name Cathedral parking garage, located at 14 W. Superior.

What Do We Want Right Now, and How Do We Want to Live?

s Advent dawns, the Church hands us a Psalm that feels like the opening scene of a great story: "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord." It is the sound of pilgrims setting out at daybreak, hearts beating with hope, eyes fixed on the horizon. St. Paul joins them, urging us to travel lightly, casting off



the darkness that slows our steps and clothing ourselves instead in the bright armor of God's light.

Then Isaiah steps forward with a surprising stroke of imagination. He points to Lebanon – famous for its wild, tangled forests, thick with enormous, unmanageable trees — and he dares to proclaim: "Lebanon shall be changed into an orchard." What a vision! A wilderness transformed into ordered beauty, a place once barren now overflowing with fruit. It is the quiet promise Advent whispers - God can turn even the most chaotic corners of our hearts into gardens.

And just when the anticipation begins to build, a voice cries out from the desert — John the Baptist. He knows the story is reaching a turning point and inviting people to get ready for the coming of the Lord. Advent is the



season for chopping down the dead trees within us: the habits that drain us, the resentments we cling to, the distractions that dull our joy. The "axe" we wield is prayer — slow, steady, sometimes hard, but always worth the effort. The more wood that we chop down, the better the fire for Christmas.

And then, at last, the climax: a child in a manger, lightly wrapped in swaddling clothes. Friends, isn't it astonishing? My heart nearly leaps just thinking about it: Christmas is not humanity climbing up to find God, but God coming down to find us. The orchard begins with a single seed — God's love planted in our world, in our hearts, inviting us once more to rejoice.

So, what do we want right now, and how do we want to live? Hope you know the answer. And now, friends... jingle, jingle, jingle! Merry Christmas to you and your family! I love being a priest. JMJ.


