Reflections from Our Rector



Dear People of God,

The Lord is Risen – so too with us!
Rejoice! Our Lenten journey is over. We have been invited to walk more closely with the Lord on His way to the Cross – a victorious Cross which gives way to life so abundant we call it eternal...
EASTER!

As we rejoice, let us also remember that the story of Jesus is our own story. Jesus is God's pledge to us that the whole venture of embracing life and becoming human is the way to God.

Resurrection means Jesus lives. Our Lord discovered what to die for and what to live forever for. May our lives always be rooted in the peace, joy, and hope of the Risen Lord. The Lord Jesus walks with us – always! This is His promise – so powerful we call it eternal! Easter is here, and Spring brings the thrill of renewal racing through our veins once more. Spring also means the Cubs and White Sox are still in the pennant chase!

With this understanding, Jesus, who was thought to be dead, lives! In fact, Jesus lives forever! Because of Jesus' victory over death, we are no longer lost; we are found and claimed as God's children forever.

Continuing our journey, we travel with Jesus from aloneness to fullness within a Faith Community, from brokenness to healing, from death to life. The Lord is risen, and we rise with Him.

We wonder what this remarkable event means in our

lives. On this great Easter Day, we share the Lord's Easter peace, presence, and power. In return, the Lord tells us that He wants our love shown through lives that are lived for others. Jesus wants us to be real disciples. To be a real disciple of Jesus means three distinct things.

First, it means vulnerability. We must acknowledge that we cannot always be in control and must turn to the Lord, trusting completely in Him. It means we accept that life will not always be on our terms and that we allow God to work through us.

Secondly, discipleship means that we live life deliberately. We are a pilgrim and mission people. Through our Baptism, we have been called to give witness to our loving God through our actions and words. We are called to continually love this world back into life through what we do and say, and how we act and love.

Lastly, a disciple has a radical dependence on God. The Lord can make a difference in our lives if we give Him a chance. A disciple communicates frequently with God.

The gospels do not explain Easter; Easter explains the gospels. Our lives do not explain Easter; Easter explains our lives. Faith is the story we tell with our lives.

For the believer, death means life is changed, not ended. We look forward to eternal life with God.

This is a marvelous Faith Community – thanks to all of you!
Wishing you and your loved ones a Blessed Easter.

Easter 2026

Dear Friends in Christ,

Before the proclamation of the gospel at the Easter Vigil liturgy, there is a deeply powerful and moving moment. It is the joyous triple Alleluia. It not only signals the end of our penitential observances but it expresses our passage with the Lord through his passion, death, and burial. Alleluia is our joyful shout of triumph for as Christ rises from the dead, so do we.

Yet, we may find that our Easter joy has been dampened this year in the face of the daunting challenges of war, the upheavals experienced by migrant families, the great turbulence and polarization in our political life, and the myriad uncertainties about our future and the future of our children. Can we sing Alleluia and mean it?

Experiencing those sentiments myself I am drawn to Saint Paul's words to the Thessalonians. In a moment of suffering loss, confusion and grief he wrote: "But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died." (1Thessalonians 4:13-14)

Listen carefully to Paul's words. He tells the Thessalonians that they can grieve and that they can experience struggle and loss. But they must not grieve or suffer as those who have no hope, as those who do not believe that Jesus died and rose and will take us to himself. Like the Thessalonians, we do not ignore or deny the suffering and grief we are experiencing, but we are not held captive to this moment nor to this world. We hold fast to Christ our hope who draws us into a future defined and shaped by his Resurrection.

So, sisters and brothers, let's not hold back our shouts of joy. Let us sing with gusto our Alleluia for it bears witness to our enduring hope in Christ's Resurrection. It inspires us to do what we can to allow his risen life to take hold of and shape our lives and to empower us to reach out to our wounded world. A blessed Easter to all of you and your loved ones.

How Do You Rejoice and Live Out the Good News of Easter?

Christ is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia! Throughout the world, for years and centuries, this greeting has been proclaimed in grand Cathedrals, in neighborhood churches, and in remote tents serving as places of worship for those living on the fringes of society. This fundamental truth has been said in the public square and in the cells of prisons. This groundbreaking reality has comforted the sorrowful and given courage to the fearful. This simple phrase has changed the lives of so many people who, like the Apostles, went out and shared the goodness of God in their words and actions, allowing others to believe.



