Jesus always giving...

Jesus always forgiving...

And we are challenged to do the same!

Today, we conclude Catholic Schools Week. Catholic Schools Week is a celebration of education, faith, values, and tradition. Frances Xavier Warde is an outstanding Catholic school rich in inclusion, diversity, and our faith. 

Catholic Illuminations

The Importance of Candles and Light for Our Faith



Our faith uses many external signs that point to an internal reality or meaning. One of the most often used signs or symbols is a candle. This week, we celebrate two feast days in which candles symbolize what we celebrate. On February 2, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. The dating of this feast, 40 days after Christmas, coincides with the Jewish purity laws of purification of the mother. These laws can be found throughout the Book of Leviticus, one of the five books of the Torah, or Jewish Law. Also in accord with Jewish Law, in remembrance of the great flight into Egypt, when the Angel of Death passed over the houses, striking the firstborn. It recognized the freedom from Egypt and expressed gratitude (Exodus 13:2).

The Presentation of the Lord, also known as Candlemas Day, is celebrated on Feb. 2. Traditionally, on this day, the candles used throughout the liturgical year would be blessed at this Mass, along with a candle procession to the altar. This is in reference to the prophet Simeon, who is in the Temple when Joseph and Mary present Jesus, and says of the child, "He will be a light to the nations" (Luke 2:32).

On Feb. 3, we celebrate the Feast of St. Blaise. On this day, we bless throats with two crossed candles. We ask the saint to protect those being blessed from all throat diseases and illnesses. The story goes that St. Blaise saved a child from choking on a fish bone. Candles are used for the blessing of throats on this feast as a reminder of St. Blaise's imprisonment. A woman would visit him in prison, bringing food and candles to light his dark cell.

In our world today, we do not rely as heavily on candles as our ancestors did because of modern electricity. However, candles are still an important part of our worship. The candle's main function is to provide light. In our historic cathedral, built in 1875 before the modern electrification



of America, we used many candles. But there was, and is, another source of light to allow us to worship. The stained glass windows in our Cathedral are unique and abstract. They differ greatly from what they were before the great renovation in 1968. Before the renovation, the windows depicted biblical stories. They taught the faithful aspects of our faith, in case those in the pews were uneducated.

Today's stained glass windows in the Cathedral were crafted in Milan and also tell a story of light. Looking out the back windows near the State Street doors, we see dark blues. As we process up to the altar, the window shades move from dark blues to yellow. The most transparent is the center window in the apse of the Cathedral. One can't help but notice: to truly look at that window, you need to look through the cross. You must look through the pain, the suffering, and the evil of the world that we can inflict upon each other. Looking through Jesus, you find light, peace, and love.

As we prepare to celebrate these two feast days this week, it serves as a reminder that candles produce light in times of darkness. We are to be light for others through our faith and actions. You are welcome to bring candles to Mass tomorrow, Feb. 2. They will be blessed at the start of Mass. You can use them throughout this year as an external sign of an inward reality: that we are all called to share our light with others.



What's Your Story?

Every face has a name. Every name has a story." What does that really mean?

"Hi, Jayne, what's your story?" I asked.

She looked a little caught off guard, then smiled—and just like that, we had a real conversation. Within five minutes, I felt as though I had known Jayne my entire life. When she mentioned her young daughter, Lindsey, her face lit up with pride. "Tell me more about her," I said.

Jayne took a deep breath. "When Lindsey was born, the doctors immediately whisked her away to surgery. She had severe multiple congenital heart defects." She wiped away a tear as she continued. "They told my husband and me that Lindsey had only a five percent chance of survival."

She shared how she went home, cried, prayed, and talked with her husband late into the night. She didn't feel brave. She didn't feel strong. But deep in her heart, she knew Lindsey's life mattered—no matter how fragile it seemed.

"But she is so strong," Jayne said. "She endured two open-heart surgeries as an infant. She survived, and today she is a totally healthy young girl."

Beautiful, isn't it?

Jayne is one of the most incredible leaders and together with Lindsey, she has helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for the American Heart Association.

Everyone has a name, and everyone has a story. This story is taken from *The Gift of Influence* by Tommy Spaulding—highly recommended.

As Lent approaches, we are reminded that carrying our crosses is not easy. Yet God never fails to reveal meaning in our suffering. He does not promise comfort or glamour, but He walks with us as we carry the Cross.


You don't need to attend every week to join — come when you can! That said, we highly encourage weekly participation to get the most out of the experience and grow together as a community.

Stewardship Reflection

Living God-Centered Lives

The Gospel Reading for today is what is popularly called the Sermon on the Mount. Many think it is the absolute epitome of Jesus' teachings. To be sure it tells us how we are to live our lives, the attitudes we are to have. We must remember that those who were waiting and hoping for the Messiah expected a military leader, one who would lead them in battle against their oppressors.

In His Sermon on the Mount Jesus gives a more accurate perspective of Who He is. He begins what we call the Beatitudes (the word means "blessings") with "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." In a sense we are all "poor in spirit." Without the guidance and strength provided us by the Lord there is no way we can escape this poverty of spirit, of spirituality, if you will.

That is why we often say that living God-centered lives is at the very core of stewardship. Being a disciple of Christ translates into being a steward of our many gifts and blessings. Some scholars believe that Jesus may have given this sermon often during His ministry. Those who followed Jesus and became the earliest Christians, the first members of the Church, were fond of quoting and referring to what the Lord said on this occasion. As stated, Jesus provides us with the secret of living a good life. If we rely on Him and follow Him, we will be blessed.


