

Why Ordinary Time Might Be the Most Demanding Season of All

Ordinary Time invites us to follow Christ not only in the mountaintop experiences but in the steady unfolding of daily life.

The Church moves through the year with a beautiful rhythm. Advent teaches us to wait. Christmas teaches us to rejoice. Lent teaches us to repent. Easter teaches us to hope. Then comes Ordinary Time.

It is the longest season of the liturgical year, and perhaps the easiest to overlook. Nothing obvious happens at first glance. No dramatic fasts or feasts dominate the calendar. Ordinary Time looks, well — ordinary.

Yet this is precisely why Ordinary Time is so essential.

Ordinary Time invites us to follow Christ not only in the mountaintop experiences but in the steady unfolding of daily life. It is a season of growth, of quiet faithfulness, and of learning to see Christ in the everyday moments we often take for granted.

Saint Josemaría Escrivá reminded us that God is calling us to serve Him in and from the ordinary. Holiness is not just found in dramatic moments of conversion, but in the faithful living of daily responsibilities and relationships.

The funny thing is that it can be easier to be kind to strangers than to those closest to us. A cheerful word comes easily in passing, yet patience is harder with a spouse after a long day. We may smile at a neighbor but grow weary with our own family.

This reveals something profound: Ordinary Time holds up a mirror to our hearts. It asks not how we behave when we are seen, but how we love when no one is watching.


A Tool for Every Ordinary Day

we are in Him, and to renew our "yes" with clarity, peace, and passion.

This Week, Join the Church and Pray For Christian Unity

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity begins each year on Jan. 18 and culminates on the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on Jan. 25. The first Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, originally called the Church Unity Octave, was held in a chapel 50 miles north of New York City in 1908, hosted by the Franciscan Friars and Sisters of the Atonement who desired unity between the Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches. After the founders of this community, a priest and a sister, converted to Catholicism, Pope Benedict XV approved the celebration of the Church Unity Octave throughout the Universal Church. But why were the dates Jan. 18 to Jan. 25 chosen?

Both the Roman Catholic Feast of the Chair of St. Peter and the Anglican Feast of the Confession of St. Peter were celebrated on Jan. 18. During the Catholic liturgical calendar reforms of the 1960s, this feast was merged with seven others of similar or mysterious origin, and the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter was moved to Feb. 22. Rather than moving the Week of Unity entirely, it has remained on the original dates despite these Catholic liturgical changes. In the southern hemisphere, however, the Week of Prayer is celebrated between the Feast of the Ascension and Pentecost, another symbolic octave period.

The Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul is monumental, given his dramatic story. Before his conversion, St. Paul was a leader in Judaism who actively persecuted the early Church. Acts of the Apostles records that he was responsible for the stoning of St. Stephen, the first martyr, whom we remember annually on Dec. 26 (Acts 8:1). Known as Saul before his conversion (Acts 9), he experienced a dramatic encounter on the Road to Damascus that transformed him from a persecutor of the Church into one of its most important apostles. His letters to various early communities make up more than half the New Testament.



The beginning and ending dates of this Week of Prayer for Christian Unity are deeply symbolic: St. Peter, the first Pope, and St. Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, had differences, yet worked together for the unity and mission of the Church. Within the Catholic Church today, we also face divisions and must work for unity, just as the early Apostles did.


The Roman Catholic Church embraced ecumenical dialogue with renewed fervor at the Second Vatican Council. Following the Council document *Unitatis redintegratio* (Restoration of Unity), the Church began viewing non-Catholic Christians no longer as heretics, but as separated brothers and sisters. This shift opened the way to more fruitful dialogue that emphasized similarities rather than differences between Christian denominations.

This year's theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is: "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were also called to the one hope of your call" (Ephesians 4:4). As we embark on another Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, let us earnestly pray with Christians around the world for unity among us, for peace and understanding. Let us join our Lord as he prayed in his agony in the garden, "that they may be one, as we are one" (John 17:22). May we realize that we all worship the same God — the God who came among us to show us how to love — and that we all share the same call to work together because we belong to one body and one spirit.

Join Our Ministry of Care to Bring Communion to the Sick

We are happy to announce that we will be holding training for our Ministry of Care program that serves at several of our local healthcare facilities. This includes Northwestern Hospital (Galter, Feinberg, and Prentice) and Warren Barr Rehabilitation Center. All these facilities are a short walking distance from the Cathedral. We also have several in-home visit opportunities for those unable to come to church.

What is the Ministry of Care?

Ministry of Care to the sick is a pastoral ministry caring for those who are hospitalized, in nursing homes or confined to private homes. This ministry is provided by trained and certified lay men and women, ordained deacons, vowed religious sisters and brothers and priests within the Archdiocese of Chicago. Ministers are trained and formed to conduct pastoral visits with time to listen and pray about the concerns of the sick or shut-in person and to share Eucharist with them.

How does one become a Minister of Care?

As mandated by the Archdiocese of Chicago, each minister must complete a minimum of ten hours of training. Holy Name Cathedral is blessed to have a cadre of priests and deacons who collaborate with our staff team to design and deliver the training.



It is primarily an in-person training with opportunities to practice patient interactions. We only offer the training twice per year. This next training will start in February 2026.

How often do I serve as a Minister of Care?

The schedule for ministers is highly flexible. We serve seven days a week, 365 days a year. Some ministers serve on a weekly basis while others serve every other week or twice a month. You may visit your assigned patients anytime during patient visiting hours on your assigned day.