But for us, thousands of miles away from Jerusalem, do we feel the impact of this statement? Do we believe in the words? In 2020, my seminary class and I went on a 10-week pilgrimage to the Holy Land. One of the beautiful opportunities we were given was to be “locked in” the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The church contains the hill of Calvary, where Christ was crucified; the stone where his body was anointed before burial (cf. John 19:39); the tomb in which he was placed; and the garden area to which he appeared to Mary Magdalene (cf. John 20:11-18).

As part of my overnight at the church, I was given about 20 uninterrupted minutes alone in the tomb. If you go with a group, you’d be lucky to get 5 seconds alone. Having my 20 or so classmates in the whole structure of the church, the feeling of being at Calvary, at the stone of anointing, the tomb, and the garden area, there is a feeling that is difficult to describe. For centuries, Christians have flocked to the Sepulcher as the sites of the Lord’s Passion, Death, and Resurrection. Over the centuries, the Sepulcher was torched, destroyed, rocked by earthquakes, and involved in other conflicts. And the pilgrims still came.

If Jesus of Nazareth never rose from the dead, the sites of his final moments of life and beginning moments of eternal life would mean nothing. If Jesus were still dead, the world would not be proclaiming his resurrection every day, and there would be no renewed vigor in that proclamation each Easter Sunday.

Praying in the empty tomb by myself, I can say that the tomb is empty, but that is what is seen. To authentically proclaim the Resurrection means to witness to that reality in your life. The Gospel message of Jesus Christ requires a personal belief in the resurrection. The apostles and women saw the empty tomb, then they went and told others what they had seen. And they believed.

As we enter this sacred season of Easter, 50 days of proclaiming joyfully the Christ is Risen, Alleluia, Alleluia, and living in that reality every day of our lives, we need to ask ourselves, do I go through the motions and rejoice in the Good News of Easter, or do I live out the Good News of Easter and celebrate this new life promised to those who believe?

The Holiest Person You Know

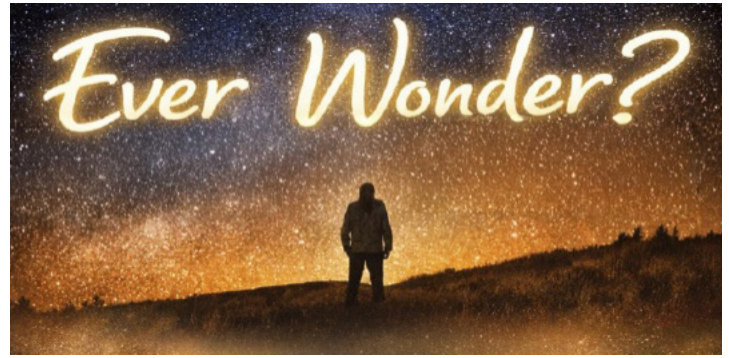
Who is a holy person you have known? For me, I think of a man who, while riding along the road, encountered someone others would not even look at — an outcast, disfigured, a leper whom everyone avoided. Instinctively, he recoiled. Everything urged him to turn away. Yet something stirred in his heart. He dismounted, approached and embraced him. What once filled him with fear became, a source of unexpected sweetness. Later, he would say that what had seemed bitter was turned into joy of soul and body — a joy so profound that words could hardly contain it.



This encounter changed him completely. It was not simply an act of charity; it was a moment of grace. In the face of the leper, he encountered Christ Himself. The barrier between fear and love was broken, and in its place came a freedom rooted in mercy. This experience mirrors the heart of the Easter readings. In the Resurrection accounts, the disciples move from fear to faith, from confusion to joy. At the empty tomb, sorrow gives way to hope. The Risen Christ transforms everything — death into life, despair into mission, and hearts closed in fear into hearts burning with love.

This year, we mark the 800th anniversary of the death of St. Francis of Assisi, whose life continues to inspire the Church. His transformation reminds us of that holiness often begins in small, difficult acts of love. His witness speaks powerfully as we journey through Easter, the season in which Christ transforms suffering into new life.

Easter proclaims that nothing is beyond redemption. Just as the Risen Lord brings light out of darkness, He invites us to allow His grace to work within us and through us. When we open our hearts — especially in moments of discomfort or hesitation — God can transform our fear into joy, our reluctance into compassion, and our ordinary lives into instruments of His peace. May this Easter season renew in us the courage to embrace others with Christ-like love, trusting that His grace is already at work. I love being a priest. JMJ.
